## CRASH CLAIMS LIFE OF EMBRY-RIDDLE STUDENT



Richard Milsoe

Richard Milsoe was killed at New Smyrna when the plane he was flying stalled and spun into the ground.

A native of Owatonna, Minnesota, he enlisted in the Air Force and served with an F-111 unit in Southeast Asia before coming to Riddle in 1971.

He was a member of the ERAU ROTC unit, and had just returned from a very successful field training at MacDill, 2 days before the mishap.

Richard was an incredibly likable guy. Friends recall never seeing him frown. He was well known on campus having worked as dispatcher at the ERAU flight line last spring.

Richard lived at the control tower building at New Smyrna, where he worked for Ed Wilkinson. The accident occurred on a gusty Monday just after making a banner pickup.

He was quite qualified for this type of work, having over 400 hours. He was familiar with stalls both in the practical and theoretical sense. Often he would practice spins in a rented cub with friends in his spare time. Also, he had taken Marge Walker's CFI ground-

school and was fully knowledgeable as to the aerodynamics involved.

After making a clean pickup of the banner, the low powered Aerona 70 aircraft climbed out just over the nearby trees when a gust evidently caused the plane to stall. Milsoe jettisoned the banner but had already started to spin. In an attempt to stop the spin he reduced power, but the aircraft hit the ground before he could recover.

One might wonder why such an underpowered aircraft was used to pull the long banner (complete with new, heavier letters than had previously used) and why the pickup pole was located so close to the tree line.

An autopsy revealed there were no medical factors that may have influenced the accident.

### TEACHER EXAMS TO BE GIVEN -

College seniors preparing to teach school may take the National Teacher Examinations on any of the four different test dates announced today by Educational Testing Service, a nonprofit, educational organization which prepares and administers this testing program.

New Dates for the testing of Prospective teachers are: November 10, 1973, and January 26, April 6, and July

20, 1974. The tests will be given at nearly 500 locations throughout the United States, ETS said.

Results of the National Teacher Examinations are used by many large school districts as one of several factors in the selection of new teachers and by several states for certification or licensing of teachers. Some colleges also require all seniors preparing to teach to take the examinations. The

school systems and state departments of education which use the examination results are listed in an NTE leaflet entitled Score Users which may be obtained by writing to ETS.

On each full day of testing, prospective teachers may take the Common Examinations which measure their professional preparation and general educational background and an Area Examination which measures their mastery

of the subject they expect to teach.

Prospective teachers should contact the school systems in which they seek employment, or their colleges, for specific advice on which examinations to take and on which dates they should be taken.

The Bulletin of Information for Candidates contains a list of test centers, and information about the examinations, as well as a Registra-

tion Form. Copies may be obtained from college placement officers, school personnel departments, or directly from National Teacher Examinations, Box 911, Educational Testing Service, Princeton, New Jersey 08540.

## Editorial

### Consistency

We call the governing policies of our country, laws. Although they are not always perfect they are by and large consistent. By consistent, I mean they stay virtually the same through the years. Revisions, of course, are inevitable as people and morals change. However, these changes are accompanied by thorough research and discussion.

I feel that a university should also have consistency in the policies it sets forth to its student body. These policies mean as much to us as laws do to our country.

An example of inconsistency in this University has recently come to my attention. It involves the USAFI scores and the acceptable percentile for class credit in a given course. One year ago the acceptable percentile was raised from

the 25th percentile to the 50th percentile and now, beginning this trimester, 20 percent is to be considered the acceptable amount.

If we are to have peace between the administration and the student body, rules should be established and adhered to. Let us know where we stand and where our goals are. Let us not have to worry about major changes on a yearly basis which necessitates the reevaluation of all our collegiate plans. When policies are established, listen to the student representatives and thoroughly research the problem and possible solutions. Just because a person has a PhD, it does not mean that person is infallible. Where a change is necessary, make sure it is in the best interest of both the students and the university.

## JUSTICE AND THE AMERICAN WAY

The Academic Policies Committee is a body of faculty members and two students who review student petitions for exception to policy. When they have completed their review and have reached a decision, they pass the decision on to Dean Motzel, Dean of Academics, in the form of a recommendation. He then makes the final decision.

This office called and asked what were the rules for a person other than a committee member to attend a meeting. The secretary with whom we spoke told us the meetings were "closed" and furthermore, so were the minutes of the meeting.

