WHY ARE WE HERE?

An Editorial

Let us pause and seriously ask this question of ourselves. Did we sell our homes in the States, leave our families and friends and sever all connections with the lives we were used to, only because going to Brasil appealed to us as an opportunity to take a trip? Of course not! Such a superficial reason would not make sense in view of the long range aspect of our program and its meaning to us individually. In the first place we were selected for this work because we had specific and essential qualifications and a presumed soundness of character, stability and sense of balance that made us worthy of the trust and confidence of our leader, Mr. John Paul Riddle, in our ability to assume responsibility and do a good job.

Before deciding to take this major step in our lives, we must have individually and in our own way, carefully considered and weighed all the pros and cons particularly having a bearing on what this move would mean to our families and ourselves in the future. There is no doubt that consciously or subconsciously, all of us were to some extent, either directly or indirectly, influenced by an underlying desire to aid in the war effort. After all, we are born of a free country and even though on the surface, some of us pretend or actually are persuaded by practical motives in things that we do, there is some force within us that is fundamental and inherent in serving to tip the balance scale of decision when our way of life is threatened by war, whether we choose to recognize it or not. This may be called the mob psychology of a free people at war. Let us agree, therefore, that one of the main reasons for our being here is to help Brasil do her part in the world wide struggle for freedom among all peoples and a lasting peace.

Brasil's great President Getulio Vargas and Air Minister Salgado Filho, have envisioned the future of Brasil in her contribution to the war effort and the subsequent development of her tremendous resources, on a foundation of transportation. They have recognized that one of the most effective means of transportation, adequately able to surmount all surface difficulties, is aviation. There are only about 2500 miles of railroads in the whole of Brasil, built under the greatest of difficulties and at tremendous cost. Although there are 27,000 miles of navigable rivers penetrating to remote and important sections of this vast country and which serve a vital purpose and phase of transportation, their limited possibilities and effectiveness of scope are obvious. Unquestionably, therefore, aviation in Brasil is one answer to her future. Out of 130,000,000 people in the United States, WE have the unprecedented privilege, honor and opportunity to help Brasil and its far sighted leaders bring about a full realization of this fulfillment of destiny. WE are actually playing in the biggest of big leagues and few of us realize it. How small and insignificant our individual problems seem in this light! Let's seriously reflect on this thought and conduct ourselves with a dignity and pride in our work befitting its scope. **THAT'S WHY WE ARE HERE!**

There is some indication that the housing situation, not too difficult now, may become even less

difficult in the immediate future. This view, heard in two or three estate offices, is based on the developments reference "luvas".

"Luvas" is an artifice, practiced quite generally, in recent months, to circumvent the price ceiling on rents. Reputable real estate brokers would have nothing to do with it, but individuals holding desirable leases, would transfer their lease at a price. This bonus called "Luva" might be anywhere from Cr. \$2.000,00 to \$5.000,00.

Or the "Luva" might be exacted in a more subtle way - The lease would be offered for transfer only to some one willing to buy the furniture. Usually a highly inflated valuation would be placed on the furniture so that if the deal was made the luva was obtained through the false value placed on the furniture.

Recently the Chief of Police has been carrying on a Campaign to put an end to "Luvas". Severe fines and jail sentences have been exacted with the result that luva seekers have begun to see the light. This should result in a material increase in the listings of reputable brokers.
