IT COMES HOME TO ROOST:

Like the currently popular song "It All Comes Back To Me Now", I had something brought back to me the other evening, but it wasn't so pleasant. Having dinner with a private pilot and plane owner, I became a very sympathetic listener to his tale of woe, - how private pilots were being shoved around at airports; how air transport lines had grown so rapidly that private flyers were being pushed right back into the cow pastures.

Sympathetic attention slowly became red-eared embarrassment as I began to realize that it was I who had helped develop such a feeling in this private pilot's mind. It seems that last summer this chap landed at our field to buy some text books, and, in the normal course of a busy flying day, I ordered him to move his ship off our "operations line". With no malice or aforethought, but merely a routing warning for his own and our own safety, I so alienated that pilot that he never has returned

to our field, and to this day holds a grudge against our airport.

Taking blame where blame is due, I acknowledge my error in the matter, and hope that others in the aviation industry will join me in my resolve to make every effort to give complete cooperation to the private flyers and their problems. After all, the private flyer and plane owner may become the back-bone of the aviation industry in the future. Without him in the past, we would not be as far advanced as we now are. If we should lose him, we will defeat our own purpose of making aviation not just a popular sport, but an everyday necessity.
