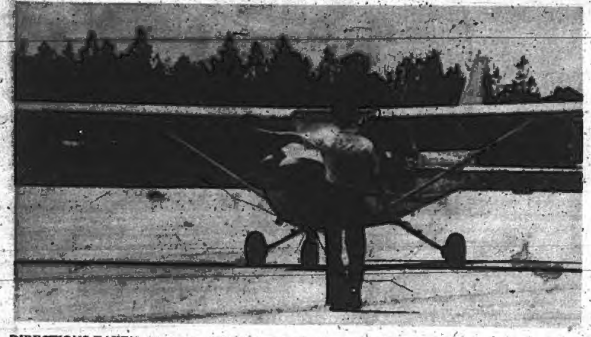
Second, the offices of the Aeronautical Science Division Chairman, Program Chairman, and the Secretary have all been

In addition, several staff members are transitioning into new full and part-time positions: Mr. Richard Bryant will be directing a new Simulator Program for Dr. Connolly of the Flight Division and Mr. Earl Friesel will be taking over the position of Aviation Safety Engineer.

Finally, implementation of a new and, we hope, more effective advisor program will begin in the Fall '80 Trimester. Among changes made in this program are: (1) the requirement for each student to work with his/her advisor in develop-



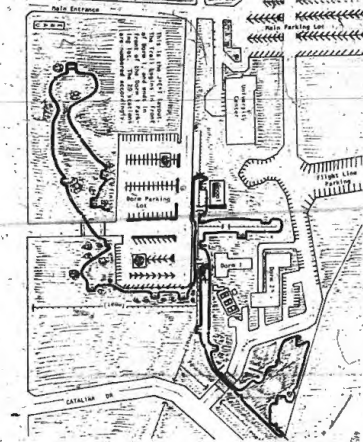

ing their schedule of classes. It will be a joint responsibility of student and advisor to insure that prerequisites and corequisites are met, conflicts resolved, etc. (2) the advisor will be signing each of his advisee's registration form and (3) the addi-

tion of contract flight instructors into the advisement program. This action will reduce each instructor's advising load to a number which will allow more effective advisement.

Division Understands Difficulties Exist For Beginning Flight Students

The Flight Division would like to take this opportunity to welcome new and returning students to our campus. We hope you had an enjoyable summer and are looking forward to the coming trimester.

Since many of you will be involved in flight training, we would like to explain some of the areas that will help make your training more enjoyable and assure a smooth start in your flight course.

Over the next several weeks you will be exposed to many new and seemingly endless rules, regulations and instructions. You will be guided through the maze of material by your flight instructor. Your instructor will be a highly skilled, trained professional who is familiar with all the problems and aspects of flight training.

His/She understands that the beginning student has special difficulties, and is expected to help you through the few "rough spots". It is extremely important that you and your instructor maintain constant and open lines of communication.

Flight students should always attempt to make contact with your instructor on a daily basis. He may have important information for you regarding scheduling, reading assignments or that extra bit of information that will assist you with upcoming flights.

Your flight instructor will require that you purchase a

number of required materials prior to starting your flight course. One of these items is the "Flight Operations Manual". This publication presents extremely important policy and regulatory information that must be adhered to, by every flight student.

It is very important that you study this manual and continuously review it throughout your training. You will be supplied with revisions to the manual and it is your responsibility to assure that it is kept up to date.

Your training goal or objective is to become a professional pilot. Our basic flight program is set up to train you to meet Federal Aviation Regulation requirements for the Commercial Pilot Certificate with an Instrument Rating. **Difficulties See Page 3**

CREDIT HOUR OVERLOAD

Students desiring to register for more than 18 credit hours per trimester should give this careful consideration and be certain that you can handle the extra load. You MUST have a cumulative grade point average of at least 3.0.

If you do, you should see your Degree Program Chairman and take along your complete academic record. He will review your academic records and reasons for your request, and if he concurs, will recommend approval. Final approval must come from the Dean of the College.

On Warning, or Probation?

Take Care When Registering

Charles S. Williams, Dean of Academic Affairs, would like for students who are on Academic Warning or Probation to be especially aware of certain procedures that they must follow in order to complete their registration.

Students on Warning or Probation must see their Academic Advisor before registering. Your advisor may be contacted through your Program Chairman's secretary, and you should see him for any academic problems or advice. If he is unavailable, your Program Chairman will be glad to assist you.

