SGA President Resigns

Student Government Association President Dave Welpert resigned Thursday, Jan. 10th at the first Student Administrative Council meeting of the trimester. Dave said his reason for resigning were mainly academic.

Welpert's replacement, Vice President Clinton Weekes, was then sworn into office on Thursday after the meeting. Weekes has served in the Student Government Association since 1978 and has been an active participant on several committees including Academic Standards and Procedures.

Weekes' replacement for the office of vice-president has not been determined yet.

"The next vice-president will be determined from nominations within the present SAC and will require a majority vote of representatives," says Weekes.

When asked what he plans to do in his new office, Weekes replied, "I hope to smooth out the operation of the organization to branch out and benefit the entire student body as opposed to solving internal conflicts."

Clinton Weekes' enthusiasm and hard work has been seen by many who have worked with him, and a welcome is given to Clinton in his new office, and good luck.

A&P Testing More Stringent

There has been a change in Embry-Riddle policy on testing for maintenance personnel. The change is for those seeking the Airframe and Powerplant licenses. Instead of spending four to five hours in Orals and Practicals (O&P), applicants will now have to spend from sixteen to twenty hours in testing. With the additional O&P time there will be an added \$100 fee to cover the costs. This policy change must be implemented immediately.

Academic Probation Rules Changed

New changes in the system for Academic Probation have been announced by the Dean of ACADEMIC AFFAIRS' office. The new changes are hoped to increase the grade point averages of those students who find themselves in trouble. These changes were made as an addendum to the catalog, they are:

When a Cumulative GPA drops below 2.0 for the time, the student is placed on Academic Warning. When on Academic Warning, you are limited to 7.5 credit hours and no flight courses may be taken. Also at this time, the student is assigned to a special academic advisor. The special academic advisor is there to help the student

with his/her problems and to find out what the problems are and try to correct them.

The second consecutive trimester the student's cum GPA is below 2.0, the student is then placed on Academic-Probation. While on Academic Probation, the student is limited to 12 credit hours and no flight course. At this time also the

student must repeat and make all courses for which he has received a grade of D or F.

The third consecutive trimester the student's cum GPA is below 2.0, the student is eligible for dismissal from the University. Last year approximately 190 students were dismissed from E-RAU for academic deficiencies.

The new program is not meant to penalize students but to help them in getting their diploma with minimum problems during their stay here at E-RAU. It is hoped that those students placed on this program for whatever reason will take full advantage of the program and get out of their predicament.

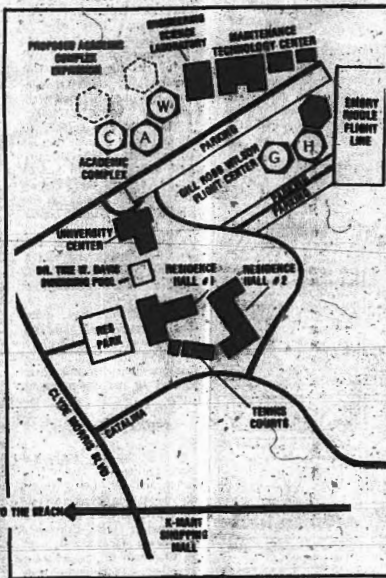
Campus Continues to Grow

Over the Christmas break here, construction began on the two new buildings behind the academic complex. The two buildings, or pods as they are sometimes called, are expected to be completed August 15 of this year. If they are finished, they will be put into immediate use in the Fall '80 trimester.

The Construction Co. came highly recommended and the contract was signed late in the trimester. The cost of the two new pods, including a parking lot, is in the neighborhood of 1.1 million dollars. About one-half of this cost is to be picked up by the development offices. The other one-half is hoped to be accumulated by donations and gifts. The campaign for these funds will be pointed toward the aviation industry, such as the aircraft manufacturers. Any balance will be made up by a mortgage taken out by the school.

The two pods would have a total of 19 new classrooms. These 19 rooms will be able to accommodate approximately 5,000 students. The classrooms would be used for any of the



existing subjects. They are not specified for certain courses and as the need arises they will be used for any course needing the space.

