Eclipse draws students from dorms to scopes

Reported cloud cover threatened a clear view of the lunar eclipse that took place last Wednesday, Feb. 20, but that dit not stop students and community members alike from coming out to the Creekside Observatory behind the Lehman building to watch.

Early in the evening, it looked as if the clouds would shadow the moon completely. Luckily, small breaks in the clouds made it possible to view the moon for short periods of time. The eclipse officially began at 8:43 p.m. and ended at 12:09 a.m., with the total eclipse lasting from 10:01 p.m. to 10:51 p.m.

The Embry-Riddle Amateur Astronomy Club hosted the event at the university's Creekside Observatory, which boasts a 20-inch Dall-Kirkham (CDK20) reflecting telescope in a dome. For those that wanted more, there was also a 16-inch Schmidt-Cassegrain reflecting telescope and a 6-inch Takahashi refracting telescope available for

public use.

Throughout the night about 100 people showed up for the event, many of them members of the surrounding Daytona Beach community. Since fall 2006, there have been three other public viewing events like this. Dr. Jason P. Aufdenberg helps run the Creekside Observatory and is an assistant professor in physics and astronomy here on campus.

"Public observing nights are something that nearly all observatories do," he commented. "We like sharing a close-up view of the universe with the public." At the night, Aufdenberg answered questions from attendees after running the CDK20 telescope for the event.

The anatomy of a lunar eclipse is a fairly simple concept. The Earth's shadow is broken up into two cones; the outer penumbra and the inner umbra. The penumbra is where the Earth blocks out only some of the Sun's rays, while the umbra is in total darkness. It is only when the moon passes completely into the umbra that a full lunar eclipse occurs. When the moon is in the shadow



DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. – The Embry-Riddle men's basketball team closed out the 2007-08 slate on a high note with a 78-70 win over defending Florida Sun Conference tournament champion Florida Memorial in the regular season finale on Saturday. The Eagles, currently ranked 15th nationally, wrapped up second place in the FSC with a 10-4 league record and are now 25-5 overall.

Before the start of the game Coach Ridder honored this year's fan-of-the-year, and the two seniors that will be saying goodbye after this season. Murat Hisarkaya, who has been unable to play this season was introduced first and was escorted by his wife. The Turkish forward played for two years and was described by Ridder as "the ultimate teammate."

The other senior to be honored was Coach Ridder's son, and team leader, Ryan Ridder. His third season with the Eagles after transferring from the College of Wooster has seen his assists and points-pergame increase and as Coach states, "he is the quarterback of the team." Ridder was led out by his mother and Coach gave an emotional speach for his son's last regular season appearance.

ers score in double figures as Tyler DeBord put up 17 points, Rocky Pierre posted 19 points and Denver Cobb finished with 15 points. Mike Coscia, founder of Midnight Café, said that the number of students who came the previous four Fridays gave Sodexho a reason to try expanding the program. The fact it happened on Valentine's Day was unintentional, a coincidence caused by Sodexho's staffing requirements.

When the first Midnight Café opened on Jan. 11, Coscia expected only a few dozen students to show, but nearly 200 came out to show their support for the program, with lines reaching out the door. While the lines are no longer always reaching around the corner, there has still been an average of several hundred individuals coming each night, and the continued patronage is beginning to convince Sodexho that it could

Goddard engineer to kick off women's history month

Daytona Beach, Fla., -- Dr. Aprille Ericsson, the first African-American woman with an engineering doctorate to work at NASA's Goddard Flight and Space Center, will be the keynote speaker for the Women's History Month celebration at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University.

The event, which is free and open to the public, will be held Monday, March 3 from 7 to 8 p.m. in the auditorium of the Miller Instructional Center.

Ericsson's multimedia pre-sentation, titled "Women Who Dared: The History of Women in Science, Engineering, and Mathematics," will have an aviation/aerospace focus. She will also discuss how she came to choose a career in aerospace engineering. At Goddard,

Ericsson leads proposals as well as designing and managing the development of Earth and space-science instruments and satellites.

"I feel obligated to help spur the interest of minorities and women in math, science, and engineering," Ericsson says. Without diversity in all fields, the United States won't remain technically competitive.'

