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Editorial**A cure for rotten service?**

Embry-Riddle has gotten itself into quite a predicament which needs to be corrected immediately. There is something terribly wrong but the people with the ability to help are not trying to remedy the problem. Every Riddle student has been exposed to this sickness and there is no immunization.

What is this mysterious malady? **ROTTEN SERVICE.**

Quite often, Roten Service occurs at the Riddle Run Around. Although both leave a student completely frustrated and disgusted, there is one very significant difference. While the Riddle Run Around is terminal problem caused by bureaucracy (with no hope for a cure), there is an attainable cure for Roten Service.

The symptoms of Roten Service vary by each individual case, however there are some typical indicators. Described below are a few of the more common symptoms:

"The Invisible Man Syndrome." This is perhaps the most commonly occurring strain of Roten Service. Often the cause is being ignored by a secretary of a program chairman or an administrator. Some other transmitters of this syndrome are instructors, administrators and other staff positions.

"Mountain Out of Mole Hills." Hillis is a condition that occurs when someone makes a ridiculous big deal out of a simple request. For example, the most recent example came from the Student Activities Office who asked one of the librarians for a piece of tape and was refused because of "budget constraints." There are many indicators of Mountain Out of Mole Hills. Characteristics are that you may have come in contact with Hillis several times in your ERAU career.

"Do as Required, Not as I Tell You Disorder." The most frequent carrier of this disorder is ineptness. Although these carriers are rather rare, an example of one would be a student who creates a lot of unnecessary confusion. They (the carriers) often make incorrect assignments, test on material never covered in class, go over homework problems from different test books or editions. Certain staff members are also carriers. One had told a recent graduate that he filled out his application for his commercial ticket incorrectly. After changing his application as per the Flight Department staff, he was informed by the FAA that he had filled it out incorrectly. His original application was correct.

"The Ignored If You Do, Damned If You Don't Disease." This one is caused by those folks who like to jump all over a student's case for asking questions. This is pretty uncommon among the faculty these days, but when it does flare up it can make a class very difficult. The more likely perpetrator are staff members who cover up a fact that they don't know the answer by making the student feel idiotic for asking.

"The Show Charisma and Everything About Practical Complex." This is not a disease, but it is probably the most difficult thing to diagnose for students. Recently, members of the senior class found themselves faced with this complex when they told an administrator about their gift and was chastised for failing to announce the plans to the proper people in advance.

There are many more strains of Roten Service but space allows us only to mention a select few.

As mentioned before, despite the fact that this is a serious problem, there is a cure. However, the recovery process has to start on the administrative level. When a new student arrives at school, there should be a screening procedure where service oriented is the applicant. Any position at Embry-Riddle requires extensive dealings with the student body. Some people are not cut out for work with the public.

New instructors should have to go through a trial period of a week or two of teaching as a guest instructor as part of their interviewing process. A few offhand remarks in class should indicate to the committee that makes the decision to hire. By giving a trial period, students don't lose a semester's worth (or more) of education to an incompetent instructor and the applicant gets a chance to show their qualifications a little better.

Any secretary or recipient must also have charisma and friendliness as part of the job specifications. When the secretary is rude or indifferent towards a student, it leaves a bad impression of the office. An administrator may

decide to fire them.

That is just a few things that can be done to make the Embry-Riddle experience much more favorable. A requirement to smile once in a while when talking to a student (or anyone for that matter) ease a lot of tensions. Mandating that telephone courtesy be exercised on all phone calls regardless of whether it's President Taitan or Joe Freshman would go along way towards improving relations with students.

ERAU's flying "Wright"

Editor's Note: The following was the response to the letter published earlier by Phyllis A. Salmons to Vice President J. Harman. Harman was asked for a status report concerning a proposal made by students for the University to display a Wright Flyer on campus.

A suggestion to Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University students to maintain a permanent display of the Wright Flyer has been received enthusiastically by the University administration.

Since 200 hours of staff and faculty time have been held in the past two months on this subject, it has been decided upon that this moment will be the time when the aircraft

"lifted off" its catapult at Kirby Hawk. The life size diorama will

faithfully duplicate the famous photograph showing the launch.

The most appropriate setting for this monument will be in the circular area in front of the Jack R. Hunt Memorial Library.

Discussions are currently being conducted with sculptors and artisans to determine the most feasible way to construct and install the monument. Upon completion of the design, the start date will depend on how quickly contributions can be secured to cover all costs. SLPs are now being taken to identify individuals and organizations which might be interested in providing funding.

It is hoped that agreements will be reached by early fall between the university and individuals involved in the project. Additionally, if funding is completed by early next year, work can commence in time for dedicating the monument during Aviation Week (October 1989).

What makes this project particularly significant is that it will not only be a source of pride for the students, faculty and staff of Embry-Riddle, but will also be an asset to the community and an attraction for visitors to the Daytona Beach area.

The Embry-Riddle students deserve accolades for a truly inspired concept.

