SGA Gets Ready for March 21 Elections

On Wednesday March 21st, the Student body will elect eight new officials to represent SGA officials for the upcoming year. Among these eight officers there will be five student representatives, one chief justice, one president and one vice-president.

According to the new constitution of the SGA, each student wishing to run for office must initially submit a petition with at least 25 signatures. The student must also meet the following criteria:

1. Must be a full-time student as defined by the University catalog during the three trimesters they will serve.
2. Must not be on disciplinary probation.
3. Must have and maintain a 2.00 grade point average during their term.
4. Must have at least three (3) full consecutive trimesters (including summer) remaining at E-RAU.
5. Must have been a student for at least one (1) full Trimester prior to running for office.

Note: Kidder is the student in

charge of SGA elections. He says that in addition to the above qualifications, what the SGA needs to work is "sincerely motivated people." "Everything hinges on leadership," says Kidder.

"We need all the students to come to run for office."

At the present time there are not enough candidates running to make an effective election.

Participation is greatly encouraged. If you have time and want to be a voice in Student policies, legislation, and decisions, get on the ballot. Your chances are good.

"We'll do all we can to make new participants feel as comfortable as possible with their new office," said Kidder. "There will be a transition team to smooth the way."

Since the SGA is the voice of the students, Kidder stresses participation. "Even if you don't run for a position in the SGA, elections, we need people to get involved in all the extra functions and committees of the SGA." "There is no such thing as a Student Government without students."

The elections will be run in a democratic manner in that each

student will get one vote. Votes will be cast on voting machines which were donated last year by Volusia County. The ballot machines will be set up in the U.C. and in front of the SGA office. The elections will also begin before 8:00 in the morning and last evening at 4:00. Voting turnout is encouraged.

The responsibilities of each SGA official are varied and include the following criteria:

I. The president shall:

a. be the champion of the Student Administrative Council and act as one voice in the event of a tie.

b. Delegate duties and responsibilities to members of the SGA.

c. Have authority to veto any resolution made by the SGA, and publicly express the views and recommendations of the SGA.

d. Serve as a member of the University Board of Trustees.

II. The Vice-President shall:

a. Be chairperson of the Student Union Board and cast a vote in case of a tie.

b. Delegate duties and responsibilities to members of the SGA.

c. Have the authority to veto any resolutions made by the SGA, and publicly express the views and recommendations of the SGA.

d. Delegate duties and responsibilities to members of the SGA.

Each member is allowed to vote on three unopposed offices. The term of each official is to last one year, immediately after election on the ballot will be sworn in and take office.

Requirements and responsibilities of each office are available in the newly revised SGA constitution. Copies of the revised constitution are available in the Student Government office, first floor of the U.C.

Human Sexual Awareness Seminar

The seminars were canceled because of lack of student interest. There was great disappointment from its sponsor, the Counseling Center, at various colleges, yet the facilitators, Marty Kaler and Randy Keck found only one or two students there. The seminars had a good turnout at other colleges, but here it seems people either know it all or do not wish to admit their ignorance on the topic of sexuality.

The highly qualified staff of the Counseling Center, part of Student Services, wonders how many people actually know about these seminars. Randy Keck, speaking on the fact that the AVION came out late to everyone has a case of "post-graduation" seminars why the seminars were not attended. Maybe the majority of the students believe that they are sexual, or the age of sexual awareness has been slow in introduction and is yet to overtake us. There are those that are sexually aware of themselves, but a surprising number of students are not, and, being how the seminars turned out, are still ignorant of the facts. The facts you may not know could be substituted by myths you may commonly hear, and

wrongly accept as truths.

How well is your sexual inventory? It may not be as well as you would like to think, because statistics show that many have already taken the Sex Information Test and the CO-XTOMETER relay their confusion and innocence by outwardly debating and guessing; only to get a below average grade; when the fifty-one and fifty-five questioned sets are done. Few people can recall their themselves masters of the topic of sexuality; not because they're with each individual, but it is such a broad and deep topic. The female students were not apt to have scored or guessed less accurately than the male students. "The questions are explicit and are either true or false. Here are some of the questions: the cause of impotence is almost always psychological in nature. When there is a sexual offense against a child and the child develops severe emotional problems, these problems are more likely to be a result of the upsetting attitudes of the adults who surround the child than they are from the sex offense itself.