These two new buildings are only one of the many new campus expansion projects that are being proposed in the next few years here at E-RAU.

Indepth Changes Announced in Aviation Tech.

Indepth changes have been announced for the College of Aviation Technology promoting the E-RAU faculty, to new positions to help improve services for the increased student population. These promotions were announced in a recent interview with Dr. DiGirolamo.

Dr. DiGirolamo was named to his responsibilities by becoming the new Associate Dean of Aviation Technology. Prior to his promotion, he served as both Department and Program Chairman for one year in Aeronautical Science. The new job involves assisting in the management of the College of Aviation Technology, with Dean Dily.

Also mentioned in the changes for the College of Aviation Tech was the addition of an Aviation Safety Engineer. Bob Williamson, former Flight Instructor here is presently serving in this safety capacity. His job includes: Developing and maintaining a formal aviation safety program of E-RAU.

The promotions continue with the announcement of the New Division Chairman for Aeronautical Science, Dr. Bishop Blackwell. Dr. Blackwell has taught here for the past three years in Air Science, and now will manage the activities of the Aeronautical Science faculty. Blackwell will also be responsible for the administrative side including budgets, instructor evaluations. Before coming to E-RAU, Dr. Blackwell served twenty years in the Navy as flight officer, he has also held the job as Director of Research at Pasco Hernandez Community College. He has also completed his Doctoral at the University of Florida in Education.

The new Program Chairman for Aeronautical Science is Bill Gruber, who has taught here at E-RAU for the past two years. Gruber will be responsible for the academic quality of the degree program in Aeronautical Science. He is involved with course development, textbook selection, and assuring that

the program keeps among the highest standards. Gruber said that by maintaining the teaching duties, he will be more in touch with what the students need in the program. Also by maintaining a teaching position he will be better able to monitor the activities and see where the program needs improvement.

Also incorporated in the new organization is the creation of two new divisions which are Avionics Technology and Aviation Education Design.

Mr. James Ruddell will be the Program Chairman for Avionics. The separation of the Avionics was caused by the unprecedented growth within the field here at E-RAU.

Dr. Tom Connolly was named new Director Chairman of the Aviation Education Design. Dr. Connolly will handle the work involved with flight research in the development of simulator programs. The programs are hoped to reduce flight hours in the aircraft and

Referendum Coming For Student Body

Due to Constitutional illegality there will be a REFERENDUM VOTE on the 21st, 22nd of January to accept or reject the following changes in the current constitution of the SGA.

ARTICLE IV, Section 3, Item 3, Reads as follows: All Student Government Association officials shall meet the following criteria. Must have at least a 2.50 Cumulative Grade Point Average to run for elective office, and maintain a minimum of 2.00 grade point average during the term of office. And AMENDED to

read as:

Must have at least a 2.50 cumulative grade point average or be reviewed and accepted by an elections committee as per by-laws Article IV, Sec. 3, Para. C to run for elective office, and maintain a minimum of a 2.00 cumulative grade point average during the term of office.

The Review Committee will be comprised of two (2) university officials and two (2) SAC members. It is imperative that this now be supervised so members will be able to run and be effective in their administration.

Riddle Cancels Bail Bonding

The purpose of this article is to enhance the emergency care of the ill or injured student on campus. Please read on to discover how you might be of assistance to fellow students. The Riddle nurse wants to be notified of any incident on campus. We are trained to give emergency care until an ambulance arrives or make a determination to summon an ambulance.

At least one of the nurses is always on duty in the Health Service Department during office hours. This measure is to insure immediate care if a life-threatening situation should arise in this department. Therefore, if only ONE nurse is present in the department she must remain during any crisis out of the department. This continuity and security is maintained for the student's well-being.

Your help is required to maintain good student care. If you witness an illness/injury please call the Health Service and STAY with the incapacitated student. Staying on the scene is of the utmost importance. Making a diagnosis is 90% physical exam and history. Remember, the "victim" (student) may be too "overwhelmed" to give accurate information!