To educate and motivate young people, Ericsson serves as a mentor, an outreach speaker and a sports coach. At her alma mater, Howard University, she is an adjunct professor in the Mechanical Engineering Dept. and a director of the university's new Public Charter Middle School of Math and Science.

Among numerous honors bestowed on Ericsson is the prestigious "Women in Science and Engineering Award," presented annually by the federal government to its best female engineer. She is frequently spotlighted by the news media and is profiled in two history books.

At Howard University, Ericsson earned a master of engineering and a Ph.D. in mechanical engineering with an aerospace concentration. She also holds a B.S. in aeronautical/ astronautical engineering from MIT. Medgar Evers College presented her with an honorary Doctor of Science degree.

Earlier on March 3, the Women's Center director, Cindy Oakley-Paulik, has arranged a For-Women Only luncheon with Dr. Ericsson and female students at Embry-Riddle. On Tuesday, March 4, Dr. Ericsson will visit Campbell Middle School to work with 6th grade students on an engineering experiment involving designing an egg carrier able to withstand a one-floor drop beginning at 10:15 a.m. For more information, contact Dr. Joanne DetoreNakamura, coordinator for the ERAU/Campbell Partnership at Embry-Riddle at (386) 226-4914 or detoree@erau.edu.



of the Earth, it can appear to change to many different colors from dark grey to a deep red. Last week it appeared as an orange, rust-colored disk. This happens because some light still falls on the moon, even during a full eclipse. When light is refracted through the Earth's atmosphere, blue light is scattered more than red, creating a reddish glow of the umbra.

Events like the one last week help inform the public about things happening in the uni-

Aufdenberg says these events "give the ERAU and Daytona Beach communities the chance to view the planets and stars ... and better understand celestial events that humans have been observing since prehistoric times." The next total eclipse of the moon will not happen until Dec. 21, 2010, but the moon can undergo other types of eclipses: total penumbral, partial and partial penumbral. DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. The Embry Riddle Eagles baseball team collected the series win over the SCAD Bees but was not able to pick up the sweep, splitting the doubleheader on Saturday.

A rainy morning set the day an hour behind, but it did not put a damper on the Eagles bats as a 0-1 deficit put up in the top of the first by the Bees was matched by three runs in the bottom of the innings.

Albright's third home run of the season gave the Eagles the go-ahead run, as Colin Gray had knocked in James Kissinger in the at-bat prior on a double to centerfield. It was Albright's third home run of the year and second jack in five days. He went two for five on the day with two runs and two RBI.

The Eagles added seven more runs through the game, winning the second game of the three-game series, 10-2. The home team charted 12 hits in the contests.

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. -Saturday's men's tennis match promised to be an exciting match up with No. 5 Savannah College of Art and Design coming to the Crotty Tennis Complex to take on No. 3 Embry-Riddle in a battle between two undefeated teams. In the end it was the Eagles who came away unscathed as they shut out the Bees (4-1, 3-1) 9-0 to improve to 5-0 overall and 3-0 in the league.

The Eagles jumped out to a quick 3-0 advantage after winning all three doubles points. Mislav Hizak and Konstantin Lazarov started things off with an 8-4 win over Jan Menzen and Dima Chiriacov at the No. 1 spot, followed by Tomoaki Yasuda and Istvan Bolgar's 8-4 win over Willy Frei and Pablo Velez. At the No. 2 spot, Carlos Bes Comeras and Jan Hoekzema battled to a hard-fought 9-7 victory over Ofir Weintraub and Fernando Horcasitas.

ERAU's first singles win came at the No. 2 spot as Weintraub fell behind 4-3 to Lazarov before retiring. Top-ranked Hizak clinched the win at No. 1, dispatching Menzen 6-3, 6-1.

The Eagles also earned twoset victories at the third-through sixth positions as Hoekzema topped Frei 6-2, 6-3, Yasuda downed Horcasitas 7-6 (7-4), 6-1 and Bolgar bested Mihai Draganescu 6-0, 6-3.

The match-up at No. 3 was a battle, and in the end Bes Comeras fought back, after dropping the first set to Chiriacov 6-4, to take the next two sets 6-0, 6-4 and seal the win.

Growing Israeli outposts in West Bank

West Bank -- It was a festive night for the teenage squatters in this renegade hilltop camp. A rabbi was on his way, and they were cranking up a generator, stringing light bulbs and arranging benches, turning what had been a Palestinian family's barn into a synagogue.