YOU MUST HAVE THE SIGNATURE OF YOUR PROGRAM CHAIRMAN TO REGISTER!

When students encounter academic difficulty and their Cumulative Grade Point Average drops below a 2.00, they will be placed on Academic Warning. They will be required to repeat failed courses and limit their course load to 15 hours.

A Cumulative Grade Point Average below 2.00 for a second consecutive trimester will result in a student being placed on Academic Probation. These students must limit their course load to 12 hours and repeat all courses in which D's or F's have been made.

A third consecutive trimester

The purpose of Fit-Trail, our new physical fitness program, is to promote physical fitness on our Daytona Beach Campus.

Once you have completed the exercise course, you will have exercised every part of your body. The course is not an obstacle course or a game, but it can provide a lot of fun.

Fit-Trail can be used at any time, dawn to dusk, and costs nothing to use. It is designed for the student, jogger or athlete. The user merely starts at the instruction sign at the

beginning of the course in front of Dorm 1, and walks, jogs, at his choice! from station to station performing the exercises illustrated at each station. The user is free to choose his own pace and to do any or all of the exercises as he sees fit. The course ends on the other side of the Dorm 1 parking lot, at station 20, the last one.

The concept of the Fit-Trail course has been developed by physical fitness specialists over a period of 10 years. Presently, several bundled courses are in existence in

Europe, with numerous courses being built throughout the United States.

Cheating at Embury-Riddle will not be tolerated. All students should be aware that if they are found guilty of cheating, there is a very good chance that they will be suspended or expelled from the University. We want students to learn the high ideals and integrity that is expected of them as a part of the aviation industry.

with a Cumulative Grade Point Average of less than 2.00 will result in a student being eligible for dismissal from the University. Failure to voluntarily comply with these regulations will result in administrative action, automatically dropping the student from inappropriate courses following the add period, which could result in some students having their registrations cut considerably or completely.

Avionics Program Sets Standards For Courses

New students enrolled in the various E-RAU degrees which include Avionics (EL & AV) courses can receive help, additional information or advisement from any of the avionics faculty. Our offices are located in the Engineering building. The receptionist/secretary, Mary Winhoven, can help in scheduling appointment times. If she is not available, please feel free to contact Mr. Ruddell, the Avionics Program and Division Chairman.

It is extremely important that avionics type students maintain continuous contact with their Faculty Advisors. The sequence of electronic and avionics courses is highly structured and careful planning of trimester course schedules is imperative if one intends to complete the program within the five trimester timeframe.

Maintenance Technology course should develop their trimester schedules around the EL and AV courses. In most trimesters only one section of each EL/AV course is offered whereas Maintenance Technology offers several sections. Thus, more flexibility is built into the AMT courses. We have none.

One additional comment should be made concerning the Avionics Program and it is one that should be remembered at all times. The theory portion of each course is structured along the lines of an academic type course. This fact dictates that considerable time must be devoted by the student to outside study and reading. All too often students enter the program with the misconception that it is structured as a vocational curriculum. **Avionics Program**

Both staffs have the opportunity to get directed study credits (after taking the Journalism course given here) in various publications related subjects (see Jean in Student Publications for further information).