We welcome any questions or comments concerning this situation. Hopefully this article will instill a sense of responsibility toward other members of the student community.

RIDDLE COOP STUDENTS IMPORTANT TO OLYMPICS

Although our school has no athletes in the Olympics, two students who started their jobs through Co-Op, are working at the Anegandike Airport near Lake Placid, New York. The two students, Dana Basset and Marisa Coccia, were flown to New York by Pan-America Corporation, for whom they work. They are two of a staff of eight. The entire staff consists of Co-Op students around the nation. They are responsible for the safe operation of flights to and from the Airport.

New Dana and Marisa's jobs

are important for the Olympics in the sense that most of the Athletes will be arriving by plane to the games. They will be responsible for security and registrations of planes and passengers. Also they are prepared to help in any emergency that may arise. They have attended a five day school at McArthur Island Airport in New York on Crash and Fire rescue. If there is any snow up yonder, they will help in removing it off the runways. They are a big help in running the airport. In many instances, in fact; these students are running the airport.

To picture what the airport is like compare it to Daytona Regional. Anegandike has two runways while Daytona has three. Of these two runways, only one will be operational; the other will be used for parking. Daytona has 30,000 take-offs and landings per month while the Anegandike will have 50,000 take-offs and landings in the month of the Olympic games. This will make it one of the busiest airports in the nation for that time. These students will have quite a challenge before them during the games, an they should be commended for their work.

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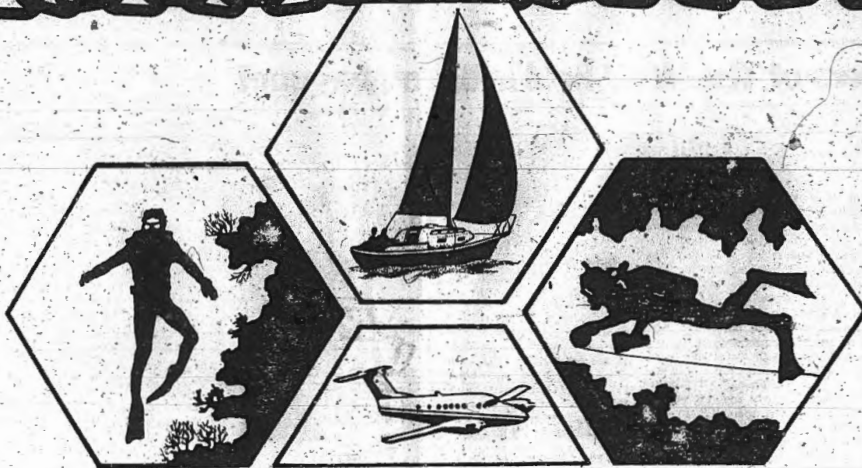
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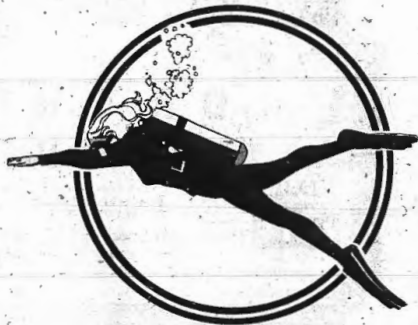
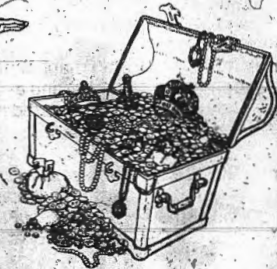


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Wilbers' Rights and Wrongs

Winter has arrived! Such an announcement in aviation circles in places like Duluth, Minnesota or Des Moines, Iowa would herald considerable excitement and preparation activity. Words like deicers, anticers, preheaters, frozen slush, sleet, freezing rain, and snow would be added to our daily vocabulary - not to mention the expletives normally used with these conditions. Here in Daytona Beach, Florida, however, we hardly notice that winter has arrived. The transition is so subtle in fact that we may be prone to overlook some pretty important considerations that even the mild Florida winter could impose on our flying safety.

