## Desert Storm rages in the Gulf

### Saddam Hussein caught with his planes down in Iraq



And the rocket's red glare... A Tomahawk cruise missile launch lights the night sky and the deck of the USS Wisconsin early Friday morning.

Nicosia, Cyprus (AP) Saddam Hussein appears to be conserving part of his air force from the allied air offensive for a possible counterpunch against the expected ground assault on Kuwait, Western military analysts said Monday.

"Where is the Iraqi air force? It doesn't appear to be making any serious attempt to take on allied air power and we don't believe it's been completely destroyed," said Hans-Heino Kopietz, a longtime specialist in Middle East military affairs.

Hans Binnendijk, an analyst with the London-based International Institute of Strategic Studies, said: "We shouldn't work on the assumption that the Iraqi air force is totally out of action. It must still be considered a threat." One main objective of the offensive was to

eliminate as many of Iraq's estimated 700 combat aircraft as possible.

That would leave Saddam's 540,000 troops in the Kuwait area exposed to allied air power before a ground assault was launched.

Military officials are reluctant to give details of the damage the huge allied air strikes have inflicted on Saddam's air power since the offensive began before dawn last Thursday.

U.S. Air Force Maj. Gen. Burton Moore said Monday that in more than 8,000 sorties flown since Thursday, the allied air force has only shot down 17 Iraqi jets.

He said 14 allied aircraft—nine U.S., three British, one Italian and one Kuwaiti—have been lost. Most are believed to have been downed by ground fire or surface-to-air mis-

siles. Moore conceded that allied attacks on Saddam's fixed and mobile surface-to-surface missile launchers have not been completely successful.

But he stressed, without elaboration, that "the results to date suggest we're well on the way to our objectives."

Allied pilots have reported being surprised by the lack of Iraqi air opposition, although Saddam's so-called "eagles" showed little stomach for dogfighting in the 1980-88 war against Iran.

Israeli analysts estimated at the weekend that 100 to 150 of Iraq's combat jets had been destroyed in the allied offensive.

But allied officials declined to indicate how much of Saddam's air force has been knocked out on the ground in repeated attacks on air bases around the country.

"I've heard a figure of 15 percent of the Iraqi air force taken out, but that would still leave around 500 aircraft," said Kopietz, formerly with the IISS and now a consultant in London. "The thinking is that Saddam is conserving his air strength for a counterpunch at the appropriate time."

A Saddam statement broadcast by Baghdad radio Sunday said Iraq has used only a fraction of its military assets so far and Iraqi communiques warn that the allies are in for "a surprise."

That could be nothing more than Iraqi rhetoric to bolster the morale of the country's 17 million people as they shelter from the allied warplanes screaming over their cities every day.

But Western analysts suspect that Saddam has simply decided to save as much of his air force as he can and wait for a chance to strike back at a time of his choosing.

"Everyone's quite amazed at the way the Iraqis have just disappeared. Where did they go? I suspect things are not going as well as the allies initially expected and that the Iraqis have a surprise up their sleeve," Kopietz said.

Binnendijk noted: "The number of Iraqi aircraft claimed destroyed is extremely low."

"I'm sure there are quite a number that are still operational."

"My guess is that several hundred aircraft were destroyed on their airfields. But there are probably quite a number, apparently in hardened shelters, and these are still a significant threat."

"The allies have hit the airfields over and over, cratering the runways. But these can be repaired and made operational again."

"Saddam is probably keeping something in reserve to use against the allied ground forces when they make their move so he'll have some air cover."

Binnendijk noted that if Saddam has a force of aircraft still useable, he may not be able to control them effectively, vector onto attacking allied jets, because his command-and-control system has been heavily damaged.

In the first 48 hours of combat, allied pilots reported seeing Iraqi jets fleeing northward.

But over the weekend, U.S. squadrons at Incirlik airbase in southern Turkey began flying attack missions against Iraq and Saddam's northern airfields were probably among their targets. It is not known what damage these raids have caused.