Suddenly the group fell silent. An Israeli soldier and a policeman had trudged up the slope and were demanding to know who was in charge. No one would tell them.

After a few tense minutes, the uniformed intruders left. The "hilltop youth" had prevailed again.

As Israeli and Palestinian leaders try to end decades of conflict, this outpost and other unauthorized Jewish settlements have become a battle line between the Israeli government and a settler movement unwilling to give up the West Bank.

Under commitments made to President Bush at a November peace conference, Israel is supposed to dismantle about 50 outposts as a first step in negotiations on definitive borders and other terms of a final accord.

Instead of vanishing, however, the outposts are growing, swollen by a loose-knit group of young second-generation Israeli settlers believed to number in the hundreds.

Since this outpost was set up in December, Israel's paramilitary border police have chased away its occupants at least a dozen times, but never for long.

"They come up the hill, we go down the hill, we come back two hours later," said Yaakov Cohen, 17.

About 100 outposts, in addition to 126 settlements authorized by Israel, occupy West Bank land the Palestinians seek for a future state. Some of the

bigger outposts have a few hun-dred residents each and de-facto December, claiming it had been abandoned; the Khalafs say the government support in the form of running water, electricity, paved streets and schools.

Bush pressed the issue after his motorcade passed this outpost during a visit to the region in January. 'The agreement was, 'Get rid

of outposts, illegal outposts,' and they ought to go," he said at a Jerusalem news conference.

Standing beside him, Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Olmert replied: "This was discussed. ... We ought to fulfill our commitments, and we will."

But that resolve has provoked new land invasions by the hill-top youth, guided by a belief that the Torah commands Jews to settle all of biblical Israel no matter what modern Israel's elected leaders say.

Since the peace conference in Annapolis, Md., young Israelis have set up or expanded nine outposts, according to Peace Now, an Israeli advocacy group critical of the settlements.

The outpost here, whose Hebrew name means "Hill of Light," is populated by about 40 boys and girls who attend religious high schools in nearby settlements during the day. At night, they climb the hill, cook by campfire and sleep on mattresses in a complex of farm buildings, taking care to maintain a daily presence.

They say they're determined to outlast the police and build a viable community on the hilltop, just north of Ramallah.

"It's not Bush's decision. He isn't the landlord," Cohen said. "Neither is Olmert."

"God is the landlord," he added.

In fact, the titled owner is a Palestinian-American family -- the Khalaf brothers and a cousin, two living nearby in the West Bank and two in Ohio.

The Jewish youths occupied the seven-acre farm in urban-style communities funded

land was temporarily unattended between olive seasons.

Israeli police officials have authenticated the Khalafs' land title but failed to make good on a promise in December that the settlers would be removed from the farm.

When three Khalaf men tried to visit their property more recently, they were turned back by the Israeli army, which had declared it a closed military zone to prevent any violence between settlers and Palestinians.

Many governments consider all Jewish settlements in the West Bank a violation of international law, which forbids populating land seized in war. Palestinian leaders say the settlements are a major obstacle to peace.

Also, Israel's military and civilian hierarchies have supported or tolerated outposts for years and are ambivalent about helping Olmert abolish them for the sake of an uncertain peace.

"The Zionist ideal of settling the land is deeply embedded in Israeli society," said Gershom Gorenberg, author of 'The Accidental Empire," an early history of the settlements. When a politician is told that settlement is now detrimental to Israel's long-term strategic interest, this is something extremely difficult for him to absorb."

rades are veterans of a major clash with police two years ago at an outpost called Amona. They say they are ready to fight and risk imprisonment to defend other outposts.

Olmert's government prevailed at Amona, demolishing nine Jewish homes illegally built on private Palestinian land. But televised images of the clash, which left more than 200 soldiers, police and demonstrators injured, shocked Israelis; since then, the government has been reluctant to confront the settlers.

The Givat Haor outpost looks less like a battle-ready fortress than a pioneer camp. The boys sport curled side locks, scraggly beards, knitted yarmulkes and baggy jeans; the girls wear long, modest dresses and cover their heads.

More than 100 people crowded in for the inaugural religious service.

