First of all, the process of giving a grade for a particular lesson is arrived at by a post-flight dis-cussion between the instructor and the student At least that? and the student. At least, that's way I have been doing it with my instructor. Each individual item to be graded is talked about separately. Then a grade for the lesson is based on the items on the list in the phase book

What seems to be happening (to me) is that the grade, given over the radio, will cut down on the time required to process the card through the computer. But at the time, the grade may be hastily

arrived at with no prior consi-deration to the student's opin-ion and may be unfair as a re-

Also the time spent in the Also the time spent in the airplane on the ramp is wasteful. It may take about 5 extra minutes to ramp in because of 8 more crowded frequency. That extra five minutes (1.1 hours) may not seem like much, but if it happens every time on dual flights, that amounts to a lot of wasted time and to a lot of wasted time and moneywhen taken collectively.

few Latinos and some members of the intramural football team" tried to ruin his German ice at the Octoand perform



Opinion on Parachuting

Have you ever thought about making a parachute jump? That's right, climbing out of the jump plane and let ting go of that strut out of your ting go of that strut out of your own free will? Do you think you'd be alone out there in the wind? If you think you would be, you're only right in the literal sense of the world "alone." Because, my friend, preceding you into that wind were the technical know. wind were the technical know-ledge and expertise of the world's first physicists, the calculations and data from countiess wind tunnel and test drops, and last, literally MIL-LIONS of people preceding you under exzetly the same con-ditions with identical equip-ment. Going with you into that wind are the training and knowledge that you have acquired in your pre-jump train-ing from qualified, licensed and experienced drop-zone opera-tors. Strapped to you is a proven tellable main parachute, and a second reserve chute wind were the technical know and a second reserve chute and a second reserve chute with an automatic opener. And following you and your progress into the slipstream is a highly trained and qualified jumpmaster, backed up by still more skilled ground support personnel, who help steer you to a safe landing. So even though there is nobody even though there is honough next to you, standing there waiting for the call "GO!" you do have the support of a bunch of dudes who know

what is going on

flowever - don't get the impression that you cannot be hurt, possibly seriously, engag-ing in such pursuits. The ground is very hard, and is perpetually

unforgiving to those ignorant of the laws of gravity and aero-dynamics. A student is thoroughly trained to deal aith any situation that could possibly arise during the course of his jump. To make use of this knowledge, the student must be able to keep his head must be able to keep his head with the beautiful that jump. Anyone who has successfully completed a jump course can be very proud of that fact. And, more importantly can generally consider that they have proved that their "Act was in order." So, briefly you have heard what I consider a student can expect from jumping. PLEASE—if you disagree with my views in the slightest, don't sit around and moan about "sport death," with your friends, get yourself.