One of the biggest problems in getting a career moving is having connections or contacts within an industry or organization. The Career Center exists to assist Embry-Riddle students in making contacts and in getting information on where jobs are to be found.

Career Day 1991 will occur on Thursday, January 24. This event gives students and some alumni the chance to meet representatives of various corporations, not exclusively in the aviation industry.

According to Career Center Director Rick Merlin, 40 employers will be here to accept resumes and meet prospective employees. "Economic conditions," said Mr. Merlin, "made this a feat."

The Career Day activities start on Wednesday evening, when there will be a reception for the company representatives in Spruance Hall, but this will be attended by invited guests only. Thursday morning, the Career Center and company representatives will be setting up professional displays along with tables in the John Paul Riddle Student Center. At 9:30 a.m. Thursday, students will be let through to view the displays, collect

company literature, and chat with representatives, Merlin said. Please make a note, however, that from 12 noon until 1:30 p.m. there will be a lunch break, and then the event will continue until 4:00 p.m.

On Friday, the day after Career Day, many companies will remain to interview some of those they came in contact with at the booths. So students and alumni are encouraged to treat Career Day as a chance to get an interview with some of the attending companies.

Primarily, students who are recently graduated or those who are graduating this spring or summer are urged to attend. They should bring resumes, dress professionally, and be ready to sell themselves, Merlin suggested. The atmosphere on Career Day is not pressured like an interview, however. It is a good event for students beginning a search into fields of interest. Merlin commented that they could get advice for the future, and, simply, it could be fun to talk with the representatives.

## Moxley passes away

Embry-Riddle lost a well-liked and respected faculty member over the winter break. Frank H. Moxley, an Associate Professor in Aviation Business Administration, died on December 23. He was 63 years old. As many might remember, Moxley suffered a stroke during a management class last term.

According to the biography written in the Independent Studies course literature for MS 419, on which Moxley was recently working, he earned a BS in engineering from the U.S. Naval Academy. It also stated that he attained an MBA from Columbus College, Georgia, and he went on to get a MS in Statistics and Operations Research from Case Western Reserve. He was trained as a pilot and received a BS in Aeronautical Engineering from the Air Force.

Moxley, who was born in Wadley, Georgia, came to Embry-Riddle in 1982. In his career, Moxley was a maintenance officer in Line and Field Maintenance for the Air Force and a staff officer at the SAC Headquarters. He received two Commendation Medals, for his SAC assignment and for being a Research and Development

Specialist in the USAF Systems Command. Moxley served in Korea and Vietnam, earning two Air Medals and a nomination for the Distinguished Flying Cross.

In the public sector, Moxley worked for Pan American World Airways in a few positions and began his own commuter airline service, of which he was president. He had also done some professional writing, the last work being the course developed for Embry-Riddle's Department of Independent Studies. He wrote many articles on Reliability Centered Maintenance and coauthored a Dept. of Defense work on Weapon System Cost Effectiveness.

After suffering his stroke, Moxley's courses were sustained by Dr. Donald Campbell until the end of the term.

In addition to being a good teacher, Moxley was very active with the Lacrosse team and fraternities.

A memorial service for Moxley took place on Sunday, January 20, 1991. Dr. John Wheeler led the service in the campus chapel. Fr. Keenan Morris attended, and many spoke highly of Moxley, including his office mate, Trinavskis, and several students.

## Fuel cost threatens USA airlines

Tempe, Ariz. (AP) The Persian Gulf crisis could destroy America's airlines within a few weeks if the federal government does not ease the economic energy crunch, the head of America West Airlines says.

"This is a different kind of an energy crisis than we've ever had," Ed Beauvais said. "It's not a supply problem; it's a price problem."

Beauvais, who reported earlier this week his company lost \$50 million in the fourth quarter despite a 27 percent increase in revenue passenger miles, said airlines lost \$2 billion in 1990, \$1.5 billion of it in the final three months as jet fuel prices soared after Iraq invaded Kuwait on August 2.

