STS-123 set for launch on Mar. 11

NASA officials gave the official "Go" for Endeavour's March 11 night-time launch date last Friday. The 16-day mission will see delivery of the Japanese Kibo logistics module, along with Dextre, the Canadian Space Agency's robotic manipulator system.

The liftoff of STS-123 is currently set for 2:28 a.m. EDT. After about 45 hours, the shuttle should dock with the International Space Station (ISS) late on the night of the 12th. March 13 should see the first of five spacewalks planned on the mission, installing Kibo, which means "hope" in Japanese. That spacewalk, along with the next two,

will also be used to install Dextre.

Kibo's logistics module is the first of three Japanese Exploration Module components that will be lifted to the station over the next several shuttle missions. It holds eight experiment racks that will be used in the actual Kibo laboratory, which has not yet been attached to the station, as well as a number of tools and other supplies. The set of modules is designed to last for the next decade, with dozens of payload racks planned and the ability to add more to the manifest in the future.

Dextre is a semiautonomous robot with two "arms," complete with hands, that will be able to move along the station's spine on a trolley. The hands have grippers to manipulate tools (which are stored in a tool "belt" at the base of the robot), cameras to give operators a clear view of what is being repaired, and pressure sensors that can be programmed to stop the hand from crushing delicate components on the outside of the station. Its main purpose is to allow astronauts the chance to do some basic repairs from inside the station, without the need for spacewalks.

Two additional spacewalks on the 20th and 22nd will test a heat shield repair tool and install a heat shield inspection boom on the station which may be used to check the bottom of shuttles for damage sustained during liftoff.

Barring any large problems,

Delta Lambda Phi colonizes ERAU

On March 1, the ERAU Daytona Beach Campus welcomed the new colony of Delta Lambda Phi (DLP). A social fraternity founded in 1986 in Washington, D.C. Delta Lambda Phi has become one of the fastest growing fraternities in the nation. Their motto "Lambda Men are Making Their Presence Known" has become a motivation for several new colonies over the past few years.

After submitting their request on Jan. 11, the DLP National Board approved the Embry-Riddle interest group on Jan. 20 to begin colonization at the beginning of March. Accepted by both the Interfraternity Greek Council (IFC) and The Multicultural Greek Council (MGC), the DLP interest group has decided to become the second fraternity in the MGC. Their President, Shaun Kelly, started his efforts during the Fall 2007 semester. Since then the interest group has grown to 10 members, with two female staff/faculty advisors.

Delta Lambda Phi is known nation-

wide as the largest fraternity designed specifically for gay, bisexual and progressive men. As many of their members will tell you, they are not a "gay" fraternity, but a fraternity open to all accepting and progressive males irrespective of sexual orientation. The fraternity was founded by gay men for all men. One of their goals includes enhancing the quality of life for all progressive individuals. Their Director of National Expansion, James Kaechele, commented by saying "our fraternity centers around creating gentlemen of character, and future leaders."

As advocates of tolerance and equality, the colony hopes to contribute to enhancing equality and diversity of life on campus through educational efforts and programs. In the fall, the interest group held several events and fundraisers including free HIV testing in the Doolittle Annex. They also held several social events and gatherings well attended by many students representing several other student organizations.

In the next year, the group plans to hold and promote several educational

DAYTONA BEACH – While the 15th ranked Embry-Riddle men's basketball team fell just shy of winning their eighth Florida Sun Conference Tournament Title in their 85-72

loss to unranked Edward Waters College Saturday night, their successful season does not end

Late last week, the Eagles learned that their impressive 26-5 record guaranteed a berth in the National NAIA Division II Basketball Tournament regardless of the outcome of the FSC Tournament this past weekend.

"Any basketball team, at any level, wants to go to the national tournament," Eagle's coach Steve Ridder said before leaving for the conference tournament last Thursday.

"Of course you want to win

the conference championship, but the number one goal is getting to a national tournament."

The 17th Annual National NAIA Division II Tournament will be held at the College of the Ozarks in Point Lookout, Mo. beginning on March 12 and culminating on March 18 with the national championship game.

The national tournament's 32 team field will be announced on March 4 and the official bracket pairings will be announced on March 5.

The Embry-Riddle men have enjoyed plenty of success at the national level as the Eagles are 13-8 in national tournament play under Coach Ridder, including their NAIA Men's Division II National Championship win at the end of the 1999-2000 sea-

Embry-Riddle's 2008 tournament birth marks the sixth time in the past 10 seasons that the Eagles have made an appearance in the national tournament.

