
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## **Spring Registration** Reflects E-RAU's Expansion

Now that the mass confus ion of registration is over, the tallies have started coming in. Although there are still a few students who haven't registed as yet, the total as of last Monday stood at just over 2,500 students. Over 1,050 of these are working for the aeronautical science degree, which is the largest group. The next largest group were the AMT students who totaled approximately 340, followed by Aeronautical Studies at nearly 300, and 'he engineering students with close to 260. Although there are still a few

Out of over 2,500 students, only 800 are living on campus, bout 410 in the dorm, and 370 in the Royal Scottish Inn. 370 in the Royal Scottish Inn. This leaves over 1,700 students living off campus. Fortunately, no temporary motel rooms needed to be used this spring. Hopefully the Racquet Club and Dorm Two Complex will be put into use next Fall or Spring, more students will be able to live directly on campus.

Moore's appointment to the organization was announced re-cently by E-RAU National Ad-visory Council Chairman Kim-ball J. Scribner. The Council represents Embry-Riddle in pro-fessional aviation circles and serves as liaison between the University and all areas of the aviation industry. Its members University and all areas of the aviation industry. Its members include many well known names in aviation, as well as national political figures including Sen. Barry Goldwater and former astronaut Thomas P. Stafford.

Moore, 63, has been an Ormond Beach resident since

1958. His wife, Patricia, moved to Ormond Beach in the early 1940's. The two were married here in 1968 and now live at 35 Dormont Drive.

Moore's intense interest in aviation began when he was a child. He became a pilot at 14. From that time, he has earned certification to fly as command pilot in literally hun-dreds of different types of aircraft, ranging from radial engine, open cockpit biplanes to modern business jets. His interest in all facets of aviation interest in all facets of aviation also has led him into aircraft design, maintenance and febri-cation, as well as airport cons-struction. In the early 1950's-he built and equipped an en-tire airport near Hutchinson, Kansas. That project served as a model for the modern day fly-in community concept.

## A Campus in Arizona?

Dec. 29, 1977

Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University's President Jack R. Hunt responding to questions and stated today:

"E-RAU has submitted a proposal and plan to the trust authorities in Prescott, Arizona, concerning re-opening of the previous Prescott College cam-pus and facilities. Details of the pus and facilities. Details of the proposal are still being discussed by principals of both parties and have not been firmly concluded as yet. The Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University Board of Trustees must approve the aggreement before final consummation of the transaction, Hunt said. If the parties do reach agreement, Hunt continued, it is the University's intetion to open the versity's intetion to open the facility under the name of Embry-Riddle Aeronautical

University Aviation Academy,
"Initially Embry-Riddle
would plan to present the Prescott Campus facilities as an
Academy, open only to boarding students - both domestic
and foreign - from the 11th
and 12th grade categories. The
curriculum would be structured
to utilize aviation as the student
study motivator while containstudy motivator while containing the professional disciplinary systems inherent in the aviation sciences such as mathemetics/ physics/oral and written skills,

"Embry-Riddle officials said that if agreement is reached in January, 1978, the 11th and 12th grade classes would open on September 5, 1978. While it is not planned to offer college level programs immediately, it is expected that college level programs would be offered within two years.

The following proons may drive in Florida without having

a Florida oriver's license:

1. Any non-resident, at least
16 years of age, who has a
valid license from his home state, unless he becomes employed or places children in public school or becomes a re-sident of Florida, at which time he must then secure a Florida driver's license within

30 days.

2. Any non-resident, attending a college in state, who has a valid license from his home state, unless he becomes employed or becomes a resident, or enters children into a public school. The word employed includes on-campus employ-

ment.
3. Study booklets and testing
for Florida driver's licenses are
handled through the Department of Highway Safety and
Motor Vehicles, Division of

Drivers Licenses at 995 Orange Avenue, Daytona Beach. Office hours are 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. - Monday through Friday. Total cost for testing and it-cense is 89:50. 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

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
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