Frost, for example, is an insidious hazard to intrepid aviators. It doesn't look even slightly dangerous with its soft, lily-white casting gracing all the upper surfaces of the plane. The trouble is no one can say with certain assurance how much is too much until the airplane stalls and spins passing through ground-effect in an overweight condition with drastically reduced lift. Frost in Florida? You bet your BMEP. In Daytona Beach we can expect frost a few mornings at least. It usually melts away by mid-morning but the dawn patrol will have to be concerned about it on those infrequent mornings when it occurs. Our line service will have deicing equipment available and will provide that service when necessary. Short delays may be caused on frosty mornings while this service is being accomplished, but in no case should you take off with frost on your airplane.

While we seldom have freezing temperatures during the hours of our flight operations at ground level, there are times more frequent that you may realize that the freezing level dips down into the flight altitudes we use for our IFR operations. Because this condition does not occur with regularity, we may be inclined to forget to check the freezing level as part of our IFR preflight planning. Of course, freezing level and IFR weather conditions spell ICE in anybody's language. Not only are the airplanes we fly not equipped or certified to fly in icing conditions, but it's a condition that may be harmful to your health. So before winter gets one day older should add to your IFR preflight checklist "check the freezing level."

Due to the operating requirements of aviation fuel, the refining process and additives used do not include properties that enhance starting the engine as is the case with automotive fuels. Airplane engines, therefore, are temperamental about starting even when conditions are ideal. Throw in some cold weather, a weak battery, and some improper or inadequate priming techniques and you have all the ingredients for a dead battery, a disappointed pilot, and a dreary line mechanic or the potential for an engine fire. The remedy for all these maladies can be found in the Pilots Operating Handbook or Owner's Manual for the airplane you fly. Now is the time to review the normal and the cold weather starting procedures spelled out in these manuals. Just because you've been starting the airplane a certain way

all along and haven't had any special problems, don't assume you're using correct procedures. You may have just been lucky enough to always get an aircraft that was warmed up for you until now.

One more problem with Florida flying in winter that should be given serious consideration is the balmy daytime temperatures that are often followed by damp bone chilling nights. We carry "Survival Kits" with all sorts of goodies to get us through that interval from forced landing to rescue should that interval extend over more than a few hours, but many of us go flying in the afternoon in shirt-sleeves minus the easiest piece of survival gear we could possibly carry - a warm jacket or sweater. You need to spend only an hour or so in a Florida swamp with the temperatures hovering near freezing at 2 a.m. in those shirt-sleeves that were so comfortable at 4 p.m. to learn the debilitating effect on your morale that freezing to death can have.

For those of you who may be planning on doing some real winter flying in those fun places like Buffalo, New York or Detroit, Michigan, you should consult FAA Advisory Circular 91-13B. A copy is available for reference in the safety office, Room D-215.

IS WEIGHT A HEAVY ISSUE FOR YOU?

Millions of Americans have a problem with their weight. The truth is, though, that weight itself is not the main concern. Weight effects nearly every aspect of someone's life. In particular, one's self concept frequently takes the brunt of the attacks from others as well as from self. For many, it is the area where we are most vulnerable. We are "our own worst enemies."

Weight effects how we feel about ourselves, how we act with others, and how well we work and play in our private or professional lives. If your job requires your being physically healthy, excessive weight might result in your being fired or laid off. Even more critical, weight might be the determining factor in whether or not you're hired for a new position.

In the past, programs have failed to recognize the implications of being overweight. Every action and interaction can be affected by your weight problem. One key then, looking at all many aspects possible.

Bill Herten, a counselor in the Center for Human De-

velopment, (formerly the Counseling Center), has been working with overweight people for the past two-and-a-half years in the area of weight management and control. Basically, the approach taken is an integration of concepts touching in the physical, mental and nutritional aspects of being overweight. No program can cover everything, but this is one of the most thorough programs to be found.

Two groups are being formed on E-RAU Daytona Beach campus - both will be led by Bill - who himself is a "former fatty". The groups will be offered on Tuesdays from 5-7 p.m. for students and Thursdays from 5:15 - 7:15 for staff and faculty; a total of ten weeks. Commitment to all meetings is essential, particularly as enrollment is limited. Cost to the E-RAU community is free.

ately by Embry-Riddle as a result of an order by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA).