The Eagles easily dispatched their first two FSC Tournament opponents, Webber International University and Warner Southern College, before falling to Edward Waters College Saturday night in West Palm Beach.

BABSON PARK, Fla. - The Embry-Riddle Eagles baseball team picked up their first threegame sweep of the season, taking both games in the doubleheader against the Webber International Warriors on Saturday.

After taking game one Friday 12-4, the Eagles won 4-3 and 2-1 in the twin bill. ERAU heads home with a 13-6 overall record, they are now 6-3 in conference play. Webber now sits with a 14-7 record and are 4-5 in the FSC.

In the first game on Saturday, the Eagles tallied four runs in the first three innings and held on despite a late attack from the Warriors to pick up the 4-3 win. Chris Maloney pitched a solid eight innings, charting his third win of the season. He had four strikeouts, while allowing eight

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Cubans seek real changes with new president

Idalberto Estrada really wanted to make a sale.

He slashed a slender blade through the barklike brown skin of a yuca root, a staple of the Cuban diet. A woman with brightly dyed red hair leaned in skeptically, examining the root's white flesh beneath Estrada's sidewalk umbrella in this Havana

"Beautiful, isn't it?" Estrada, 37, said, smiling hopefully.

The woman handed over a faded peso, and Estrada sighed with relief, knowing he was closer to breaking even for the day. In a country where more than 97 percent of adults work for the government and most private businesses are illegal, Estrada is

an entrepreneur, opting for the risks and rewards of a tiny business over working for the state.

Estrada's experience as a minicapitalist in this socialist nation was made possible by a mid-1990s reform that legalized about 150 types of micro-businesses and was pushed for by Fidel Castro's brother, Raul. Fidel, 81, announced his retirement Tuesday after half a century of dominance.

Estrada and the 100,000 to 150,000 other self-employed Cubans provide a glimpse of what the future might look like here, and help explain some of the low-intensity excitement about the possibility of historic change. Estrada sometimes earns three or four times what he made before quitting the Cuban navy six years ago, when his pay was the equivalent of \$17 a month. He

still struggles to make ends meet, but he is much better off than the overwhelming majority of his neighbors who live in rotting homes with spotty plumbing and have to feed themselves on state salaries as low as \$11 a month.

Raul, who has been interim president in the 19 months since Fidel underwent multiple intestinal surgeries, has stoked hopes of even more dramatic change by hinting for months about "structural and conceptual" shifts in Cuba's economy. Economists and many islanders see much in Raul's track record to suggest that he may expand private business opportunities and perhaps even restore some of the vaunted mid-1990s reforms that his allpowerful brother dismantled.

"I see it as a great possibility that Raul will make changes to Cuba's economy," Oscar Espinosa Chepe, a former Cuban government economist and diplomat who was imprisoned in a 2003 crackdown on dissidents, said in an interview. "He is much more pragmatic than his brother."

Raul pushed to make some self-employment legal in the mid-1990s as Cuba's economy was staggering and its populace starving after the Soviet Union collapsed. Besides allowing vegetable vendors, the government also began granting licenses for guesthouses, mechanic shops and small restaurants, known as pala-

But the biggest change Fidel let his brother talk him into was allowing more tourism. About 270,000 tourists went to Cuba in 1989. By 2006, that figure had jumped to 2.2 million, with nearly one in four tourists coming from Canada, according to the Cuban government. Once a bargain, Havana is now one of the most expensive cities to visit in Latin America, with rooms at more than half a dozen top hotels going for \$200 to \$600 a night.

The influx of foreign money from tourism and joint ventures in mining, tobacco and citrus stabilized Čuba's economy in the late 1990s and early 2000s. (The Cuban government keeps up to 30 percent of profits.) And that's when Fidel Castro's government began taking back some of the business liberties it had granted.

The longtime leader complained about "inequalities" that self-employment was creating and railed against a "new rich class" that was paid by tourists in U.S. dollars that had much more buying power than the Cuban peso. In 2004, his government stopped granting self-employment licenses for 40 types of businesses. Among those who could no longer work for themselves were masseuses, magicians and clowns. Other businesses remained technically legal but were effectively closed because licenses weren't renewed.

The number of self-employed Cubans plummeted from 200,000 in the mid-1990s to 100,000 now, according to Antonio Jorge, a recently retired Florida International University economics professor who was a top finance official in the first two years of Fidel's reign. The Cuban government says 150,000 people are self-employed.

