J-lot opens to students

Yesterday, March 30, E-RAU maintenance personnel proceeded to paint and mark off a line of 45 parking spaces inside the J-lot parking area. The spaces will now be available for students.

J-lot is the parking area which flanks the east side of the academic complex here on campus. The entire area used to be reserved only for faculty and staff. But now, 45 parking spaces that stretch across the far east edge of J-lot have been marked with bright yellow lines and the word "student" has been printed on each spot. The remaining spaces will still be reserved for faculty and staff.

According to Joe Craddock, campus Chief of Security, the decision to convert the parking spaces was proposed by the campus Traffic Control Committee, and the plan was approved by Provost Jack Fidel.

"We took a look at the situation and decided to delegate a certain area of J-lot for the students." Craddock commented, "This should alleviate any parking problems and satisfy everyone."

Craddock went on to state that there should be no misunderstanding as to where the students can park. Faculty and staff spaces will remain marked with white lines, and the student parking area is contrasted with yellow markings.

Future managers need ability to change with time

Prior to addressing the members of Omicron Delta Kappa, a National Leadership Honor Society, Mr. Bill Key, the Director of Industrial Relations for Lockheed-Georgia, was interviewed about the challenges facing the management of aircraft manufacturers and the operations of his company.

Key believes that the success of future managers will be dependent upon their ability to manage change. American business has moved away from the "comfort level," and this move Key believes has made strategic long-range planning a necessity.

At Lockheed-Georgia, longterm plans are reevaluated at least once a week. He does not foresee any major engineering breakthroughs within his industry within the next decade, but believes that technical breakthroughs will have to occur in the field of economics, "The name of the game, is economics," he states, "both from a producer standpoint and a user standpoint."

Another challenge he sees facing his industry is the need to give adequate attention to creating the knowledgeable management and production work force which it will need during the next ten years. Most training programs, he believes will be 'in-house' and accredited. Other industry-wide changes which he expects include reduction of the semi-skilled labor force and establishment of entry level pay rates.

Since Lockheed announced that it would cease production of the popular L-1011 Tri-Star, which is produced in Palmdale, California, it has assumed the role solely of a military and space contractor. This move has long been encouraged by the financial community.

When questioned about the decision, Key explained that Lockheed had built the Electra, Constellation

and L-1011 because someone with authority said that the company should be in the commercial aircraft business. He said that Lockheed "would not re-enter the commercial market unless we were not only able to compete, but to succeed."

Although Pan American Airways had indicated that L-1011-500's are more suitable to its long-range, overwater route system than either the new Boeing 757 or 767, and both Boeing and Airbus Industry had been approached to continue production of the L-1011, Key indicated that it was doubtful that another manufacturer would continue its production. Boeing is currently involved in the production and marketing of two new aircraft and the L-1011 is a direct competitor with Airbus' A-300.

Key is responsible for the hiring

Lockheed-Georgia does not seek candidates for employment who have just graduated with a Masters degree. He said these employees usually are disillusioned with their job and change jobs at least once.

Another large problem is graduates' beliefs that there is a line of demarcation between workers and management. Key says there is none, instead "Everybody works." However Lockheed-Georgia does have its own masters program with Georgia Tech and Georgia State, Later Key's associate, Mr. Ronnie Rainwater, Director of Professional Employment at Lockheed-Georgia, stressed the importance of an applicant's interest in the company, and his ability to communicate as being basic to his ability to accomplish the assigned task.

Airport expansion

30 acres available for development

The construction you must have noticed on the block of land between Clyde Morris, Volusia and Cataline is only the beginning of the Daytona Beach Regional Airport's expansion plans. The road being constructed will open up approximately 30 acres for development into an office park, at an initial cost of \$600,000. Two multimillion dollar restaurants proposed by General Mills may also be located in the area next to the office park if all goes smoothly.