Rabbi Dov Lior, from a farright enclave near the West Bank city of Hebron, led the service and congratulated the settlers for "serving your country."

A judge had just ordered the release of seven girls from the outpost who had been detained in a police sweep. Defying the legal system, the girls had refused to give their names to police, and their jailing had sparked protests and sympathetic media coverage.

After that incident, the settlers say the police raids became far less frequent. That freed them to clear a dirt road to the outpost and start trucking in furniture through the Palestinian village of Beitin, which shares the same hill.

Now Beitin's mayor, Diab Yasin, is worried about his own hilltop youth.

This has been a peaceful village, but now our young people want to fight the settlers," he said. "If we let them, somebody will get hurt."

Before being ousted for reportedly favoring reforms, Robaina had been considered a future presidential contender. By contrast, Perez Roque emerged immediately as one of the staunchest defenders of Fidel's policies. Echoing a common Cuban saying, Cuesta said he has been "more like the pope than pope" in terms of his loyalty to the Castro doctrine.

Alvaro Vazquez Mantecon, the exhibition's curator, says that by using a multimedia approach to the subject, and using nearly 60 recorded testimonies, the center offers viewers a pluralistic and "polyphonous" view of the student movement and its effect. "There isn't only one vision about the movement," he says.

Bombarded by ideas from abroad, a generation of Cuban political leaders who came of age after Fidel Castro's 1959 revolution is preparing to inherit it. Many of them, now in their 40s and 50s, have developed a more open political outlook than their fathers, partly because of the thriving black market in outlawed Internet connections that in Cuba have cracked open a window on the world.

It remains to be seen how Fidel's 76-year-old brother, Raul Castro, who is expected to be named president Sunday, will incorporate the next generation into his government. But Cubans and outside analysts say that given the personal experiences of these younger leaders — especially the elite, who have more privileges than the general population — they might further nudge open the flow of information and ideas from outside.

'We're going to see a change in style with this new generation," Manuel Cuesta, a Cuban dissident, said in a telephone interview from Havana. 'Cuban society — the powerful and the citizenry — have more information. And people are asking more questions.

Fidel, who is 81 and ailing, initiated a rare moment of political uncertainty in Cuba when he resigned this week after nearly five decades in power. He and Raul represent the generation known in Cuba as the "historicos," those who rose to power because of their active early support for the revolution. Those who fought with the Castros in the Sierra Maestra mountains have traditionally had special status.

But many of the historicos have died or fallen out of favor, giving way to a generation of Cubans for whom the revolution is merely a historical concept. Demographic shifts have brought new figures into Cuba's stratified political system, and more than 70 percent of Cuba's current population was born after the revolution.

Cuba's foreign minister, Felipe Perez Roque, 42, belongs to this generation. He was the first Cuban born after himself, many Cuba experts view his expected tenure as transitional. Perez Roque and Vice President Carlos Lage, who was 7 when Fidel Castro's rebels declared victory, are the top contenders outside the Castro family to become Cuba's future leader. Both are expected to retain leadership posts when the National Assembly picks the next head of state Sunday.

Older Cuban leaders once considered possible successors to the Castros — such as National Assembly President Ricardo Alarcon, 70, and former interior minister Ramiro Valdes, 75 — are now given almost no chance of ascending to the top post.

Below the elites is a vast network of regional political leaders. In recent years, the Castros have begun to inject more up-and-coming leaders into provincial Communist Party branches to expand their appeal to younger generations, Rafael Hernandez, editor of the Cuban magazine Temas, said in an interview last year.

"It's often a young person, and many times a black per-son or a woman," Hernandez said.

At 56, Lage is the oldest of the new wave of Cuban political figures and among the most influential. He worked alongside Raul to open Cuba's economy to foreign investment in the 1990s after the country descended into a economic depression following the breakup of its biggest benefactor, the Soviet Union.

Cubans like to joke that Lage can put an audience to sleep with a speech faster than anyone. A pediatrician by training, he cuts an unthreatening figure, more mild-mannered accountant than firebrand rebel.

"I remember watching him standing in line with his mother, who was in her 90s," said Ann Louise Bardach, author of "Cuba Confidential" and the upcoming "Without Fidel." "He's just a gentle, appealing guy."

Lage's son, Cesar Lage, is also considered a rising political star. Until recently, he was the president of it."

