The election committee, headed by John LeBlanc, is determining the qualifications of the candidates and will prepare an official ballot and conduct the election of Wednesday, October 16.



All of these buildings will be inter-connected by a covered walkway, so as to protect Embry-Riddle students from the weather.

Representatives of the Board of Visitors, the Faculty and the Student Government Association affirmed their interest in the drive and pledged to work to support it.





# ON PHILOSOPHY AND EDUCATION

Ah - the student philosopher. From the barrooms, bedrooms, protest meetings, and student e-lections, all have one lections, thing in common; thoughts. They believe they are able to solve the problems of the world, if only someone would listen. Escalate the war. Decelerate the bombing. Overthrow government. Legalize pot, free-love, and co-educa-End rational housing. cial discrimination. Col-lege professors teach lege professors philosophy to encourage students to pursue wisdom and search for truth through logical reasoning.

Entering freshmen, on large college campuses, are run through the gauntlet: registration, rushes from Fraternities and Sororities, football practice, classes that are and are not wanted, and, last, but not least, the bars.

After suffering through a hectic week of mass confusion, the students eventually find themselves in the bars, in states where drinking beer is legal at the age of eighteen. Their purpose in the bars is to explore the campus night life and/or to drink away the weariness and confusion. This is where the philosophy classes begin. Men and women are dancing, drinking, talking, or just gazing. One

man fights to out-drink another - a feat demanding the admiration of those who are not able to consume the minimum. A pertlooking, perhaps even naive, freshman girl is perched upon a bar stool, nervously awaiting her first approach. Eventually, the students mingle, relax, and discussions begin. Life on campus is

usually the first topic, leading into politics, war, pot, and free love. Some merely disregard the night as a "happening." Others will participate in the events seriously, usually acquainting themselves with leaders of various organizations.

In classrooms, discussion takes place and ideas are formed from the diligent work of the profes-sors. But once the stu-dents exit from classrooms, they disregard and cast aside, as burdensome bores, the teachings of Socrates, Plato and Dante. Again there are the bars and pot parties. The great philosophers of the campus expound upon their vast knowledge of everything and everyone. Those who believe these socalled leaders agree unquestioningly with complete disregard for what they have learned in the classrooms.

We might ask ourselves: Why teach philosophy at all? Why waste the time Why of the students and bore endlessly? Have pathem tience, for they may absorb only a small part of vast knowledge. All this is not lost if only one or two disregard the problems of today and seek to obwisdom offered. tain the For these men or women, it means seeking and finding others who believe in the logical way of solving problems. There is a minority of others who have been led astray by disregarding knowledge truth, but they return to reality. The reality that education is not for wrongs and for uniting supporting the insecure individuals - individuals who must associate with people whose only education is to protest and reform the world by any selfish means they are able to derive.

Perhaps, I sound bitter, and possibly, I am. You may say to yourself: who is he to pass judgement upon these people? Where has he obtained these convictions to form opinions? Yes, I do have the right, for I pass judgement upon myself. I have been with these student philosophers, at the