The construction taking place now involves laying water and sewer pipes for their "Spinal Road." Once completed this land will be ready for development. Several real estate brokers have been appointed by the County Council to solicit interested parties who will build on this parcel. At the moment no concrete plans have been made nor have any leases been signed. Rent generated from the office park will go to the airport for use in its expansion plans.

The area of land by Volusia and Midway at the airport entrance is the proposed site of two new large restaurants. A division of General Mills is planning on building these elegant eating establishments, Case Gallardio and Good Earth, which will require \$3-5 million in land improvements. Case Gallardio is a restaurant famous in the Orlando area for its posh interior and grand atmosphere. As of this time General Mills has been given a lease but the deal has not been finalized. Following signing of the lease, construction should begin within several months bringing the airport much needed annual revenue.

These developments on airport property are only the tip of the iceberg. As the airport is able to generate more revenue it will be able to implement more of its Master Plan. The formation of the master Plan in 1979 was based on expected increases in traffic and called for a new terminal to be built. Traffic since the study has not increased as was expected so concrete measures have not been taken, except for plans to generate more funds. To date the airport is working on the schematics of a new terminal by reviewing data, estimating necessary space for operations, and considering what additional measures will be needed. Final decisions will be made after everything has been considered and sufficient revenue from leases has been generated.

Construction halted on Raquetball courts

Construction of the student raquetball courts has been halted due to what Daytona Beach Provost Jack Fidel terms, "a re-evaluation of the proposed location."

According to the Provost, the site is being re-evaluated to determine if the proposed location is being utilized to its best advantage.

The foundation for the raquetball courts has already been laid west of the swimming pool.

Bruce Croft, Director of Facilities and Development says that points being discussed include plans for different implementation methods, as well as which way the building should face.

Mr. Hunt and Dr. Ledewitz are presently reviewing the plans for the courts," Croft said. Though he declined to comment further, Croft did admit that with all the other construction projects currently underway on this campus and at Prescott, the raquetball courts "are not the highest priority."

"I'm hoping the courts will be up by mid-April," Provost Fidel volunteered. Costs are projected to be approximately \$150,000. According to Fidel, the funds are committed to the project.

Crippled Seminole lands flawlessly

On Wednesday afternoon, March 24, as the weather in the Daytona area was approaching visual flight minimums, Piper Seminole N57ER demonstrating a shortfield landing at New Smyna Beach airport. Upon touchdown, the left wing dipped radically, thus forcing a goaround. The Embry-Riddle twin engine trainer had lost its left main tanding gear. None of the three persons on board were injured during the emergency landing which insued at Daytona Beach Regional Airport.

Dr. Tony DiGirolamo spoke at length concerning the incident. When demonstrating the short field landing at New Smyrna, instructor pilot Lloyd Bernstein noticed the left wing dip excessively. Full power was applied in order to execute a go-around as those on board saw that the left main landing gear had broken and was attached by hydraulic lines. About 20 or 30 minutes later the lines severed and the gear fell into a swamp."

On board were instructor pilot Lloyd Bernstein, student Barry Connell, and observer Craig Korsgard. According to Dr. DiGirolamo, "none of the three pilots on board indicated that a hard landing had taken place. At this point, we have absolutely no idea of why that gear let go. The FAA is sending an investigation team down to possibly determine what happened. We simply do not know why the gear came off."

Out of this unfortunate incident, a few sparks of luck are evident. Fortunately, at the time of the incident, Tom Kirton, multi-engine flight director, was sitting on the ground at New Smyrna Beach Airport. As Dr. DiGirolamo explained, "Tom saw the incident, immediately took off and started to talk to the crew and describe the damage to them.

At this point, the crew called Riddle Operations and we put into effect our emergency plan. These procedures put the chief pilot in direct contact with the airplane, so as to give the proper instructions to insure maximal safety."