Among those best known beyond Cuba is Mariela Castro, a psychologist and Raul's 45-year-old daughter.

With a flowing mane of brown hair, she is at ease in the spotlight and has traveled throughout the world, mostly to lobby for equal treatment of gay men, lesbians and transgender people. She has done the same, with some success, in socially conservative Cuba. She contributed to a Kinsey Institute encyclopedia of sexuality, and at Havana's annual book fair last week crowds swarmed "Marielita."

"She's got the most visibility of what I call the `monar-chical family,' " Cuesta said. "And she looks like she likes tive count of how many prodemocracy demonstrators were slaughtered by Mexican army troops in the Tlatelolco zone of this capital on Oct. 2, 1968. Was the death toll a few dozen, as the government claimed? Or closer to 300, as some journalists reported? Did President Gustavo Diaz Ordaz approve the attack? No one knows for sure.

But finally, after decades government stonewallof ing, Mexicans searching for answers to these questions have some place to turn: the Centro Cultural Universitario Tlatelolco, a cultural center dedicated to exploring the massacre, its antecedents and its aftermath.

Located in a striking midcentury Modernist office tower that formerly housed Mexico's Secretariat of Foreign Affairs, the center sits smack on the edge of the so-called Plaza of the Three Cultures, where the massacre occurred nearly 40 years ago. The centerpiece is a permanent multimedia exhibition that uses photos, archival film footage, music snippets, yellowed newspaper clippings, taped interviews, poster displays and art installations to tell the murky, tragic story. Many Mexicans say it's about time the country had a living memorial to this watershed event.

"It takes you by the throat. I think it's very true to reality, it's very true to what happened," says Elena Poniatowska, 75, who as a journalist helped expose the truth of the massacre with her 1971 bestselling book of survivors' testimonies, "La Noche de Tlatelolco" (The Night of Tlatelolco), published in English as "Massacre in Mexico." "I think it's a good memorial and it's a good way of honoring all these students that were killed and remembering that their life was cut in two.'

The massacre occurred on the eve of the 1968 Olympic Games, which the Mexican government hoped to use as a showcase for the country's economic growth and seeming stability. But this picturesque facade masked growing discontent with decades of autocratic, one-party rule and a persistent gap between haves

ern apartment and office towers. The bloodshed began when troops creeping in among the ruins converged on the protesters, and snipers began shooting down on the plaza from surrounding buildings. Despite international protests, the Olympics went forward a few days later.

For a long time after Tlatelolco, there was no mention in school textbooks or state-controlled television of the massacre. Two independent "truth commissions" appointed in the 1990s fizzled out with few tangible results. So did a pledge by former President Vicente Fox to investigate Tlatelolco, and the government's subsequent "dirty war" against dissidents also fizzled.

'Sixty-eight practically didn't exist," says Sergio Raul Arroyo Garcia, 53, the center's director general. "On the level of our



official history there has been a type of forgetfulness or amnesia in relation to the student movement."

Then in July 2005, the Mexico City government and the National Autonomous University of Mexico (itself the site of major student protests in 1968) agreed to create a cultural center containing a memorial to the Oct. 2 massacre and the political context surrounding it.

Spread across two floors, the exhibition creates an aural and visual environment that immerses visitors in an incendiary era. Snatches of "Light My Fire" and "Lucy in the Sky With Diamonds" flow out of speakers. One gallery wall bristles with colorful posters, witty bumper stickers and quasi-psychedelic handbills touting anti-government slogans.

"Perhaps the model that remains was the movie 'Rashomon,' of Kurosawa. There are moments in which the voices coincide, and many times when the voices differ. Clearly, it's a thing that has to be seen with a great plurality of voices and perspectives.'

Since opening in October, the center has drawn enthusiastic crowds, including many students. Some remain skeptical that the spilled blood of that summer led to an end of repression and greater democracy. "I think that the same thing is going on," says Norma Zuniga,

But Saray Chavaro Cruz, 15, was impressed after visiting the exhibition by what a previous generation had achieved. Truthfully, yes, today it's very different," she says. "Now we're allowed to express ourselves."