I later spoke personally to Dean Sain, chairman of the committee and he verified the statement. He further stated there are two reasons why the meetings are closed.

First, he explained, there are times when the subjects discussed might

be personal in nature and second, there is just not enough room in the committee room. I can understand why sometimes certain sessions might be held behind closed doors to prevent embarrassment of a student, but for the routine matters, I cannot. As for the crowded room idea, a classroom could very easily be used. I hope no one would consider it degrading to relinquish his knightly seat at the "round table" in favor of a better representation of ideas.

Further, Dean Sain explained the way in which the meetings are conducted. When a student petitions the committee he has the right to appear and state his case. Sounds good, but here is how it really works. When the subject is to be brought to the floor for discussion, a faculty member is called upon to state the particulars of the case as he sees them.

Flight instruction is done here at Riddle with the Air Force responsible for ground instruction. Major LaFaille is the one to see!

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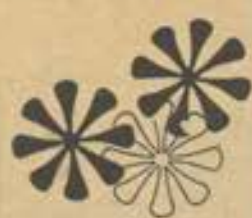

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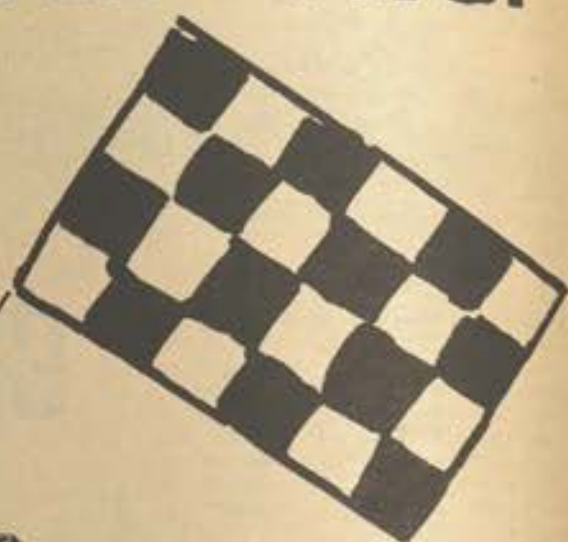

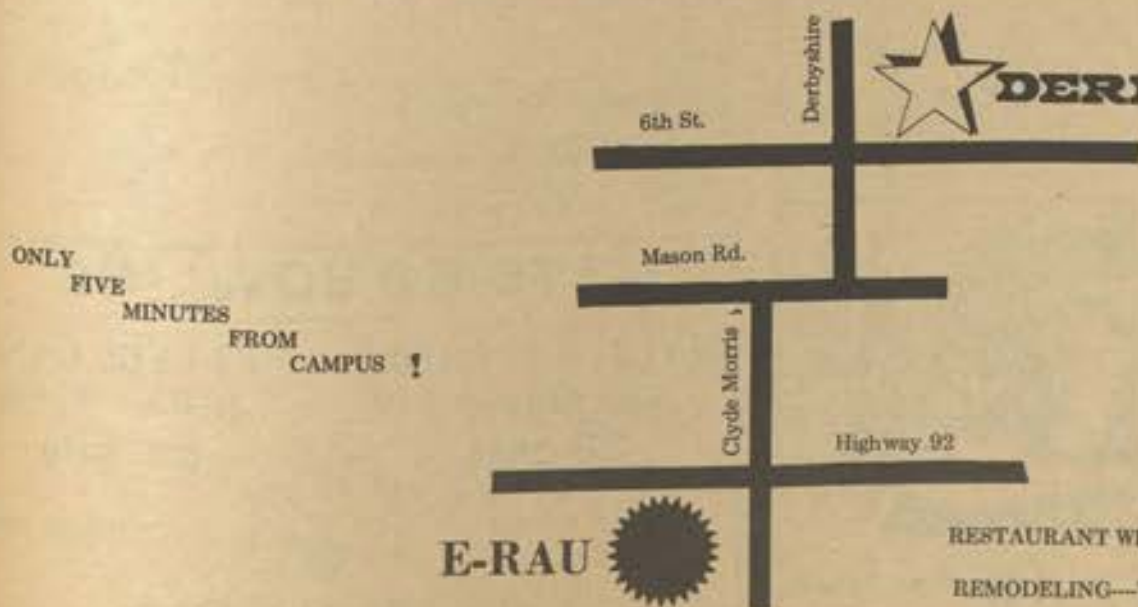
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## ERAU Welcomes New Staff Member

## Heart Screening Service Now Available In County

A free heart screening service is being offered by the local chapter of the American Heart Association, The Heart Association of Volusia County and the Volusia County Medical Society, Dr. Robert King, county health director, announced today.