There was also a major crackdown on paladares, the small restaurants that were thriving because their owners were preparing meals that were far superior to the drab offerings in most state-run restaurants. In the late 1990s, it was estimated that Havana had more than 1,000 paladares; some of their owners were achieving worldwide fame. Now, there may be fewer than 100, said a Cuban government economist who spoke on condition of anonymity for fear of repercussions.

Privately, another Cuban official justified many of the closings, saying paladares were shut down for sanitation violations. But the Cuban government economist said the majority were forced out of business by the state, which then clandestinely became the real owner of several successful paladares that pretend to be privately owned. Other paladares stayed in business by bribing government officials.

"They want to get rid of us all," said a paladar owner who asked that his name not be revealed.

Raul Castro hasn't focused on Cuban restaurants in his public speeches, but he speaks frequently about the farmers who supply them. Jorge and the government economist each predicted that Raul might begin deeding farmland to campesinos, or poor farmers. During a speech last July, Raul — who is known for his wry, biting humor — said he'd admired the marabu growing on the roadsides. Marabu is a thorny bush that spreads across untilled fields. The message was clear: Cuba's government-controlled farmers were not doing their job well. Currently, half of Cuba's arable land is not cultivated, but many here believe private ownership of some farmland would free farmers to produce more in a country that imports 80 percent of its food.

Estrada, the Cojimar vegetable vendor, often buys his squash and yuca from Jose Francisco Anaya Leon, a 58-year-old Cuban. Unlike Estrada, Anaya Leon is not self-employed. He farms government land, then sells three squash at very low prices to the government for every one he sells to vendors such as Estrada at a higher price.

Anaya Leon may have a guaranteed buyer for most of his crop, but he doesn't make enough to live decently. Estrada said he has no guaranteed buyers, but he flipped a cabbage in his hand and smiled anyway.

"Everybody in the world would want this, to be independent," he said. "Human beings are ambi-

In closed communist dictatorships, land-use planning often edges toward the far side of eccentricity.

In Albania under Enver Hoxha, the countryside was pimpled with more than 700,000 concrete bunkers. Built to ward off invaders, most became out-

In Romania under Nicolae Ceausescu, a historic quarter of old Bucharest was bulldozed to build a Parisian-style boulevard, an artificial river and a 13-story neo-Stalinist palace that was used for, well, nothing. Before Ceausescu could move in, he was overthrown, lined up against a wall and shot.

Here in North Korea, with a father-and-son dictatorship ruling the roost, eccentricity in land planning has gone unchecked for 60 years. It has gone to the far side, and beyond.

Kim Il Sung, who founded North Korea in 1948, built stupendously large structures to honor himself. So has his son, Kim Jong II, who took over when his father died in 1994.

And so this week, when the New York Philharmonic flew into Pyongyang for a first-ofits-kind concert, the government offered bus tours to show musicians and attending journalists what the two Kims have wrought.

To explain it in English, the government provided intense men with worried faces. They called themselves "guides." The musicians called them "minders." Their job was to answer questions and prevent foreign visitors from wandering off to see a city that, from a moving bus, appeared to be poor, dark and cold.

The tour buses stopped only in front of the gleaming edifices that are the pride of the personality cult of the two Kims.

First on the tour was a statue of Kim Il Sung, known here as the Great Leader.

The statue is shockingly big and commands a vast concrete plaza on a hill overlooking the capital. Large speakers broadcast martial music. When North Koreans visit, as they often do in sizable, highly organized groups, they bow to the statue.

For foreign visitors, snapping pictures of what may well be the world's tallest statue of a dead dictator, the first question

that comes to mind is: "How tall is it?"

This reporter's minder seemed tormented by the question. He took a long time to formulate

"We respect our Great Leader," he said. "We don't measure the height."

The minder paused, then

began again.
"We measure the size of the statue by the size of hearts of the Korean people."

Another pause. Then the minder asked, rather sheepishly, if he might go off the record. Bottom line: He didn't know.

House, a wedding-cake-shaped confection of concrete that occupies much of a city block, visitors were repeatedly told these facts: The building has 600 rooms, 30 million books (including "Gone With Wind," as one guide put it) and 20 kinds of rare gemstones inlaid in the floor of a reception room dominated by a white marble statue of Kim Jong Il.

Planted liberally among the monstrous buildings honoring the revolutionary achievements of the Kims are billboards bearing photographs of a red perennial begonia called Kimjongilia. It supposedly blooms on his

Other billboards display North Korea's second national flower, an orchid called Kimilsungia.