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



Continental orders additional 737 & 777s

Continental Airlines recently announced that they placed another order for additional 737s and 777s. This recent order included 19 Boeing 737 Next Generation (NG) planes and eight Boeing 777s worth up to \$3.8 billion at list value. These additional airframes will allow Continental to continue its domestic and global expansion. This additional order brings Continental's total orders to 111 new Boeing aircraft: 25 Boeing 787 Dreamliners, eight Boeing 777s and 78 Boeing 737NGs. In addition to these firm orders, they hold options to purchase an additional 102 Boeing aircraft.

The 737s that Continental has on order will allow for the retiring of older 737s as well as continued expansion. The 777s and 787s that Continental has on order will be used primarily for International expansion the coming years. Continental representatives also say that these new airplanes will burn significantly less fuel than the older models they currently operate, which should reduce overall fuel costs. Starting next month,



when the Open Skies agreement the European Union comes into between the United States and effect, Continental will begin

flying into London's Heathrow Airport. This will represent their largest ever expansion into a new airport in one day. They will offer four daily flights, with two to Newark/New York and two to Houston. Continental will also begin flying to Shanghai, China, in 2009 from Newark/New York with Boeing 777s.



First B-2 crash in Guam

At about 10:30 a.m. local time Saturday morning, an Air Force B-2 bomber crashed on takeoff from Andersen Air Force Base in Guam. The Spirit of Kansas was one of only 21 B-2s in service and is the first ever to crash. Air Force officials stated the two pilots from the 509th Bomb Wing who ejected have been examined at the naval hospital in Guam and are in good condition.

The bomber was one of four returning to Whiteman Air Force Base, Missouri after a four month

long deployment to the Pacific. At least one of the four bombers had taken off safely prior to the crash, but was brought back after the crash. There was no damage to buildings and or injuries on the ground. There were also no munitions on board.

The weather at the time of the crash is reported as a 13 knot wind from the northeast, visibility as seven statute miles and scattered clouds at 1,400 feet.

The Air Force is not yet sure what caused the crash. The B-2, built by Northrop Grumman Corp., costs about \$1.2 billion each and were first brought into service in 1993.

We've heard about airline pilots falling asleep in flight before, but this report is even stranger than usual -- it was 9 o'clock in the morning, and the flight was a 45-minute hop from Honolulu to Hilo. Local TV station KGMB9 said it obtained a radar track of the flight, which showed it stayed at 21,000 feet and flew past the Hilo airport about 15 miles out to sea before turning around and returning to descend. The FAA confirmed that it is checking into the incident. Air traffic controllers reportedly tried to contact the pilots for 25 minutes and got no response. The airplane, operated by Go! Airlines, landed without incident.



Mars Science Lab has heat shield issues

The launch date for NASA's innovative Mars Science Laboratory (MSL) mission may be pushed back because of issues with its Thermal Protection System (TPS).

The MSL is NASA's longterm project for the exploration of Mars. When it is complete it should be able to give scientists an extremely accurate portrait of Mars and its past. MSL is basically a larger and more intricate design of the current rovers on Mars, Spirit and Opportunity.

It is over five times larger and has 10 times the capability. Big time companies such as Boeing and Lockheed-

Martin are all working on different pieces of the mobile lab. Currently, production and engineering is happen-ing at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory at the California Institute of Technology. MSL will be the most com-

plicated vehicle to ever land on Mars. It also features many concepts of innovative engineering. To begin exploration on the red planet the rover will be lowered by a Skycrane, making the landing of the vehicle much more efficient.

Unfortunately, NASA has been having problems with the TPS on the laboratory. Originally, the plan was to use a super lightweight ablative heat shield on the rover, but recently it has failed all of its tests. The lightweight ablative 2010 and 2011.

shield is similar to what is currently used on the shuttle's external fuel tank.

Instead of the super lightweight ablative, NASA has turned to a Phenolic Impregnated Carbon Ablator (PICA). PICA is the material planned for NASA's new Orion vehicle, part of the replacement for the shuttle. This change to PICA will add many millions of dollars to the project.

