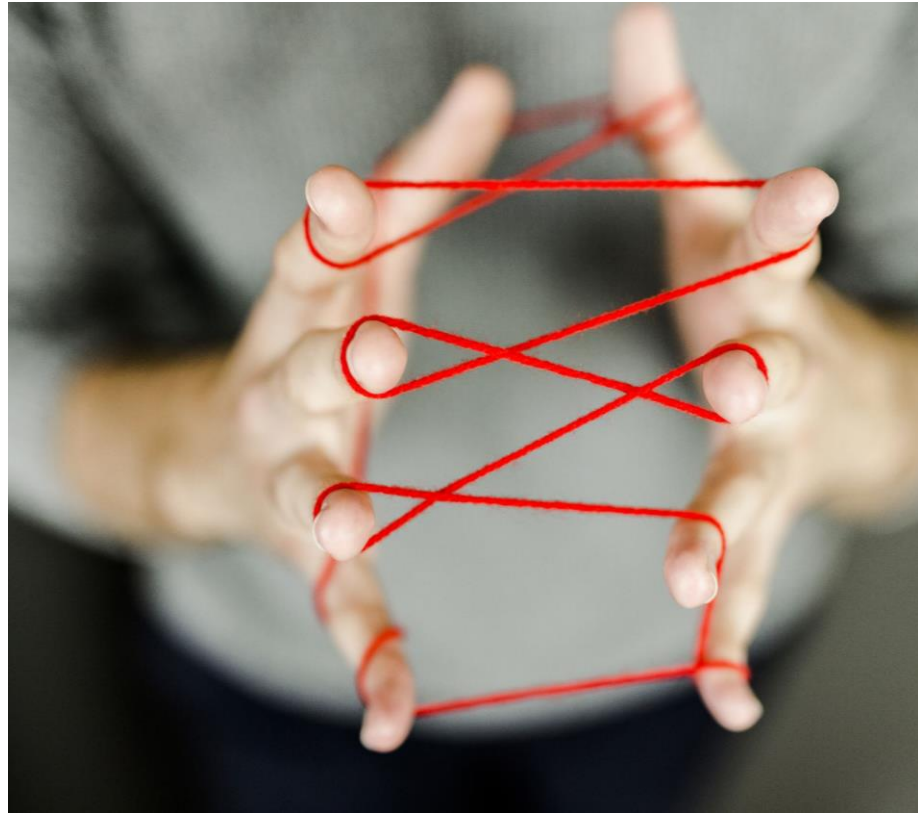

Building Relationships

What does this look like?



- Personalized conversations and comments
 - Learn their names or allow students to create "call signs" based on interests
 - Learn which extracurricular activities they participate in.
 - Attend a game, drama play, or show up to a fundraiser
 - Learn about their future plans/goals
 - These may not be aviation related
 - Oreo Cookie Method
 - Use it!

Set Clear Expectations

- Create posters with basic information to eliminate questioning or misunderstandings.
- Example:
 - Restroom Pass Policy
 - Late Work Policy
 - Absent Work Policy
 - Avoid baskets to turn in work if possible

Establish a Behavior Management Plan

- Be prepared with specific plans for behavior issues, including consequences for poor choices.
- Try to match consequences with behaviors, so they're more meaningful for students.
 - In the heat of the moment, it can be tough to hand out a consequence.
 - Enforce the consequence without any emotion.

Default to Compassion

- When a student shows up late.
 - “Everything OK? We missed you.”
- When a student doesn’t have their homework for the fourth time this week.
 - “Hey, is something going on that’s making it hard for you to get your work done?”
 - This is really important, and I want to make sure you’re able to do what you need to do.”
- A student asks to step out of the room to use their cell phone
 - Consider it could be for family reasons or job responsibilities

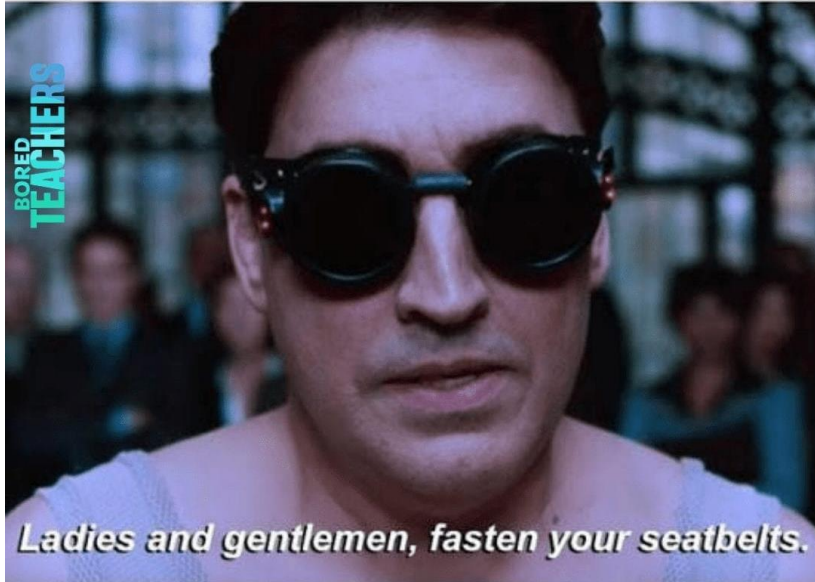

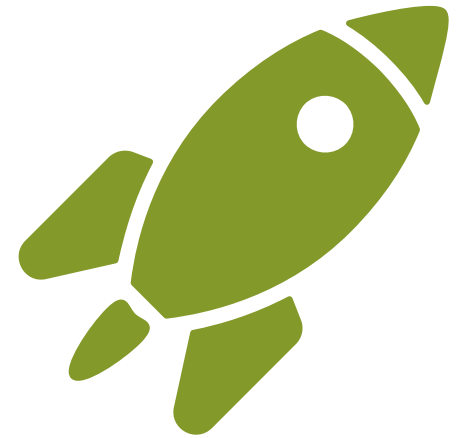