Addressing the South West Transit Association conference on Tuesday, Beauvais said that if the industry "loses another \$1 billion to \$1.5 billion," in the first three months of this year, "it will wipe out the entire net worth of the United States commercial aviation industry."

He said the federal government could ease the situation by allowing oil companies to dip into the Strategic Petroleum Reserve.

In exchange for agreeing to sell fuel to the airlines at preannounced prices.

Beauvais said America West is paying \$32 million to \$35 million a month for fuel, compared with \$16 million a month before the invasion.

Damage in the airline industry in turn will damage the general economy, and the impact will be felt for years, he added.

With fewer carriers will come less competition, higher prices and perhaps more limited service, he said, and the limping survivors then would find themselves unable to finance their recovery.

## Ku Klux Klan is pelted by crowd

Albany, N.Y. (AP) A handful of Ku Klux Klan members were pelted with snowballs and eggs Sunday when they showed up for a planned rally at the State Capitol to protest the state's Martin Luther King holiday.

The Ku Klux Klan rally never took place, but two counter-demonstrations drew an estimated 1,500 people to the Capitol. Protesters shouted obscenities at Klan members and briefly scuffled with police.

"We're fighting for white rights," William Dodge, who said he was a Klan member from Bristol, Connecticut, told a crowd that surrounded him and occasionally tossed snowballs at him.

State officials had given a permit to Wayne Crowley, a suburban Albany man, who said 25 Klan members would rally on the eve of the King holiday.

While that demonstration fizzled, some Klan members who did show up engaged in shouting matches with other protesters.

The state's Martin Luther King Institute for Non-Violence held a prayer vigil and the Albany National Association for the Advancement of Colored People chapter held a demonstration to denounce the Klan.

"No Klan activity in our community," demonstrators chanted as they marched in a park adjacent to the Capitol.

One man who wore a camouflage jacket with Ku Klux Klan emblazoned in black was hustled behind barricades by police.

Demonstrators lobbed snowballs and eggs at the man, who identified himself as Ron Demers.

"I came up here to meet with my associates and nobody's here," Demers told reporters.

"I personally don't believe Martin Luther King's birthday should be a national holiday I believe blacks

should be blacks and whites should be whites separation of the races."

Dodge, who claimed he was the head of Connecticut's KKK chapter, said he was annoyed at New York Klan members for "chickening out" of the rally. He said he was trying to erase the Klan's stigma of violence.

Dodge argued about the King holiday with a crowd that pressed against him. He eventually drove away as people pelted him and mounted Albany police officers with snowballs.

Several anti-Klan demonstrators tried to calm their angrier counterparts. David Macks, from Albany, shouted "I want a dialogue" when police led Demers away from the crowd.

"This ain't the Klan's kind of odds," Macks said. "It's daylight, they're outnumbered and they have no ropes and no guns."

Other demonstrators carried signs saying, "Albany is Proud to Honor Dr. King," and "Stop the Violence - No KKK, No War." Some participants said they were pleased that the rally they came to oppose never took place.

"This basically says that there's a lot of hope that racial hatred is on the way out," said Marlon Anderson, of Albany.

A scuffle with police broke out across the street from the Capitol when officers tried to clear a path for Dodge's car.

Spokesmen for Albany city police and State Capitol police said there were no arrests.

At the prayer vigil, Rabbi Martin Silverman said he was saddened that "hatemongers" would try to desecrate King's memory.

Gov. Mario Cuomo, who was in New York City on Sunday, said New Yorkers should "give the lie" to people who wanted to demonstrate their ignorance.

## Students protest against professors

(CPS)—A group of students and faculty members marched and rallied January 14 to get administrators at the University of Denver (DU) to kick two visiting professors off campus.

"The professors' studies, they say, promote sexism and racism."