Perhaps because of chronic power outages, Pyongyang does not seem to have stoplights.

What the capital does have - at least when the New York Philharmonic is in town — is female traffic cops. They were all gorgeous — and they were all gorgeous in exactly the same

They wore powder-blue uniforms with fur-lined hats. With bright red lipstick and dramatic eyebrows, they looked as if they had been made up for the stage. They directed the city's sparse traffic with robotic arm movements. They looked fit and happy and often smiled at the traffic.

'They are the faces of the road, and they are chosen for their beauty and their height," a minder explained. "They cheer us up and clarify our minds."

Canines and soldiers, a bond unbroken

Staff Sgt. Iron quakes with fear at the sound of explosions. He brawls with other soldiers. He whines when he doesn't get his way and slows others down when he stops to relieve himself during patrols through hostile territory.

But nobody complains, because when it's time to enter a building that might be rigged to explode, or cross a pasture that could conceal a minefield, Iron is at the front of the line, making sure it's safe for those who follow.

If it's not, Iron will bear the brunt of the blast, along with his best friend, Sgt. Joshua T. Rose, who ranks one level below him. It's an honor Iron enjoys for the dangerous job he does. It also ensures that charges could be filed against Rose in the unlikely event he ever mistreated Iron -an 80-pound German shepherd.

Rose and Iron are one of about 200 canine teams deployed in Iraq, where the bond between soldiers and their dogs is so deep that some handlers have asked to be buried with their canine partners if they are killed together.

On frigid winter nights in the Iraqi desert, Rose shares his cot and sometimes his sleeping bag with Iron to keep him warm. In the scorching summer heat, he makes sure Iron has enough water before taking his own share. If the heat is too much for Iron, who has a thick coat of glossy black fur, Rose lets him rest, no matter what the platoon leader might want.

Whenever he goes on a mission, Rose tucks a copy of an ode to police and military dogs into his front pocket. It reads in part: "Trust in me, my friend, for I am your comrade. I will protect you with my last breath. When all others have left you and the loneliness of the night closes in, I will be at your side.'

These dogs are like our children. I'm closer to my dog than I am to anyone other than my wife," said Staff Sgt. Charles W. Graves, the kennel master at Forward Operating Base Kalsu, about 20 miles southeast of Baghdad. Graves works with Udo, a yel-

low Labrador retriever who holds the rank of sergeant 1st class, one higher than Graves. He is the fifth dog Graves has been teamed

Graves adopted his first dog after it retired from active duty. The dog died at age 16, from a heart attack while chasing a cat.

His fourth dog was aggressive and liked to bite, nothing like Udo, who is a specialized search dog. That means he isn't aggressive and can run off his leash, wearing a vest that holds a radio through which Graves issues commands.

"If something ever happened to him, I'd never work canine again," Graves said as Udo did a practice run across a field dotted with remnants of once-lethal explosives and other weapons.

Handlers are expected to keep their dogs "on odor" by putting them through such training every month, to ensure they don't lose the ability to detect TNT, C4, AK-47s, wires, metal and the other threats that insurgents have planted across Iraq.

"If they took him out, I'd kinda wish they'd take me out too," Graves, a former police officer from Oroville, Calif., said as Udo loped nearby. With each successful find, Udo was rewarded with a toss of his favorite toy, a rubber

Before each deployment, troops are asked to update their wills. Graves included a request to be buried with Udo should they die together. It has happened before. Last July, Cpl. Kory D. Wiens, 20, and his Labrador retriever, Cooper, became the first soldierdog team killed since Vietnam. They were buried side by side in Wiens' hometown of Dallas,

In April, Navy Petty Officer 2nd Class Blake T. Soller's 4-year-old dog, Pluto, couldn't resist leaping over the side of a cargo ship into New York Harbor, 60 feet below. Soller jumped in after Pluto and stayed with the 87-pound Belgian Malinois until a Navy boat picked them up.

Neither was injured. The U.S. military has used dogs in combat zones since World War II and deployed about 4,300 to Vietnam between 1965

and 1973. According to the military, 281 died in the line of duty there, but hundreds more died when the war ended and U.S. troops departed. Then, there were no provisions for military dogs to be adopted when their careers were over. Most were euthanized or left behind to uncertain fates.