"Heart disease is America's number one killer. In 1972 in Florida, 30,626 deaths were attributed to it. In Volusia alone, 1,576 deaths were caused by heart disease. An estimated 27 million Americans are afflicted by heart and blood vessel diseases," said King.

King said smoking, high blood pressure, lack of regular exercise, overweight, diabetes, high levels of cholesterol or triglycerides in the blood or a family history of heart disease could make a person a likely candidate for heart disease.

"Early detection can be prevention," he said. "The free service is not

diagnostic in nature, but designed primarily as a screening for abnormalities are discerned, referrals will be made to the patient's private physician with follow up services."

The service will include medical histories, physical data, electrocardiograms, blood pressure measurements, blood chemistry tests and urinalysis. It is available to all county residents between 20 and 60 who aren't under a physician's care for heart disease.

The examination and screening procedure takes about 20 minutes. To make an appointment, call 255-0111 Ext. 295, Volusia County Health Dept., 440 S. Beach St.

The table was garnished with delectable finger sandwiches and a tasty punch (non-alcoholic).

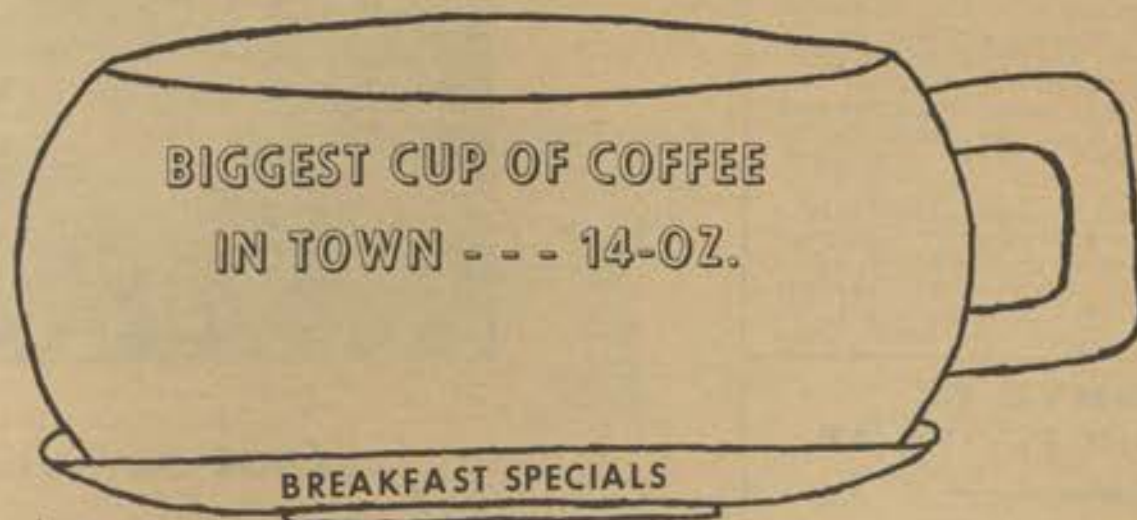
The mood was light and cheerful and everyone seemed to enjoy themselves.

Classics. The 3.86-mile circuit includes a sharp left and right hand sweeper on the long back straight near the third turn of the speedway proper.

"I'm sure this new chicane on the long back stretch will make the competition even closer," said Bishop. Some of the cars that might have had a slight advantage on the regular road and track course where sheer horsepower counted, may now find they need a lot of braking, close handling and a lot of acceleration for the new obstacle on the backstretch," concluded Mr. Bishop.

The Camel 250 for machines such as Corvettes, Camaros, Mustangs, Porches, etc., will be conducted over the regular international road and track course.

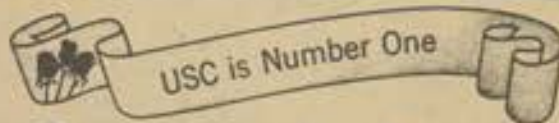
Left on the 1973 IMSA schedule before Daytona are Lime Rock, Conn., on