Students in professors Charles Murray and Richard Herrnstein's class, however, disagree.

"They're (the protesters) here on personal vendettas," said Stephen Martin, a DU senior.

"We should be able to decide for ourselves" whether the professors have valid arguments, he added.

A coalition of professors, graduate students and others at the private school say the class, titled "Human Ability and Public Policy: Reconciling the Ideal of Equality and Reality of Differences," should be eliminated.

"I am opposed to racist and sexist doctrine being taught in the name of science," said Alan Gilbert, an international studies professor who is leading the protest.

His lectures are based on his research into the effects and importance of intelligence quotient (IQ) tests, generally contending that they do tend to be accurate measures of people's intellectual abilities.

Murray, a Bradley Fellow at the American Enterprise Institute in Washington, D.C., is the author of "Losing Ground," a 1984 book that argues that many social programs in America actually keep people impoverished, and should be abolished.

Their critics have vowed to attend every class session until the end of the semester of until officials agree to stop the course.

Students in the class argue they don't need to be protected from the ideas the two might present.

The protesters "don't have a right to go into class and hinder the educational process," complained John Greenwood, a DU junior.

"We cannot limit the ideas presented on this campus to only those that some people find acceptable," concurred Richard Lamm, director of DU's Center for Public Policy and Contemporary Issues, which invited Murray and Herrnstein to teach this semester.

In November, protesters at the universities of Vermont and California at Berkeley similarly disrupted classes of professors they said had made racist or sexist remarks.

At Berkeley, the offending prof had opined in an article in an alumni magazine that his school's policies made it harder for white students to be admitted to the university than minority students.

At DU, Gilbert charged that "these professors teach that upper-class high-IQ women should be at home breeding and that minorities are, in general, genetically unfit to be in the classroom."

Gilbert simply doesn't understand his targets' research, Herrnstein replied.

Many of Gilbert's accusations amount to "a collection of misattributions, misrepresentations and shallowness in understanding the literature," maintained Herrnstein, on leave from his regular post as chairman of Harvard University's psychology department.

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## Candlelight vigil in S.C. honors King, troops

On the eve of the U.N. Security Council deadline, a peace vigil was held in the Riddle Student Center. The vigil was in celebration of Dr. Martin Luther King's birthdate (he would have been 62) and to pray and express support for our troops stationed in Saudi Arabia. Brothers of the Wind sponsored the event, which occurred at 5:30 p.m. last Tuesday, January 15.

Earlier in the day, black and gold ribbons were given out. These ribbons were to be worn in support of Operation Desert Shield and the celebration of Dr. King's birthday.

Delannor Mance, the president of Brothers of the Wind, opened the event by inviting individuals to take a ceremonial candle from a table on the second level of the S.C. After nearly all of the candles were given out, Mance made a few comments on the purpose of the vigil.

"This is not an anti-war or war rally, just a ceremony to say we support our troops," Mance told the crowd of participants and observers.

Father Kenan Morris, the Campus Chaplain, prayed for peace in the Middle East and quoted the Prayer of St. Francis of Assisi.

After the prayer, Mance introduced a young woman, Gail, who said a few words about Dr.

King's life and achievements, which included receiving the 1964 Nobel Peace Prize. She also quoted from the noted peace activist's most famous speech, "I Have a Dream."

When the young woman was finished, Mance stepped to the podium and stated that if war breaks out in the Middle East, "bodies will be coming home in bags." The crowd grew more quiet. Mance then asked that students pay special respect to Arab students on campus, and even those who might look Arabic, reminding the crowd that we were not almost at war - at the time - with Arabs in general, but with Saddam Hussein.

## Self-Study survey given to students at activation

Students who participated in activation last week were greeted with an additional stopping point. A Student Opinion Survey was administered to approximately 1,700 students prior to activation. The survey was designed to assist Embry-Riddle in a critical self-examination (or self-study), evaluating services and program quality which is required for University reaccreditation.