In terms of the launch date however, NASA is very opti-mistic. The development of the TPS and other systems on the rover are happening simultaneously. The space agency is still shooting for their original launch date in 2009, although other openings are available in

Upcoming Cape launches

Endeavour prepares for late night spectacular

With Atlantis still in space, the shuttle Endeavour rolled out to Launch Pad 39A Feb. 18 in preparation for what will be just the second night launch since shuttles returned to space in July 2005. Onboard STS-123 will be the first of three sections of Japan's Kibo science laboratory, and the Canadian robotic "hand" known as Dextre. Liftoff is slated for March 11 at 2:28 a.m. EDT. It will be followed a few days later by a Delta 2 rocket, whose date of March 13 will move to the right a day or two should the shuttle need more than one attempt. If Endeavour isn't in space by the 13th, the shuttle would then stand down to allow that GPS mission to launch March 15. Meanwhile, NASA also announced last week that STS-124 will be delayed from April 24 to May 25 to allow more time for engine cutoff sensors to be reworked in the external tank that mission will use.



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
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
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
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'Be Kind Rewind' is why we love movies

Something told me as I started playing that I should've at least read up on the first three games, but, silly me, I ignored my intuition as usual. To put it simply, it's just another over hyped thing out on the market.

fter I started playing, I thought it'd turn out to be a decent first person thriller, but no. I had gotten a rank of "B" after complete the first mission, and then made the shocking realization, this is an RPG! Once I realized this, I felt ashamed at myself for not realizing it earlier, considering RPGs are the only thing Capcom can seem to make nowadays since the "Megaman" industry is about dead and Mario is still thriving.

It seems the game developers couldn't decide on a basis for the game. The whole thing is just a jumbled mix of "Assassin's Creed," "Resident Evil," "Final Fantasy," and "Sonic the Hedgehog." Maybe I'm biased since I've actually been to Japan several times and seen how they create their games, but all RPGs that have come from that country have all been virtually the same. Some guy has this special ability that makes him better than everyone else and the plot boils down to that guy trying to save his kidnapped girlfriend and the world. Wait a second, I've seen that plot summary before... Super Mario! Like typical RPG's the plot is

simple, everyone is out to do no good except the main character





and his love interest. It's like RPGs have a format to follow, because they all seem to do the same thing as one another and they follow that format to the letter. I do give credit to Devil May Cry 4 for not having all the characters having hair styles seen in "Final Fantasy" and the guys actually look like guys, not girls with muscles.

Most game reviewers have also put me in the spotlight saying that it is a good game that's got many unique features. For instance, enemies seem to swarm around you in a very small space and even if you destroy them all after barely hanging on to that last bit of HP, the game still gives you a rank "D" because you didn't use enough combo moves. However, lengthening the game play by simply adding bad guys is no way to go about it. Granted, it took me 10 hours to get to the ending, but if you took out the thousands of enemies slain, I could've gone through the game in thirty minutes. All it is, really, is a walk from Einstein's in the Student Village to Propellers with a bunch of evil things every six inches along the trip. It doesn't matter how many demons you spawn, if the plot doesn't lengthen and be more elaborate, then the whole thing becomes a huge boredom.

Let me wrap up my thoughts in summation; if you played the first three games, then "Devil May Cry 4" would just seem like a "filler chapter" than a sequel, but if this is your first encounter with this series, then forget about number four and just play the first three; they seem to be much more enjoyable. It's not a bad game, it's just repetitive. So until something better catches my attention, I'll stick with playing "Portal" and having lengthy philosophical debates with my Companion Cube before I'm forced to euthanize it.

As the four day school week slowly came to an end, I found myself strongly addicted to several flash games on the internet. If anyone remembers "Defend the Častle" where you took your pointer and threw people into the air laughing as their bodies reached terminal velocity and came to a pile of goo on the ground, you will most certainly enjoy its prequel, "Pillage the Village."

The game starts out with a short yet utterly pointless tutorial about how to throw innocent villagers into the air and murder them. Then, when their lifeless bodies disappear, shiny gold coins appear that the player must collect to buy spells and abilities. Once level two comes around, the game picks itself up and redeems its qualities. Multiple enemies appear as you progress into the game. They also get very smart. There are men with parachutes, thieves, men with wings and the ever present lemming type that just walk aimlessly until you take their insignificant lives. There is also an enemy that looks and dresses like superman. They fly around annoyingly until you drop an anvil on their head and laugh because he is not faster than a flying anvil. The spells are divided into

three categories; neutral, pacifist and antagonist. Personally, all the spells are equally fun to use, but there is nothing like dropping anvils on animated villagers to vent some anger.