About 80% of women infected with gonorrhea have no clinical symptoms of the disease. The average ejaculation releases 200 million spermatozoa. When a woman is sexually aroused, her clitoris becomes larger and firmer and filled with blood, just as the penis does in the case of a man. These statements are, all true; the following statements are false, try and watch out for popularly believed myths of sexuality.

Men who are impotent are usually sterile. Pictures of nude men are sexually exciting to most women. Women who have strong sex drives, come to easy climax, and are capable of multiple orgasms are nymphomaniacs. When a man is castrated (has his testicles removed), he loses his sex drive and potency immediately. There are good physical reasons why sexual intercourse ordinarily should be avoided during menstruation. A woman's virginity at the time of marriage is directly related to the success of her pregnancy. In sexual intercourse, the greatest erotic pleasure for both the man and the woman is achieved when both partners experience orgasm at the same time. A large penis makes for better female orgasm. The contractions of the womb during a woman's orgasm differ very much from those of labor. Even when pregnancy is advanced it is impossible for the woman's orgasm to start her labor. During pregnancy, the conventional coil position is not very safe. A woman's orgasm from self-stimulation is physiologically very different from her genital orgasm.

You may not agree with every thing said, but to honestly please prove, you would have to have personally tested and proven them wrong.


Just Another Comment

CAP save record continues to climb

MAXWELL AFB, Ala. - Civil Air Patrol's (CAP) list of lives saved in 1978 increased by four in late February and early March with two more. The latest save was that of a volunteer member of the only nationwide agency dedicated to air search and rescue have already succeeded 10 times in saving the life of someone in desperate need this year. A mercy mission was initiated by the Kansas CAP Wing on March 2 when the American Red Cross, requested assistance in transporting two units of blood from Wichita to Austin City. The special blood was needed for a 60-year-old woman undergoing surgery. The Kansas Wing also was credited with a save in late February after delivering blood for a patient who was suffering from excessive hemorrhaging during an operation. CAP members picked up the blood at the Augusta Municipal Airport and delivered it to Dodge City where it was taken to the hospital by a ground vehicle. Two lives were saved on February 26. Thanks to the joint efforts of the California CAP Wing and Air Force rescue units in locating a crashed C-130 aircraft. The plane, with two persons on board, was overdue on a flight from San Diego to Imperial, California. Search crews used airborne direction-finding equipment to track an ELT (emergency locator transmitter) signal north of Selton Sea, California. A CAP aircraft spotted the wreckage and an Air Force helicopter was called in to remove the victims to the Thermal Airport where Sheriff's Department personnel were waiting to deliver them to the hospital. CAP used two aircraft on the search, flying four sorties. An Air Force HC-130 aircraft also participated in the mission. Rescue and mercy missions are carried out by the unpaid, volunteer members of CAP as part of the humanitarian service mission of the Air Force's official civilian auxiliary.

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why suffer in silence?

Will it surprise you to know that a good number of students ranging from humble freshmen to hardcore seniors do not know what services and assistance the Dean of Students Office can offer to them. Most of the students I talked to saw the Dean's Office as a "punitive action department" of the University which they do not want to have anything to do with. This wrong impression from students spurred me into writing this article. A few months ago, a friend of mine was in a "jam" regarding money to go home with for a family emergency. After having knocked at the doors of some lending institutions to no avail, he came to me for advice. When I suggested the Dean of Students Office as a way-out, he said "no way, man, they can't help." Another friend of mine who was on the verge of being thrown in jail of a heavy fine over some financial issues refused obstinately to seek help from the Dean of Students Office when I suggested that avenue. His reason being, that he did not want them to know anything about his personal business as they "would make matters worse." One other student crying over his high insurance payments said he has never

heard of good students insurance discounts which the Dean of Students Office can help good students get through confirmation of the scholastic aptitude to the insurance companies. There are endless incidents I have witnessed where the students never thought of the Dean of Students Office as an avenue to seek help.

