Whittington Takes 1979 Winston G.

The sky was dark blue turning dark grey over Daytona Speedway as the last Winston-sponsored IMSA race began. The deafening roar and flaming exhaust of the engines marked the 1st turn of many in the 250 mile race. The blue smoke from the turbo-Carreras' tires was barely visible on some parts of the recently paved track, against the grey sky. The Porsche No. 93, had been holding first place over the race since the start. It was driven by Don Whittington of Whittington Bros. race team. Second place was held alternately by Dan Whittington, No. 94 of the same team and Peter Gregg 1978 IMSA champion. At the end of the race Peter Gregg had dropped out due to mechanical failure and Don Whittington came in second behind his brother.

Possibly the key to the Whittington Bros. success was in the turbocharged engines and streamlined wheel covers. The drivers were good alright, but the cars were very fast. They lapped slower cars and quickly put space between the faster ones. The competition against these bright yellow turbo-Carreras was too intense for most of the competition.

Meanwhile, to the dismay of the Ferrari enthusiasts, Michelob Light Racing Team Ferrari 512 BB never made it to the starting grid and then Ferrari Daytona only had enough power to hold its own near 22nd place.

The crowd knew the night

Board of Trustees Raises Tuition

Mr. John A. Fidel, Executive VP-Provost, recently announced the Board of Trustees decision to increase tuition for full time students to \$1200.00 per student per trimester, beginning the Fall trimester 1980.

This will be an increase of \$150 in tuition from \$1050.00 to \$1200.00. This increase is offset by the elimination of

the Student Service Fee of \$50. The Student Service Fee is used to repay the debt on Student Center Bonds used to build the University Center. In the Fall 1980, this \$50.00 per trimester fee will become a part of the regular tuition charges and the separate Student Service Fee will be eliminated. The net increase of \$100.00

in tuition and fees represents an annual increase of 5.71% and falls well within the 7% Presidential guidelines for price increases.

This increase has been projected to give you enough time to make financial preparations to meet the cost of your education.


DEAR EDITOR:

III. The Interview

Matching Your Needs to those of the Company

It is safe to assume that the company wants you to be successful as much as you do. You may have some impressive credentials, but if they do not relate to the position you are interviewing for, the company will not want you, and you do not want the position if you will not be successful at it. So use this discussion period of the interview to help the interviewer match you to the company. Having researched the company, you should have 'some' questions. Find out what the job really is; how much responsibility? How long a training period? What is the typical day like? How much travel? What is the cost of living? Ask about things that YOU are concerned about. It is your future.

IV. The Close

The Close, the Wrap-up, whatever you call it. If you have really impressed the interviewer, you may get a fast minute selling job on the company. Here is where you should ask any final questions.

You should be given instructions on the next step. Do not expect a job offer on the spot, especially in an interview. Interview situations where many people are interviewing for few positions. The interviewer WILL know if you have been eliminated from consideration. You may get some encouragement, if you may shake yourself some anxiety, by asking about your prospects of being hired.

Do not prolong the interview. Thank the interviewer, shake hands if offered, and leave. No last minute stories or explanations at the door.

After all your preparation, you may not be offered a position. It may be because of one or more of the following com-

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The Rights And Responsibilities of Being A Tenant

Are you thinking about moving out of your off-campus residence? If you are, it is important that you understand your rights and responsibilities as a tenant. Here are brief answers to the most common questions students have when they move out of rented housing.

QUESTION: How much notice must I give my landlord that I am moving?

ANSWER: If you do not have a written lease agreement and you pay rent monthly, you must give no less than 15 days notice prior to the end of any monthly period. If you have a lease, the lease will either state that you must remain a tenant until the lease ends, or it will state specifically when and how you may break your lease early.

QUESTION: How should I give notice?

ANSWER: Do it in writing! Either mail your notice to the landlord by certified mail, or see the landlord in person and get him to sign and date a copy of the notice for you to keep.

QUESTION: What if I have a

lease, and the landlord says I can't move out early?

ANSWER: No one can force you to stay, but you may lose a great deal of money for breaking your lease obligations. Depending on the terms of the lease, you may lose your security deposit and be required to pay rent for each month left on the lease. For example, if your lease ends April 30th and you move out January 30th, you could be required to pay rent for February, March and April even though you are no longer living there.

QUESTION: May I have someone else move in to replace me without telling the landlord?

ANSWER: No. If you do not have a lease, your tenancy ends every month. Before the beginning of a new month, the landlord can deny your replacement (or you) the right to be a tenant. If you have a lease, it will probably state that subletting is not allowed or that the landlord must approve anyone who replaces you as a tenant.

QUESTION: How can I be sure to get my security deposit back?

ANSWER: Give the landlord proper notice of your intent to move out, and provide him with your forwarding address. Clean up the place so that it's at least as clean as it was when you moved in. Have a friend inspect the premises with you on the day you move out. This person can be your witness if you have to go to court to recover your deposit.

QUESTION: Does the landlord have to tell me why he is keeping my deposit?

ANSWER: Yes. Florida law requires the landlord to return your security deposit within 15 days or to give you written notice of his claim against your deposit.

QUESTION: Can my landlord throw me out whenever he wants to?

ANSWER: No. If your landlord wants to terminate your rental agreement (evict you), he must first give you written notice of why he wants you out. Depending on the situation, this notice must give you at least 3 days to correct the problem (for instance, pay your overdue rent), or to move out voluntarily. Then the landlord

must file suit for eviction in Small Claims Court. You have 5 days to respond in writing to the court if you want the court to decide whether or not you have a right to remain. If you do not write to the court, or if the court decides against you, the sheriff will then physically evict you in about 24 hours.

QUESTION: Where can I go for more help with problems like these?

ANSWER: The Off-Campus Housing Office is available to help you. Brochures outlining Florida landlord-tenant law and Small Claims Court procedures are available free of charge. Although he cannot give specific legal advice, the Off Campus Housing Coordinator can help you identify the laws and rules that apply to your problem and can help you understand your situation more clearly. He can also help you solve your own problem by counseling you on how to talk with your landlord in a spirit of compromise and cooperation.

The increase in the meal plan will have some positive results also. You will now be permitted to use more than one punch per meal, however, you cannot make bulk purchases (i.e. 10 milks, 13 ice creams), and you will not be permitted more than one punch each pass through the lines.

As one final note there will be openings on the food service committee for the Spring term, all interested students should either leave a note in the SGA office or Box 4225.

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