That changed in 2000, with a law allowing retired military dogs to be put up for adoption at the Military Working Dog center at Lackland Air Force Base in Texas. They range from small breeds such as beagles to hulking

Since the start of the Iraq war, about 1,000 dogs have passed through the combat zone, and three, including Cooper, have been killed in action.

Handlers say dogs are crucial for sniffing out the roadside bombs that are responsible for most soldier casualties, and for smelling wires that indicate booby-trapped buildings. They also search for drugs and illegal weapons at border crossings and checkpoints, chase down suspected insurgents and hunt for human remains.

And for the first time, the military has sent dogs into a war zone to serve as therapy for troops. Last month, two black Labradors arrived in Iraq to work with stressed-out soldiers.

A canine doesn't have to be a therapy dog to be therapeutic. On a chilly winter's day, as troops prepared for a mission in southern Arab Jabour, southeast of Baghdad, attention was focused on Pluto and Iron, not on the dangers ahead. Rose scratched Iron's ears. Pluto stood on his hind legs and leaned into Soller's chest, like a dance partner. Other soldiers stood around in full battle gear, talking about their own dogs back home.


Until several weeks ago, the region was in the hands of Sunni Muslim extremists loyal to al-Qaida in Iraq. A U.S. bombing campaign drove many of them out, but they left behind roads and buildings laden with explosives, and orchards littered with buried ordnance and weapons.

weapons stashed in the wooded area across the road.

Soon, Rose and Iron and Soller and Pluto were pushing through a dense thicket. Within minutes, Rose spotted a subtle change in Iron's behavior as he nosed around some palm fronds. The 7-year-old dog calmly sat down, a sign he had found something. A metal detector and shovel proved him right. A pipe bomb wrapped in a green sack was buried in the

By the end of the mission, Iron

had made a second find. After each discovery, Rose rewarded Iron with tosses of a red rubber cone as with Udo, Iron's



"I've had people say, 'It's a good thing you're in the Navy, because that means you're not on the front lines," said Soller as he and Pluto led the way down an eerily quiet dirt road lined with houses tucked back among high grass and fruit trees. "It doesn't get any more front line than this. My job is to clear the way so the rest of the guys can get there."

Soller, who used to train hunting dogs in Indiana, was tapped to attend canine handling school as a reward for exemplary service in the Navy. Rose, whose father was a police canine handler back home in Virginia, asked to attend the school after earning high

marks from a platoon sergeant. Visits to two homes, including a lavish villa overlooking the reedy banks of the Tigris River, showed how having dogs in the mix can alter an otherwise tense

situation. A grinning adolescent boy used hand signals and broken English to jokingly offer a trade: lean, amber-eyed Pluto for one of his sheep, which stood in a silent, fluffy flock staring at the dogs. In the garden, two women presented the troops with pizza-sized slabs

of hot, freshly baked flatbread.

Then the boy explained through

an interpreter that there were

The dogs are bought from breeders in Europe and the United States and then trained at the military's dog school at Lackland.

Should dogs be wounded or fall ill, they are given immediate care. Handlers are trained to provide basic treatment until the dog can be taken to a military

When Iron broke a canine, a critical tooth for a dog who sometimes must chase down suspects and hold them, he was given a root canal to save the tooth the same day.

Severe cases are flown to Germany. This happened with Rose's last dog, Rex. In 2005, Rose and Rex were providing security at the Baghdad trial of former Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein. One day, Rex wouldn't eat. Rose knew that when his 105-pound German shepherd didn't eat, something was wrong.

He had him checked by a military vet in Baghdad. The diagnosis was cancer. Rex was dying. He was flown to Germany and

euthanized. But Rex's memory lives on in Fort Riley, Kan., home to the Army's 1st Infantry Division and Rose's home base. At the base, dogs have a place to play. It's called Rex's Bark Park.

Army presents scholarship ΣAE remembers

The U.S. Army No. 1 NASCAR was the backdrop for the inaugural presentation of the Captain Herbert C. Crosby Scholarship at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, Feb. 11, 2008. Appearance of the Army No. 1 car, driven by Mark Martin, was arranged by the Jacksonville Recruiting Battalion Daytona Beach recruiting station in support of the Daytona 500. Having the Army car on campus was essential to setting the event, according to Wayne Munson, executive director, Alumni Relations, Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University.