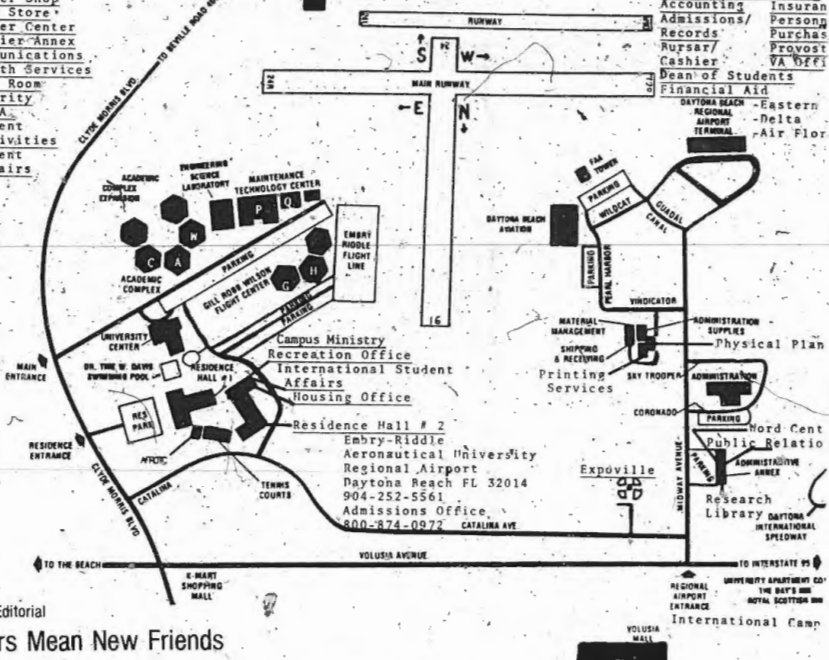

Tools, Time And Attendance Necessary

The Aviation Maintenance Technology Division welcomes you to the exciting and challenging world of aviation maintenance. At the same time we would like to assist you with any problems and reduce the hassle you may experience in the next few days.

The AMT department is located in the John Goldman Aviation Maintenance Technology Center with the Administration office in "P" Bldg. Bob Olson is the Division Chairman and Fred Mirgle is "The Program" Chairman.

Each of you will be assigned an advisor, who is a faculty member, at Division Orientation. This advisor is your key to problem solving. Get to know him and let him help you. You'll be glad you did!

The AMT Program is offered in two parts each trimester, which we call A & B. Half of your classes for the trimester will be taken in "A" and the other half in "B". By the way, half of your classmates are taking the other half, which makes more shops and equipment available for everyone.

You can tell if it's "A" term class by the odd (1,3,5, etc.) number sections and "B" term classes by the even (2,4,6,8) numbered sections.

When you register, you will be in a "block program". You take the "General" block first, followed by Basic Airframe, Advanced Airframe, Basic Powerplant and finally, Advanced Powerplant.

You need your own tools for the AMT Program. The General course has a required list which you can purchase through the school. These are Craftsman tools (Sears Roebuck) at a price you cannot beat. See John Boyles in the AMT Tool Room for details. Also, see John on locker rental.

You will be required to have books in your classes. You will receive a book list at orientation and you should buy the package as soon as possible - EXCEPT workbooks! Wait until you have your schedule and then only buy the workbooks needed for "A" term of the trimester.

Our Major Obligation Is Not To Mistake Slogans For Solutions

An introduction to anything is by its very nature an awkward and sometimes difficult task. The reason that this is so is because the primary purpose of an introduction is not to acquaint you with something, but more to have you accept, support, and buy into the item which is being introduced.

Take, for example, the previews of coming attractions at the movies. In theory, in order to introduce you to a new movie, it would be enough to flash (for example) The Shining - by Stanley Kubrick, showing July 2 - 14. In reality, however, mystery music is played and blood pouring out of an elevator door is shown in the attempt to get you to buy into the movie.

In many instances, the mere fact that something is new enticement for you to buy into an item. How often are the phrases, "new improved formula", "new 1980 model", or "a new concept in..." presented to you by admen introducing you to something? It is often times enough to make one believe that novelty

is an asset in and of itself. You can get the "B" term workbooks just before the switchover.

The dress requirement for the AMT program is basically the same as the rest of the University, except SAFETY governs AMT's rules. Shoes (not clogs), shirts (no tank tops), long trousers (no shorts), are required in all shops. Sorry, but if you do not dress properly, the instructor cannot let you in the shop.

Smoking is allowed only in designated areas - again safety and/or environmental reasons. (Please don't throw cigarette butts on the grounds - place in appropriate containers).

The attendance rules for AMT are governed by FAA regulations. All missed time must be made up. Tardiness counts as a partial absence and after 15% of a class has been missed, the student fails the course. Get into the habit immediately of being on time (aviation is a time-orientated industry) and don't miss class.

You may have other questions? Ask your advisor, if he is not available come to the Administrative office and get help. Please, do not ignore the problem and hope it goes away because it won't. The staff and faculty of AMT are here to

help you. Please let us! Again, welcome to the wonderful world of aviation maintenance.

This often results in higher than normal attrition rates. More than adequate "hands on" type vocational training is provided on the lab portion of each course and students are well prepared to enter the Avionics Industry upon graduation, but to do so requires considerable effort in the self-educational process associated with the theory courses.