"Since students are the central focus of the University, it is very important to solicit their input in making determinations regarding the adequacy and quality of services and academic programs," said Phyllis Salmon, a faculty member currently serving as the director of the self-study.

Deborah Osborne, Director of Institutional Research, added, "the cooperation and assistance provided by our students will provide a wealth of crucial information to facilitate the

Self-Study. We owe a debt of gratitude to everyone who participated in the survey project and we apologize for the inconvenience."

Although the survey is quite lengthy (eight pages) and required 15-20 minutes to complete, this was necessary to ensure a comprehensive review of Embry-Riddle functions. Although activation is a hectic time for students, it was chosen as the vehicle for survey administration because of the importance of generating a statistically valid sample by major. While no student was denied activation by refusing to participate in the survey, it was important to attempt to achieve full participation of those who were part of the sample group to avoid biased results.

The Student Opinion Survey was designed by and administered through the Office of Institutional Research based on the input of faculty, staff, and students serving on self-study committees throughout the University. It is one of three surveys being administered at this time as a part of the reaccreditation effort. Questionnaires designed for faculty and staff will provide additional vehicles for obtaining input from the Embry-Riddle community.

After several initial drafts were reviewed and modified, a group of students volunteered to participate in a pilot-test of the Student Opinion Survey. Additional modifications were made as a result of the valuable input provided by these volunteers. They, in fact, recommended activation as the "best" time to administer the survey to ensure high participation.

Faculty and staff have received the appropriate questionnaires and their responses are soon due to the Office of Institutional Research. While these projects are underway at the Daytona Beach campus, similar activity is simultaneously occurring at the Prescott campus and at the Embry-Riddle resident centers across the United States and Europe.

When asked how the survey results will be used, Salmon explained, "Institutional Research staff will tabulate completed surveys and report results to the self-study committees so that the data can be used in conjunction with other information collected over the past six months, such as budget figures, equipment and facilities data, audits, demographic information, etc., to determine whether Embry-Riddle is in compliance with the accreditation standards outlined in the Criteria for Accreditation adopted by the Commission on Colleges of the

Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS).

"The results of the Student Opinion Survey will provide integral data to assist in the identification of strengths and weaknesses at Embry-Riddle. Reports indicating these aspects of our University will be generated for submission to a Visiting Team from SACS who will make an on-site inspection early next year with the goal of ensuring the completeness and quality of the self-study. By that time, actions for improving any identified weaknesses at Embry-Riddle should be well underway."

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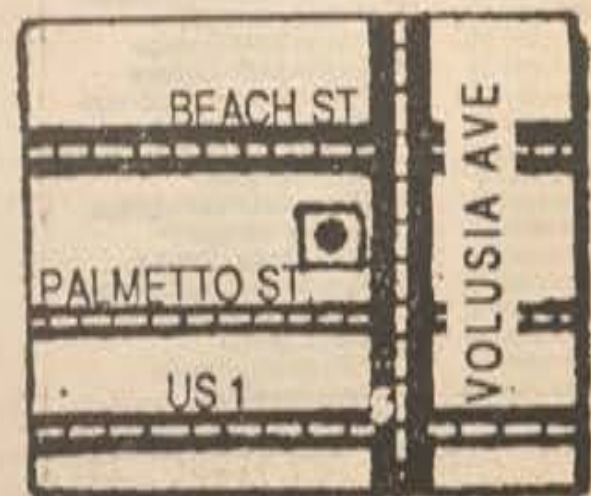