During this particular incident

Paul McDuffey was the chief pilot. McDuffey maintained contact with the aircraft while assimilating information from several other sources. Dr. DiGirolamo furthered his explanation of the emergency ground procedures, "We touched base with the Piper Aircraft Co., as well as the chief mechanic at DBA. With input received from all parties, we determined that just prior to touchdown, the left engine should be feathered and that the left propeller be in a horizontal position. We determined that 25 degrees of flaps to slow the airplane would be necessary."

Bernstern conquerred and complied with the instructions he received from Riddle-Operations.

Soon after they received instructions, the crew aboard PA-44, N57ER reviewed their emergency procedures. At the same time, on the ground at Daytona, fire trucks and other support equipment were screaming toward the approach end of runway 24R. Early in the incident there was speculation as to whether foaming the runway was a wise safety precaution. Mr. Michael McMahon, Aviation Safe-

ty Engineer spoke about foam, "In this situation we decided against foam for a couple of reasons. First of all, time was not on our side, in order to sufficiently foam the runway we would have needed too much valuable time. The weather was already IFR and deteriorating," A second reason Mr. McMahon pointed out was that an extremely large section of runway needs foam for any effect at all, in this case the aircraft would have gone in and out of the foam too quickly. Since weather was below visual minimums, the injured aircraft came into Daytona's runway 24R on an instrument approach, Runway 24R was closed to accomodate the emergency landing, amazingly, the runway was only down for 17 minutes. There was no delay to any of Eastern or Delta airlines' departures or arrivals.

As aircraft 57 echo romeo droned out of the clouds, an extremely tense crowd of about 200 students and faculty watched with hopeful eyes. Instructor pilot Bernstein executed the emergency landing with textbook perfection. Dr. DiGirolamo went into detail as to the last moments of the flight.

"If you saw, he touched down on the right main gear. Just prior to touchdown he feathered the other (right) engine and also put the prop in the horizontal position. The airplane slowed down, when it reached the end of its landing roll as the left wing settled into the grass and the airplane came to a gentle left turning stop." Greater damage was avoided by the pilot's timely act of landing well left of the centerline so the wing would acrape on grass rather than concrete.

Concerning the incident, Dean DiGirolamo had nothing but praise for those involved. "There was minimal damage to the airplane, the pilot who flew the airplane and the student pilot sitting left seat all did an outstanding job. I have to attribute these actions to our training program." Physical damage to the aircraft includes a very scraped fiberglass wing-tip, a bent left aileron, a bent and scraped left flap, and of

Editorial

The entire Avion staff has taken critical note of the March 17 issue of The Avion, an issue marked by fervent attack. The staff at this time would like to address these problems and announce some new policies arising from them.

However, in this case as in many others, the writer preferred not to have his name printed, thereby allowing no counter remarks to be made.

To deter this from happening again the staff has unnanimously decided to require names on all letters printed. As for future letters written to the editor the policy of "run as is" will be used. In the case that numerous errors are found in a letter it will be held for corrections. No major changes will be made in types of letters accepted, but writers may be asked to tone down the content of their letters. Realizing that The Avion is the only way many students have to air opinions, the staff will try to keep censorship down to a minimum.

An editorial comment must also be made concerning Julien P. Oleon's editorial. As part of the Editorial Staff of *The Avion*, Mr. Oleon has the right to write prearranged editorials. In this case it may have been in bad taste to allow him to review the election, but *The Avion* has and will stand behind its staff members.

The Avion does make mistakes, but we strive to avoid errors. Our track record attests to our resolve.

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

Students intending to take an FAA Written Exam are required to sign up with Kathy Arnold, Ext. 1307 in office D-200 prior to exam day.

At the time of the exam, each student must present a Written Authorization form signed by an appropriate Aeronautical Science Division Ground Instructor, or the failed results of a previous FAA Written Exam and present as personal identification an Airman Certificate, driver's license, or other official document.

Explanation of application forms and procedures will be given at 0830. Immediately thereafter, testing will commence, and unless prior arrangements have been made, late examinees will not be permitted to enter the examining area while testing is in progress.



Our future members will also be a part of this weekend. The pledges are permitted to attend NATCON.






