# WOMEN PERMITTED IN DORM NOVA COUNCIL ESTABLISHED

On Thursday, September 19, a meeting was held at the poolside of the Nova Road Dormitory. This meeting concerned the posibility of forming a self-governing dormitory.

Since then a dormitory Council has been estaplished on a volunteer basis. Headed by Carl Die-fenbach, the Council has held several meetings, discussing everything from room damage complaints to female visitors. Council, comprised The of three representatives from each building, has drawn up revisions to the existing rules and will ensure, regulate and enforce their new policies under the authority of the Administration.

The first objective of the Council was to enable the residents of Dorm #2 to have female guests dur-ing specified hours. The Council decided on the hours of 6:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m. Monday through Thursday, 12:00 noon to 1:00 a.m. Friday and Sat-Thursday, 12:00 1:00 a.m. Friday urday, and 12:00 noon to 11:00 p.m. Sunday.

A guest register will be provided in the front office of the Dorm, accompanied by a Council representative during visiting hours. All female visitors must be signed in and out by their escorts. No female under the age of 18 will be allowed in any room.

The Council is acting in behalf of Dorm #2 residents and, therefore, the cooperation of these people is expected. The Coun-cil urges your support in maintaining an adult atmosphere commensurate with adult privileges.







#### Partially-baked Ideas by FWBAR

I have it on good authority that the assignment for one economics class is to set up a business on paper with attention to such details as financing, personnel, production and marketing. Undoubtedly about 85% of these businesses will be airlines, ferry services, air taxis, fi xed base operations and other projects that show a lack of imagination.

The truly enthusiastic management student will put his mind to work on more practical and feasible projects. Just by looking around the Embry-Riddle campus one can find a multitude of opportunities for really workable enterprises.

Competing with the bookstore should not be too hard. Presently the bookstore finds that it can make unreasonable mark-up on books and supplies because it is too inconvenient for a student to shop all around town for supplies.

Over head for the outlaw bookstore could be cut to a minimum by pitching a GP medium tent on the lawn to the west of the library. A meager 8- to 10 percent mark-up would be sufficient to defray costs, insure a tidy profit and still cut ERAI by about 80¢ per book. Even if profit is not as high as you would like for the first several months, the satisfaction of giving students the service they deserve at prices they can afford will be worthwhile.

Another fact of life at ERAI is that many of the students do not have cars. To these students the problem of eating at lunchtime is reduced to about three alternatives. They can wait endlessly for the bus to pick them up and deliver them to a local eatery where they will wait endlessly for a bus to get them to to class late. Or they can subject themselves to the Airport Cafe which is nearly as prohibitive to the student pocketbook as the bookstore. Or they can join the long lines in the Student Center to look longingly into the empty windows of Tioga's slot machines. Does this suggest something to anyone ?

For those budding entrepreneurs who are interested more in manufacturing than sales and service, I have designed and blueprinted a vehicle I call the Riddle-Buggy. It is a surplus T-34 tank minus 75-mm gun with a fibreglass body and pontoons installed. This, in my opinion, is the perfect transportation for the ERAI student. Our parking lot is such that you need the pontoons when it rains and the treads when it doesn't. Bids are open.

"That may not be a good idea. He's still got with preparing problems water."





therefore, this game was a real test of the eleven.