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U.S. to loan Argentina \$500 million

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Treasury Department said Thursday it is working with debt-troubled Argentina to arrange a short-term loan of up to \$500 million from the United States and other creditor nations.

The so-called "bridge" loan would allow Argentina to meet interest payments on its \$56 billion foreign debt while it negotiates with the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank.

But, according to a department statement, funds from a short-term loan will not be available until Argentina "meets the requirements ... under the World Bank's loan."

Argentina, which is more than 90 days past due on more than \$300 million in payments, has said it cannot afford to make its overdue interest payments.

Vietnam ends search for MIA's

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — Vietnam's foreign minister today said his country will no longer help account for missing U.S. servicemen or cooperate on other humanitarian issues until Washington ends its "hostile policy against my government."

Vietnam announced Wednesday that it has temporarily halted plans for joint efforts to account for missing Americans and for resettling former political prisoners in the United States.

A spokesman for the U.S. has been reached last month.

In Washington, White House spokesman Marvin Firestone said, "We are very concerned, because we thought we were making some progress at getting the investigations going about MIA's and POW's."

'Authentic democracy' in Central America

WASHINGTON (AP) — High State Dept. officials, discussing news accounts, said they believe the foreign ministers of four Central American countries shared a U.S. commitment to "authentic democracy" even though it addressed issues in broad terms.

Passenger ship capsizes in Ganges River

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — A passenger ship carrying at least 300 Hindu pilgrims capsized Thursday in the Ganges River in eastern India, and 38 people were reported killed and hundreds missing.

Accounts issued by the police and Indian news agencies differed on how many people were aboard and how many were killed, missing or rescued.

J.M. Qureshi, director general of police, told reporters in Patna, the capital of Bihar state, that the privately owned, steam-powered launch was carrying 300 pilgrims when it capsized in the rain-swollen river. He said 100 people were missing and 200 others were accounted for, including survivors.

United News of India said the launch was carrying 500 passengers; 38 bodies were recovered and 50 people swam to safety. It said the remaining 412 people were missing and presumed drowned.

Militant children

GENEVA (AP) — The world's armies include an estimated 700,000 children, with governments forcibly conscripting some as if parents urging others to join to help the family, says a report to a U.N. human rights meeting.

The youths are subjected to physical brutality and are trained in pillaging, spying and terrorism, said the report for a working group of the U.N. Sub-Commission on Prevention of Discrimination and Protection of Minorities.

The report was by the London-based Friends World Committee for Consultation, a Quaker organization. The U.N. panel's parent body is the U.N. Human Rights Commission.

Parents sometimes urge children to enlist to get food privileges, priority in employment or payments if the child dies in battle, the report said.

Great Barrier Reef under attack

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — Sections of the Great Barrier Reef are being destroyed by a poisonously sharp starfish with up to 17 arms that invaded the reef after div. or began collecting its chief predator, a marine biologist says.

Dr. Robert Endean, who has studied the reef for nearly 30 years, blames the damage on millions of Crown-of-Thorns starfish, whose prickly bodies can reach 10 inches across.

The starfish feed on coral polyps and leave only the drab, limestone skeleton core of the Great Barrier Reef, which is made up of limestone reefs that stretch more than 1,200 miles along Australia's northeast coast.

Pakistani Airlines 747 slides off runway

KARACHI, Pakistan (AP) — A Boeing 747 slid off the end of a flooded runway while landing Saturday, and officials said three people were injured.

People on the Pakistan Airlines jet said the injuries occurred when emergency exit chutes didn't reach the runway and passengers fell to the ground.

Tariq Saied, president of the Pakistan Federation of Chambers and Industry, was on the flight from Islamabad, the capital, to Karachi. Pakistan's largest city, he said the aircraft overran the runway, we feared the plane might catch fire. There was panic when the cabin crew asked us to leave the plane through the emergency exits, he said.

Said said one passenger suffered fractures when he came flying out of the short emergency chute and landed on the runway.

Hussein voices conditions for cease fire

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — President Saddam Hussein Friday said Iraq will accept a cease-fire in its 8-year-old war with Iran if Tehran agrees to hold direct peace talks after the truce goes into effect, the Iraqi News Agency reported.

The announcement represented a reversal for Iraq which previously demanded that direct talks be held before a cease-fire was declared.

Hussein's statement came in a nationally broadcast speech that was reported by the official news agency; it said Hussein announced that Iraq was ready to cease fire "provided that Iran formally and unequivocally announced its willingness to enter into direct talks with Iran after the cease-fire."

World economy looking better

GENEVA (AP) — The volume of world merchandise trade grew by 5 percent last year and is expected to rise by the same percentage in 1968, according to a study released Wednesday by the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade.

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Never underestimate effects of stress

Many times we underestimate the effects of stress. Stress can lead to ulcers, family problems, loss of productivity, and even death. To understand stress one must understand the factors which cause stress. They include any internal or external stimulus that is perceived by the body as a threat to its equilibrium. Ultimately the body will have to use its resources to cope with stress.