This article therefore is an objective effort to enlighten students especially, international students who hardly know where to go for help in time of personal crisis. In a recent interview with Bob Rocket, the Dean of Students, he enumerated some of the services and assistance they offer.

Among other duties, he said that his office serves to help students adjust to college life through counseling, health, financial and athletic and housing programs, whereby the office can make exceptions to the internal policies to any of these.

Coordinate and organize an internal quasi-judicial system which includes an administrative, court and conduct committee subsystems for the University.

Issue identification (I.D.) cards. Arrange and assist students during graduation.

Help students in withdrawal from and reinstatement into the school - validating enrollment, and issuing excuse permits for absence from class.

Assist students in crisis situations like family emergency, death and monetary issues.

Assist students in outside legal problems such as referring attorneys and arranging bail.

Locate students during emergency or family calls through an updated address process.

Help discerning students get good students insurance discounts by confirming their scholastic status.

These, including so many others were some of the services and assistance the Dean pointed out. He encouraged students to come in and talk to him, his associates and employees when they have problems before things get out of hand to avoid "short and long-term career goal damage". The Dean went further to say "it takes the students and the office to identify and solve the problems by trying to see through the students' needs which he or she might not alone see."

Bob Rocket, the head of the Dean of Students Office holds a masters degree in counseling from Kansas State Teachers College at Emporia. Before his appointment as the Dean, he served as a counselor for the university for many years, thus he is in the ideal position to help and advise students who have problems, if only they can call on his office for help. The Dean adds that they make decisions "in the best interest of the students and sometimes in the best interest of the University. He finally pointed out that one of his operational approaches is to "create within the employees a team effort to help students as the prime objective of the office." The effectiveness of this approach can be evidenced by the relentless efforts his associates, secretaries and other employees in his office to help the very time you show up at that office.

I had the opportunity to talk to elegant Ms. Keys Fents, secretary to the Dean. She advised "if a student has a problem in any area, on campus or otherwise, he should first come here or use a phone. If we cannot solve the problem, we can tell him where to get help. Students should not at all be afraid to come here at anytime."

Do not suffer in silence, use the services of your Dean of Students' Office. You would be surprised to know that what might seem a tough problem can be a "big big deal" if you know where to go for help.

with many aspects of sexual growth. The film touched on a person's general feelings about discussing or facing sexuality; uncomfortableness, shyness or awkwardness. The film was expertly biologically graphic - it withheld no information that you would want to know about the male or female body. It dealt with puberty and the sexual awareness of adolescence.

Secondary sex characteristics are covered: in girls it is the development of breast and with boys it is facial hair. Menstruation was examined and how most girls feel when it first happens; especially if their parent keeps them in the dark about the how, when and why of the future occurrence. The film went into pregnancy and the development of an ovum and it contains the "realities."

Another enjoyable topic in the film is masturbation and how more and more people, though sexually fulfilled, are not ashamed to admit accomplishments by their own hands. The films aren't to misinform you or depersonalize your love-making techniques or ideas. They were to show you, explicitly, the biological and physiological factors of the male and female body that interact to stimulate: puberty, menstruation and other natural physical development; but all sexual beings go through, but has been socially kept in the closet or the deep inner recesses of your mind.

Traditional rearing may be at fault; a sexually ignorant parent gives little help if fact setting a sexually growing child. The values we learned were also traditional and predetermined. Our values concerning sexuality aren't necessary to be focused around any social pattern. Since we are all individuals that would be denying a person's sexual freedom.

When asked about why wasn't their interest in the sexual awareness seminars a student says, "The sexual awareness seminars were a disaster because of the population at E-RAU - it is mostly male. So when talking about sexual awareness it becomes a big joke; the turnout has proven this to be true. Plus, the opposite sex is not allowed in your rooms after 3:00 a.m. This is intended to suppress sexual relations and could be conducive to homosexuality."

