
# EDITORIAL

## Your advisor has all the answers

Ask five people around Riddle where to go for help and scheduling and more than likely you will get five different answers (in addition to peculiar comments and gestures). This is known as "The Riddle Runaround" and is not unique to our school but occurs at most schools around the world.

So what can we do about it? After speaking to Dean Williams - Dean of Academic Affairs about the runaround it seems that the basic problem is the poor faculty / student advisement program.

The first person you should see about class scheduling and advisement is your advisor.

To find out who is your advisor look on your tuition bill. To usually find and talk to him is a problem. Here is where the enrollment increase has helped and led to changes. Since the beginning of the tri each division has set out to strengthen its advisement program. The ultimate goal is for each advisor to have a file for each student they advise. This way the advisor can be aware of the "whole picture" and effectively advise the student. This should ultimately lead to the end of the "runaround." While the process sounds idealistic, it can work but may take some time and sincere effort for success.

The most important thing right now is to make an effort

to see your advisor and give the system a chance to work. If you feel your advisor has not solved your problem then the next step is to see your division chairman.

Aside from the rude interruption for the people eating


dinner the situation was potentially dangerous as are all bomb scares. The caller in any false bomb scare commits a federal offense and he or they should get a higher level of values for the future.

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## Wilber's Rights and Wrongs

Can you imagine the response you would get through the phone line from the other end if you called Flight Service to file a flight plan but told them you weren't sure of your destination or the route you would take to get there? What would you think of the pilot who had an urgent need to get to St. Petersburg then plotted a course and flew to St. Augustine? After all, the names of the two places are quite similar. Is flying to the wrong destination any worse than taking off on a cross-country flight without a destination in mind?

If you think the above situations are foolish, and that no sane pilot would ever do such a thing, you're probably right. But, think for a minute about the instructor who would set out to teach a particular pilot operation without having a clear, concise picture in his mind of the primary purpose or objective for teaching that

operation. Just as fruitless is the instructor who would teach a maneuver with a clear-cut BUT mistaken objective in mind or to a flight lesson with no idea of what he was supposed to learn. These situations are just as foolish and unproductive as the ones mentioned earlier but they do occur now and then.

For example, here are some responses frequently heard from instructors when asked what the primary purpose of introducing ground reference maneuvers is: "To teach the student how to fly a traffic pattern." "To teach the student how to control the aircraft with respect to the wind." "To teach the stu-

dent how to maintain altitude and air speed while following a track over the ground."

Of course all of these elements of ground reference maneuvers are essential for safe and accurate flight involving the use of ground objectives such as take-offs and landings, but they are not the primary objective in the initial introduction of ground reference maneuvers. As stated on pages 45 and 46 of the FAA Flight Training Handbook (AC 61-21), all of the early part of the student's work has been relatively high altitude, and for the purpose of developing his technique, knowledge of maneuvers, coordination, feel, and the handling

of the aircraft in general. This has required that most of the student's attention, up to this point, be given to the actual handling of the airplane and the results of control pressure on the action and attitude of the plane with respect to itself or the horizon only.

If this is permitted to continue, the FAA says in its handbook, the student's concentration of attention will become a fixed habit, one that will seriously detract from his ease and safety as a pilot, and will be very difficult to eliminate. Therefore it is necessary as soon as he shows proficiency in the fundamental maneuvers, that he be introduced

to problems requiring outside attention on a practical application of these maneuvers and the knowledge gained.

It can be stated, therefore that the primary purpose of introducing ground reference maneuvers is to develop the DIVISION OF ATTENTION necessary to safely maintain control of the airplane while concentrating on other aspects of flight. As the student develops proficiency in this skill, he should be introduced to more and more complex aspects of controlling airplane track relative to the wind. Instructors and students who embark on the journey to ground reference maneuvers without this objective in mind may find some unnecessary frustrations

along the way, or may take some undigested short cuts that will hinder later progress in some more complex operation that requires expertise in the skill of divided attention during simultaneous operations such as ATC communications, aircraft control, and traffic pattern procedures.

Another pilot training operation that is fraught with misunderstood objectives is that of slow flight. The most often heard objectives of teaching slow flight are: "To show the student how the airplane feels when flying near the stall." "And to prepare the student for reduced airspeed operations in the traffic pattern." Slow flight does in fact do both of these and much more, but there is a more important objective in teaching slow flight. Do you know what it is? It will be discussed in the next article. Meanwhile, never leave the ground until you know where you're going unless you're not planning on coming back.