The FAA has just recently finished publishing all the written tests for public use. They feel that this makes it much easier for a person to read, memorize and pass the written tests. To offset this, the FAA felt that there should be an increase in the material to be covered by the O&P's.

Mr. Olson, Chairman of the Maintenance College, said of the \$100 fee: "It is optional. They [the students] do not have to get their license to receive permission from the FAA to go to a self-examining program. This would mean that a student would receive his license from the FAA upon course completion here at Embry-Riddle. If the school were to become self-examining, the \$100 fee would be eliminated.

Students who do not wish to pay the \$100 fee to Embry-Riddle's Designated Maintenance Examiners (DME's) have the option to go to any DME in the country. This would not necessarily reduce the cost of paying an examiner, however because the time DME's must spend on O&P's has increased across the country. This is a change in FAA policy, not only in Embry-Riddle procedures.

are based on those that are used by the airlines. It is hopeful the program will grow with the University as the flight department grows. A test program was run last trimester and the results were very encouraging with reductions in flight time to solo and possible reductions in cost. It is eventually hoped that these cost reductions in the future will be passed on to the flight students.

With the encouraging changes in the Aviation Technology program it is hoped that the students will benefit even more in the increased services now offered.

FINANCIAL AID WORKSHOP

Did you know that almost 90% of our students are eligible for some type of financial aid, either in the form of grants (which is FREE money), or loans (which must be repaid AFTER graduation). Now is the time to apply for the 1980-81 year. We will be holding a workshop on Tuesday, Jan. 22 in the Riddle Theater at 7 p.m. to explain the 1980-81 Financial Aid Forms, the different programs and their eligibility requirements and answer your questions. We'll try to take the mystery out of financial aid. In 1978-79, 603 students received \$586,000 in Basic Grants. In 1979-80, we expect 1,100 to qualify for over \$1,500,000, and 1980-81 should set record highs. Find out how to apply for this and other programs at the workshop.

GUARANTEED STUDENTS LOANS FOR SUMMER 1980

1. If you plan to apply for a summer loan, you should do so by March 1, 1980. Tuition deferments will be recommended only if loan applications are in our office by that date.
2. All Florida Federal loan applications must be completed, signed and notarized before April 5. Florida Federal will not accept loan applications submitted after that date. There will be NO EXCEPTIONS. High school transcripts must accompany all freshman loan applications. Please follow all instructions on the direction sheet so there will be no delays.
3. All Connecticut students who plan to apply for a summer loan must submit the application for the SUMMER TERM ONLY. The loan term dates must read May 5, 1980 to August 16, 1980.

FLORIDA TUITION VOUCHER

If you have graduated from a Florida high school, have spent the last 24 months in Florida and are considered a freshman, you could qualify for the Florida Tuition Voucher of \$750 per year. This money DOES NOT have to be repaid, and is not based on financial need. See Pamela for more details if you have not already applied this year.

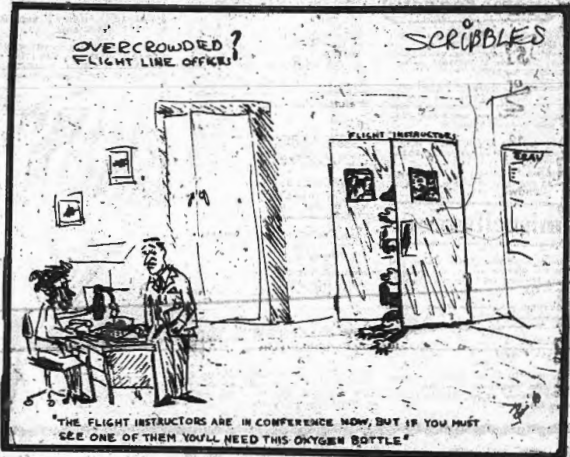

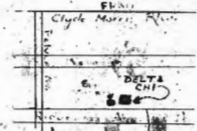