Another student states, "The irony is that Daytonia is a famous place for sexual adventure and that no one really knows anything about sex." Even though no one attended the seminar it does not mean that we are all experts. The speech is sickening."

These seminars were intended to receive sexual awareness - not sexual gratification; yet if the latter had been emphasized maybe one or two more people would have come.

Last Thursday, the corps enjoyed a presentation from the Military Airline Command (MAC) of Dover Air Force Base (AFB) in Delaware. Incidentally, the presentation was done by an Embury-Riddle Alumnae, Lt. Cornwall. A lot of questions were asked by prospective pilot-candidates on how they could have a chance into the MAC. The enthusiasm shown by the cadets would make anybody happy especially now that we keep losing our devoted pilots through retirement.

Once again I have to bow my head in grief due to the impending retirement of the Professor of Aerospace Studies (PAS) Lt. Col. John W. Maddox after 26 years of dedicated and tireless service to the Air Force. I feel like crying out "please, don't," but how loud will I cry out so that I could be heard? I feel like staging a one-man soap to revert the course of events; but where have you heard a single hand turn back the hands of the "mighty clock"? I feel like calling for help; but who will help? I feel like asking "Dear Lord, Why! Why!! Why!!! but, nay, I dare not. I let him take care of everything. I returned home to find my people preparing for battle," said the old Rhodanese warrior "over cattle, a cow, a kingdom, a loaf of bread? What does it matter? blood still flows." Now that the countries of the world are ready to spend billions of dollars to fight a lot of bread, it is heartbreaking that people who would stay to keep the balance are leaving.

Col. Maddox joined the Air Force through the Army ROTC at Florida Southern College. In June 1954 after obtaining his B.S. degree in accounting. At that time, the Army had over-recruited officers and were about to put the excess officers into inactive reserves. The ROTC cadets who were qualified and willing to fly for the Strategic Air Command (SAC) of the Air Force, who at that time was building up its bomber force, were accepted into the Air Force. He attended pilot training in the T-37 and T-38 at Graham Air Base, Florida and Vance AFB, Oklahoma. After pilot training, he remained at Vance as a T-37 instructor pilot for 1 1/2 before Vance converted to T-33 aircraft. He transitioned to the T-33

and continued as an instructor pilot until June 1966.

In 1966, Col. Maddox went to the Air Force Institute of Technology (AFIT) at Florida State University and completed his second B.S. degree in Meteorology and Mathematics in 1967. His next duty assignment took him to Moody AFB, Georgia, as a meteorologist until recalled to fly in the C-130B for the Air Weather Service in Japan. In 1968, the MAC sent him to the Air Rescue Service as an instructor in the HC-130P helicopter to upgrade C-64 pilots to the Air Rescue Service on the new HC-130P. From Japan he went to AFIT and got his Master's degree in Business Administration. There he was selected into the business honor fraternity, Beta Gamma Sigma. At completion of AFIT, in 1968, he was sent to southeast Asia (SEA) as an HC-130P air rescue pilot and worked with the helicopter and A-1E aircraft rescuing Air Force pilots behind enemy lines. After his SEA tour he was sent to the Air Force Systems Command in Los Angeles, California as a Systems Program Management staff officer on the Minuteman III multiple, independently re-entry vehicle (MEDEVAC) program. He was called for the AFROTC PAS job at E-RAU in January 1974 and was assigned here as the PAS in May 1974.

Col. Maddox has over 8,200 flying hours and has his Airline Transport Pilot (ATP) ratings. He carries from the Air Force on 30 June 1978 accumulating a very successful Air Force career of 25 dedicated years to this country. This country will ever remain grateful to patriotic souls like this who spent their very fruitful years to protect her and mankind. "Our military philosophy is to deter war through superior capability of our men."

It is a pleasure to have Col. Maddox spending 25 years doing. He is leaving with the hope of letting the younger ones take over. But when will the younger ones? Are the younger ones ready to accept the responsibility? Yes! Then come out and prove yourselves worthy of this responsibility. Should I count on you?