The first recipient of the \$1,000 scholarship, Cadet Benjamin J. Boxler, is a native of Leesburg, Va., and a senior in the ROTC program. The 22-year-old Boxler will be commissioned in May in the Army's Engineer Branch. Boxler's essay was one of 74 narrowed down to four over a three-month period, according Maj. Scott Jones, Executive Officer of the ERAU Army ROTC Eagle Battalion and one of the selecting officials. "All of the essays were excellent but Cadet Boxler's submission really stood out," said Jones.

Criterion for the scholarship was established by the family--a cadet in good standing who exhibits financial need and eligibility to achieve a commission. Additionally, the cadet had to have at least a 3.0 GPA. The scholarship was established by the family and friends of Captain Herbert C. Crosby, an Army helicopter pilot with the 1st Aviation Brigade who died in a crash during the conflict near Quang Nam Province, Republic of Vietnam. Captain Crosby and three other crewmembers were listed as missing in action in January 1970. In 2006, Captain Crosby's remains were officially identified through DNA and on May 25, 2007, his remains were

interred at Arlington National Cemetery.

The Herbert C. Crosby scholarship was established at ERAU because the family considered it a suitable institution to preserve their family's legacy of military service to the nation. Although Captain Crosby was not an ERAU alumnus, the family chose ERAU because "Embry-Riddle is at the top of the list for flying," said Mary Lou Wade, Crosby's sister.

Cadet Boxler said his inspiration in writing the winning essay came when he read a letter Captain Crosby had written to his parents. "It kinda looks like people are ashamed because they died in this war that nobody

though. We're fighting and they died for our country and the

flag."

"His personal note really touched me. It seemed I had a connection with him. Here's a guy, my same age, having some of the same thoughts that I have today. The parallels were

so similar," Boxler said.

Mary Lou Wade, accompanied by Wayne Munson, Executive Director, Alumni Relations, ERAU, and Lt. Col. Michael Schaefer, Professor of Military Science, ERAU Army ROTC, presented an enlarged \$1,000 scholarship check to Cadet Boxler during the ceremony.

The tradition still continues today in the form of a Paddy Murphy Ceremony. 

CFM International increases open-rotor focus with CFM56

CFM International, the General Electric/Snecma joint venture well known for the CFM56 engines available on Boeing 737s and Airbus A320s, has added open-rotor fan technology research to complement its work on engines of the future.

This research is being carried out under a program called LEAP56 (Leading-Edge Aviation Propulsion). Open-rotor technology has been added to the two-year-old program due to the demands of airlines for fuel burn improvements.

By late this year or early next year, CFM is planning to operate a subscale rig. Ron Klapproth, LEAP56 program manager, says that it's a "substantial effort that will complement the company's work with the European Clean Sky research program."

In their open-rotor fan research, CFM has gathered all available data from the 1980s unducted fan program. The last six months have been spent running old data through new aerodynamic models, and Klapproth says that "we clearly see opportunities to improve performance.'

By 2011, CFM officials believe that an engine design for Airbus A320 and Boeing 737 replacements must be selected. Through

2010, the focus is to explore new technologies. However, Randy Tinseth, Boeing's head of marketing, said that open-rotor engines tend to be heavy. There are issues with vibration and maintenance, plus the engines are not easily accepted by customers. Boeing expects to come to a decision about the next-generation singleaisle aircraft around 2012.

at traditional engine designs, featuring fewer fan blades - 18 instead of 22. Later this year, the CFM56-5C will be fitted with a composite fan case and blades. Ensuring that these shorter composite blades are FOD-resistant is a major element of the program.

CFM is also developing a new compressor utilizing eight stages rather than nine, boosting com-LEAP56 was initially aimed pression ratios. It will also keep

upgrading its Twin-Annular Pre-Swirl combustor (TAPS) technology, which is already in use on the GEnx engine for the Boeing 787. TAPS should reduce output of nitrogen oxides, and extend on-wing time by 25 percent.

While LEAP56 is aimed primarily at future engines, it is possible that the technology could be used on current engines on 737s Aviation briefs



FAA says ADS-B coming to Gulf, AOPA notes downside

(ADS-B) gear will be up and tion or running in the Gulf of Mexico by the end of next year, Acting FAA Administrator Bobby Sturgell told the HAI Heli Expo crowd in Houston this week. The installation aims to improve safety for heli-copters serving offshore oil platforms. Sturgell said the system, designed by ITT, will help controllers at Houston Center to separate traffic in the Gulf, which doesn't have radar coverage. "We're stretching the airspace,"
Sturgell said, "extending it to the altitudes and the areas that you [helicopter pilots] operate in." Sturgell added that ADS-B services will expand, and will prove useful to other segments of general aviation, such as air tour and emergency medical services. AOPA, however, is less enthused about the costs and benefits of the technology. An FAA proposal would require GA aircraft to equip with ADS-B equipment by 2020 if they want to fly in Class A, B, or C airspace, or above 10,000 feet msl. AOPA

says it's concerned that the mandated avionics are too expensive and there appear to be too few benefits for GA.