And The Future**

At age 20 life insurance coverage for \$20,000 costs \$4.00 a month, but we must realize that \$20,000 in the year 1995 just 14 years from now at an age of 34 will not be worth \$20,000 but more like \$4,000 - approximately 1/5 of the original coverage - even if married with NO children.  
Four thousand dollars isn't enough to support one person for a year, not counting funeral and other costs. And just what would happen if they have children, by now in school.  
In that case, it would not be enough for three months.

What this means is that in order to have proper life insurance you would have to get coverage for \$500,000.00 and that would cost about \$100 a month.

**Australians Evaluate  
F/A-18I**

LOS ANGELES - June 1, 1979 - An Australian Defense Department team today concluded an evaluation at Northrop of a land-based version of the U.S. Navy's F/A-18A Hornet strike fighter.  
Six tactical flights of the land-based prototype of the carrier-suitable Hornet - flown by three Royal Australian Air Force (RAAF) test pilots - highlighted the week-long evaluation.

The land-based version of the F/A-18 Hornet, officially designed by the U.S. Navy as

the F/A-18L, is one of several aircraft under consideration by the Australian Defense Department to replace its aging Mirage III fighter force. The Australian Government plans to purchase 75 new fighters.

The Australian team, including engineering, operations and equipment specialists, is headed by Air Vice Marshal H.A. Hughes, chief of material for the RAAF. The team is on a month-long tour to evaluate U.S.-designed aircraft for its advanced tactical fighter program.

Group Capt. G.G. Worth, Wing Cmdr. Bruce G. Grayson and Wing Cmdr. Robert V. Richardson of the RAAF flew the F/A-18 prototype on tactical evaluation sorties.

The land-based version of the carrier-suitable F/A-18 Hornet, designed to meet air force needs, does not carry the heavy, specialized equipment needed by the U.S. Navy to operate from aircraft carriers. For ex-



ample, the land-based version does not have the heavy-duty landing gear needed for abrupt, short landings on the decks of aircraft-carriers.

Part of Northrop's F/A-18L proposal involves a program to place high-technology business with Australian industry to offset the Australian government's procurement of fighters.

U.S. Navy/U.S. Marine Corps has plans to procure 1,377 carrier-suitable F/A-18 Hornets, including 11 test aircraft. Flight testing of the F/A-

-18 is underway at the U.S. Naval Air Test Center, Patuxent River, Maryland.

All versions of the F/A-18 are powered by twin General Electric F404 engines.

A number of air forces that do not require carrier-suitability are currently evaluating technical data on the land-based F/A-18L. These include the air forces of several NATO nations, as well as Australia and Spain.

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
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## French shoots 1 under par; Eagles lose to Stetson

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

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## Newly-created Aviation Safety Engineer position filled

Safety is the word and Aviation Safety Engineer is the newly created staff position here at E-RAU. And recently, Mr. Robert Williamson was selected to be the first engineer.

As the Aviation Safety Engineer, Mr. Williamson will deal directly with flight, ramp taxiing, refueling, maintenance, and training (use of equipment in training), operations within the Aviation Technology department. These dealings will entail formulating safety programs as well as evaluating current safety at E-RAU with the objective of continuing the excellent safety record which E-RAU has had and improving areas of safety wherever possible.

Mr. Williamson's position is one of working with everyone in Aviation Technology while at the same time being responsible directly to the Dean of Aviation Technology.

The programs, which he hopes to develop, will provide better feedback to students and instructors about accidents and incidents. And more importantly, they will be geared

towards informing the students and instructors about safety and specific ways to be safe.

In order to provide safety information to E-RAU's students and faculty, articles, bulletin boards, open forums, and pilot read files will be expanded. (Pilot read files will be placed in the flight line and will contain safety and other interesting information pertinent to pilot operations.)

Thus it can be said that the programs are to provide safety information and to communicate safety rather than to function as a policeman.

Mr. Williamson is himself a pilot with 35 years aviation experience including 26 years of service in the Navy. While in the Navy, he served in Air Traffic Control operations, anti-submarine warfare, and as a navigator on multi-engine patrol planes.

He came to E-RAU 2 years ago and held the position of flight instructor. Recently, he has been in the Flight Standards Division of the Flight Department. He then successfully competed for the Aviation Safety Engineer position.

Williamson will maintain an open door policy for all people (students and faculty) in Room 215, Ext. 446, GRW complex. Accordingly, all students are welcome to stop by and visit!

Finally, the position of aviation flight safety engineer will contribute to the overall safety of E-RAU as well as to the entire educational system.