For instance, consider attempting to fly the ILS into Daytona after having had too much coffee, causing

an urgent need to go to the bathroom. Perhaps you've gone to work, house, and car first. You less likely to cope. The cost of stress could be your life in such a situation.

Stress factors are physical, (such as noise and vibration), physiological, (including lack of sleep and illness) or psychological (social and economic factors).

These factors impair your ability to make decisions particularly when flying an aircraft.

There are clear indications when a person is, or is likely to be exposed to stress. By being aware of your reac-

tion to stress, you can better estimate your state of mind and your ability to make decisions necessary during flight.

We should all realize that there is more to preflight preparation than preflighting the aircraft. You must consider your state of mind and perhaps limit your activities when you encounter particularly stressful situations.

Remember, "A superior pilot uses superior judgment to avoid stressful situations which might call for the use of superior skills."



date of installation is anticipated to be no later than August 19.

ERAU Religious Center. A project to construct an ERAU Religious Center funded by private donation has been approved. An Architect Selection Committee interviewed prospective architects and recommended appointment of Kenneth McGee, who was approved. The initial task of the architect's is to do the preliminary planning necessary to depict the intended construction on a fund raising brochure to support the campaign being mounted by the Development Office. As soon as sufficient fund commitments have been obtained, detailed architectural planning will commence.

Airway Science Building. The University has received a grant of \$1.425 million dollars from the Federal Aviation Administration to construct an Airway Science Simulation Center at ERAU. A formal proposal has been submitted to the FAA and detailed architectural planning will begin as soon as approval is received. The required completion date for this project is August 15, 1989, so that facility will be available for the Fall Semester 1989.

Weight Room. Krocusfield Court #6 is to be converted into a weight room. The controlling item is the receipt of the Tufflex flooring material for which the earliest ship date is September 11. The existing Weight Room will remain in operation until the new Weight Room is completed so there will not be an interruption in service.

Calvin and Hobbes to join the Avion

Calvin and Hobbes will be joining *Bloom County*, *The Far Side* and *Garrison* in the fall, replacing *Asbury*.

Created by cartoonist Bill Watterson of Hudson, Ohio, Calvin is a very mischievous, to say the least, six year old, who shares his adventures and misadventures with his best friend, and tiger Hobbes.

Currently syndicated in 250 newspapers, the strip has been appearing for slightly over two years, and is the top comic in almost every mail order by papers who run it agains *Asbury* and *Watterson* was first syndicated in 1985.

Hill Watterson wondered if a job as a children's children's reading teacher in Chagrin Falls, Ohio. By the time he graduated from high school he had moved to New York City and started writing for the school newspaper and yearbook, and a few sell stories of various boys' rooms.

At Kenyon College, Watterson followed

his political cartooning. Watterson's characteristics of the Carter years proved to be among his most humorous work ever, the insights into foreign policy being especially laughable. In an effort to remedy this, Watterson majored in political science, and though he had a friend with access to the school's computer, Watterson earned a degree in 1980.

A major Cincinnati daily immediately offered him a job as editorial cartoonist but within a matter of months, the editor returned to the strip to draw it himself. After a short period of inactivity, Watterson turned to comic strips.

The next few years were not so good as one, and only a well used used car kept Watterson from the law's grasp. Rejo was then sold and Watterson turned to writing for a literary magazine *Home*, satirizing a kid's world through a kid's eyes to very hard to pull off, but Calvin is completely believable.

In reference to the commercial success of *Calvin and Hobbes*, Watterson said, "It's unbelievable right now. I just keep thinking how lucky I am. I'm doing what I wanted to do since I was a kid and people appreciate like what I've created."






Faculty salaries nationally:

The rich get richer, the poor get poorer

(CPS) -- "Rich" professors are getting richer while poor ones are getting poorer, an annual survey of faculty salaries has found.

Engineering faculty members got the highest salaries in the 1987-1988 academic year for the fifth consecutive year, according to the survey conducted by the College and University Personnel Association. Faculty members in secretarial, science, library science and nursing, however, remained at the bottom of the pay scale.

"I said it last year and I'll have to say it now: The rich keep getting richer and the poor keep getting poorer," said survey director Richard Howe, a professor of leadership and higher education at Appalachian State University.

Engineering faculty in some cases received salaries that were more than a third higher than those in other disciplines.

The reason, Howe said, is that private industry is constantly trying to hire away engineering, accounting, physics and computer sciences professors, and can pay them more to do so.

"It's simply a matter of supply and demand," said Howe.

The average annual salary for faculty members at public institutions was \$34,444.

At private institutions, the average salary for engineering faculty was \$47,301, about \$4,000 more than the previous year. Engineering faculty at public campuses got an average salary of \$41,685.

Nursing faculty at public institutions, however, earned an average \$29,447. At private schools, faculty in secretarial sciences had the lowest salaries, earning an average \$23,859.