The avionics industry is perhaps the most dynamic of all aviation industries and graduates find it necessary to constantly self-educate themselves as new circuit and system techniques are incorporated in avionics systems. The Avionics Program is designed to aid students in developing self-educational habits.

This characteristic of E-RAU educated Avionics Technicians coupled with their extensive hands on training has proven to be the key to successful careers in the industry after graduation.

Federal Regulations require that in order to exercise the privileges of your Commercial Certificate, you must possess a current second class medical certificate.

The University requires that ALL flight students maintain at least a current second class medical certificate. In addition, if you do not possess a Private Pilot Certificate you must have a Student Pilot certificate. Medical certificates and Student Pilot certificates can be obtained through several area physicians.

The health service office has a list of physicians who will be happy to set up an appointment for you. Remember, you will not fly without at least a current Second Class Medical Certificate.

Because of the unpredictability of Florida weather, as well as the many other possible delays that can occur during flight training, it is necessary to extend the flight term one week after the end of the academic trimester. The Fall flight trimester ends on December 19th. It is in your best interest that you make your transportation reservations for the trimester break on or after the 19th of December. Incomplete flight students who depart prior to the 19th will be considered absent without permission and may be withdrawn from their flight course.

During registration, you will be given a card indicating the times and date you are to report to the GRW complex for instructor assignment and check-in. It is imperative that you arrive at your assigned time. Students who fail to check-in will have their flight reservation cancelled. Be prepared to begin your flight course that day. Your instructor will give you assignments to prepare for your first activity.

We understand that questions or problems may arise during your training. Your flight instructor should be able to handle most of the situations as they come up. However, if you have a question or problem that your instructor has been unable to handle to your satisfaction, you may wish to discuss the problem with your flight supervisor. His door is always open and he is there to serve you. He is very familiar with most aspects of University policy and an expert on Flight Division rules and regulations.

It is hoped that if you abide by all the necessary instructions and regulations issued by your instructor and the Flight Division, your training with us will not only be highly effective, but also enjoyable.

Two Items Of Interest Warrant Your Attention

The Department of International Student Affairs wants to direct your attention to two areas of information that apply only to International Students.

HEALTH CARE

The University requires that each International Student secure an insurance policy payable in the United States that provides adequate coverage for emergencies.

Sponsored students are sometimes enrolled in a special insurance plan that offers full coverage. Students who are not otherwise covered by insurance must purchase a student policy at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University.

Health care (including medical treatment, eye examinations, eyeglasses, or dental work) is much more expensive

in the United States than in most other countries. When illness or injury necessitates hospitalization, the patient's expenses may total many hundreds or even thousands of dollars, thus it is imperative to have financial resources to cover the costs of possible accidents or illnesses.

IMMIGRATION REQUIREMENTS

1. Keep your passport valid.
2. Be certain your I-94 is valid. DO NOT let this form expire. It is your permission to stay in the United States.
3. Maintain full-time student status. This means that you must enroll for the complete 12 credits each term you are at the University. Graduate students may take

fewer credit hours with the permission of their academic advisor.

4. Maintain a passing grade point average of 2.0 for undergraduates and 3.0 for graduate students for each term.
5. When transferring from one university or college to another, you MUST obtain prior permission from Immigration and you should apply BEFORE you transfer.
6. Obtain an I-20 whenever you travel outside of the United States and plan to return.
7. DO NOT work illegally!
8. If you are unsure of your status ASK at the Department of International Student Affairs.

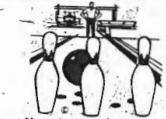

Inspect The Premises Before Moving -Use The Inspection Form

Each year, more than 2,000 students return to the Daytona area in August and involve themselves in a sometimes frantic search for accommodations in the community. During the rush to get in and get settled, many students neglect one of the basics of wise rental practices; i.e., to inspect the premises formally and have the landlord sign for the condition of the unit as you enter it.

This mistake almost always costs you money later, sometimes a great deal of it. Below you will find an inspection form which may be utilized for this purpose. Whenever possible, have the landlord walk through the inspection with you, so that there are no misunderstandings regarding the condition of the unit.

Remember, in many cases oral understandings are worth the paper they're written on. It's your money - get it in writing! Additional copies of this form are available from the Office of Commuter Services, Room 279, Residence Hall II.