Runway red Automatic Dependent lights -- solustopgap?

It might seem like a sensible solution, especially at big airports with a complex array of taxiways and runways --embed red lights into the runway pavement at the intersections. It's been tried at Dallas-Fort Worth and in San Diego, and reports are positive. But the technology is simply a "a stopgap measure," according to FAA Acting Administrator Bobby Sturgell. "Runway status lights are one way to drive down incursions, but they're not the best way," he said this week, while visiting Los Angeles International Airport to announce that the lights will be installed there. At LAX, he says, the runways are simply too close together, and that layout needs to be addressed. A recent report by the Office of Inspector General for the Transportation Department found that the status-light systems are effective and should be deployed at airports across

was completed just after take off from Paine Field enroute to Hong Kong after Cathay Pacific's acceptance of the aircraft from Boeing. Captain Wilkinson took the Boeing 777-300ER to within 28 feet of the runway at a speed of 280 knots (322 mph) before continuing of Cathay Pacific, Chris Pratt. the flight to Hong Kong.

Captain Wilkinson was treated to champagne toast by the Chairman of Cathay Pacific and the rest of the VIPs that accompanied him on the flight. However, a video of the flyby was later found on YouTube by management at Cathay Pacific. According to Cathay Pacific spokeswoman Carolyn

After landing in Hong Kong Leung, Captain Wilkinson was Officer Ray Middleton, who suspended from flight duties and later fired for the stunt because he had failed to obtain permission from the airline to perform the flyby. Leung went on to explain that Cathay Pacific has a detailed process for the approval of a flyby, however the necessary steps were not taken this time. First

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

Endeavour will undock from the ISS at about 8 p.m. EDT on March 24 and land just over 48 hours later at Kennedy. NASA has approved an extra day for operations if problems develop or there are delays in installing either of the station components.

Overall, the STS-123 mission will last a total of just over 15 days 18 hours, the longest ISS shuttle flight in history. This is possible because of a new system on the station which will allow power connections between the station's solar panels and the shuttle.

The longest shuttle flight was STS-80, which saw Columbia operate a number of scientific experiments and deploying and retrieving a German ultraviolet spectrograph satellite for just short of 17 days 16 hours.

Viewing the STS-123 launch

Titusville or KSC Visitors Complex the best choices for liftoff

The closest and best place to view the launch would be the NASA causeway (angling 6.5-7.5 miles away from pad 39Å, it is the closest public viewing area), but tickets for it have long been sold out. Viewing is also offered from the KSC Visitors Complex (tickets *were* still available for there as of Sunday for \$38 each from http://www.kennedyspacecenter.com). The KSC VC itself is 7.4 miles away from Pad 39A but offers no view of the pad. After the causeway, however, this author's recommendation for a night launch is Titusville, as the expanse of water between you and the pad reflects

Titusville is the next best and also most popular place to view the launch, and is the second closest spot after the causeway with a clear view of the pad. At 12 miles from Endeavour, the sound is usually moderate but clearly heard and felt. Anywhere in Titusville from the Rt. 406/Max Brewer bridge on the north end of town, south along US 1 to where U.S. 50 intersects -- about a four mile stretch -- offers prime viewing clear across the water (Rt. 406 is also called Garden St.). The most popular spot is Space View Park/The Astronaut Walk of Fame, which is a block south of Garden St. on the water (and has a pier). Several other parks and piers line the river in Titusville, and many landowners also charge a cash fee to park on their land to watch. Arrive early to secure the best parking spot and viewing location. If you own one, tune your scanner to 146.9400 to hear the NASA TV broadcast and countdown. Space View Park should provide a live audio broadcast as well.

To get to Titusville from campus, take I-95 south to Exit 220 (Rt. 406/Garden St.), and go left off the exit. Rt. 406 will hit the river at the Max Brewer Bridge, and this is the furthest you can go before the road block on the other side of the bridge. One block before and paralleling the river, you can also head south on U.S. 1 to find more viewing areas. U.S. 1 rejoins the river about a mile south of 406; for that one-mile stretch, the street that runs along the water is known as Riverside Drive.

Ulysses mission is coming to an end

Ulysses, a satellite that has performed beyond all expecta-tion, is gradually losing power and by NASA's account will be completely out of commission in a few months.

The spacecraft was a joint project of NASA and the European Space Agency (ESA) operated from the Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL) by a joint NASA/ESA team and has employed NASA's Deep Space Network for communications.

The spacecraft, which was sent into orbit by the Shuttle Discovery in October 1990, was expected to spend five years surveying the sun's poles. Surpassing everyone's expectations, the satellite, named after a legendary Greek king, has spent more than 17 years in operation. During this time, NAŜA's website records, "the reams of data Ulysses returned have forever changed the way scientists view our star and its

On Jan. 14, Ulysses began flying over the sun's North Pole. It was coincidentally the onset of a new solar cycle. Arik Posner, NASA Ulysses program scientist, said in a press release that "This is a wonderful opportunity to examine the sun's North Pole at the onset of a new solar cycle. We've never done this before." Discoveries like this are not uncommon

with the satellite. The spacecraft uses a radioactive thermal generator to produce power for its systems, but the device loses its ability to generate power over time as the radioisotopes decay. Now, much of its equipment cannot

run simultaneously.

This made scientists shut down its X-band transmitter, a move that was supposed to release 60 watts of power to the heater and scientific instruments. The transmitter would have been turned on only when data was to be transmitted back to Earth, allowing the satellite to run for up to another two

To the dismay of scientists however the radio transmitter did not come back on; however, small quantities of data can be sent to Earth through its alternate S-band transmitter.

"The decision to switch the transmitter off was not taken lightly. It was the only way to continue the science mission," said Richard Marsden, ESA project scientist and mission manager. NASA/ESA engineers believe the problem is from the transmitters power supply, they believe the extra energy could not be routed to the places they wanted.

When parts of the spacecraft reach 36 F, the fuel lines will start freezing and blocking. This blockage would make it impossible to maneuver the satellite. The team expects to keep collecting data from Ulysses for the next few weeks.

Even with all the hard knocks this spacecraft, built by Dornier Systems of Germany for ESA, has taken; scientists still plan to "squeeze the very last drop[s] of science out of that they can. Marsden describes Ulysses as a "terrific old workhorse." He pointed out that "It has produced great science and lasted much longer than we ever thought it





If you are in need of a new favorite place to eat in Daytona, Siam Spice is your new hot spot, offering great Thai flavor

for reasonable prices.

Located on the corner of Beach St. and Bay St., one block north of International Speedway Boulevard, Siam Spice occupies what was once Martinis. The restaurant has been updated and the space opened up with more tables for seating and a placid atmosphere. Martinis' waterfall stayed and adds to the overall soothing feel of the eatery. As an added bonus, you can show off how cultured you are in this ideal date setting.

Siam's menu gives a wide range of choices, even for picky eaters. Entrees all of the traditional favorites, including Pad Thai, a concoction of rice noodles and stir-fried vegetables tossed in a tangy sauce, served up wonderfully with chicken. The menu also includes an excellent array of curries, East Asian favorites, seafood dishes such as Pad Talay (shrimp, squid, and scallops with veggies and Thai chili jam) and multiple variations of duck

multiple variations of duck.

Possible appetizers include spring rolls served with a brilliant plum sauce, chicken satay served with a small searing grill and a cool spicy peanut sauce, and various other dumpling and wonton dishes. Siam also offers classic savory soups such as Tom Kha Gai (chicken and coconut milk) and Tom Yum Goong (lemon grass soup), as well as a full bar.

Having frequented Siam Spice, I have had the fortune to sample much of what the restaurant's extensive menu has to

offer. The red and yellow curries are perfectly spiced, with just the right amount of heat to take full advantage of the dish's flavor. The jasmine rice served along with most of the dishes is also perfectly cooked. Without being overpowering, the Pad Ped (stir-fried red curry with bamboo shoots, onions, and bell pepper) is a great choice for those looking for a spicier

However, if you do desire some extra heat, each table is provided with a chili tray for last minute tweaks. The chicken satay and spring rolls provide great openers to the meal, as they are well portioned and great for sharing.

Siam Spice, offers up great food and adds a little culture to historically uncultured city. Along with the sushi and fusion restaurant Ronin on International Speedway and Beach, that area of the city is becoming an Asian culinary center in the Daytona Beach

Game of the Week: 'The Last Stand