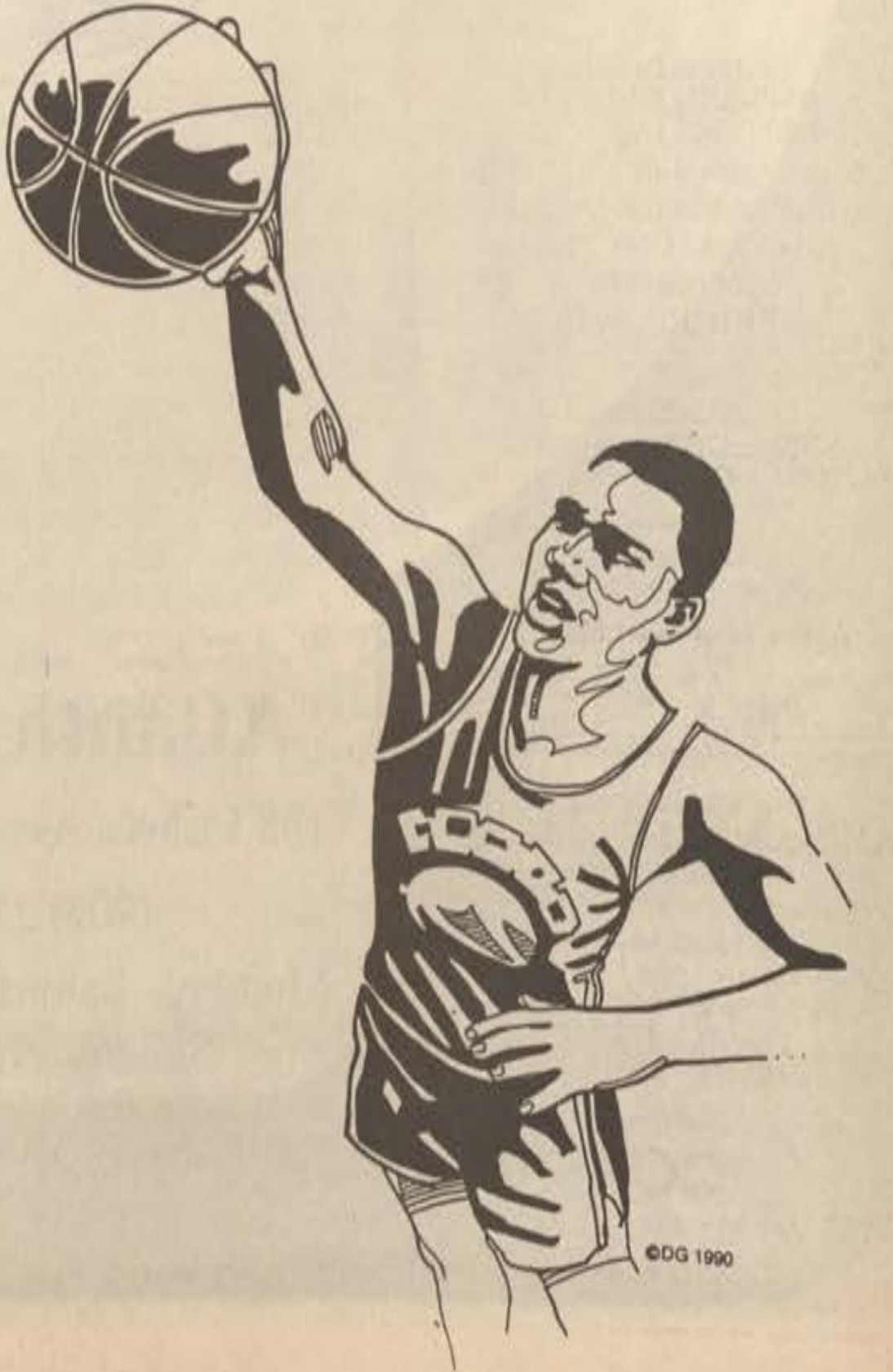

### Southeastern College

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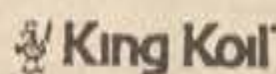
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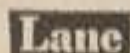
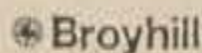
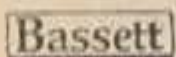
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# American Music Awards to air Monday

scored touchdowns. Once again, I would highly recommend this album to anyone.

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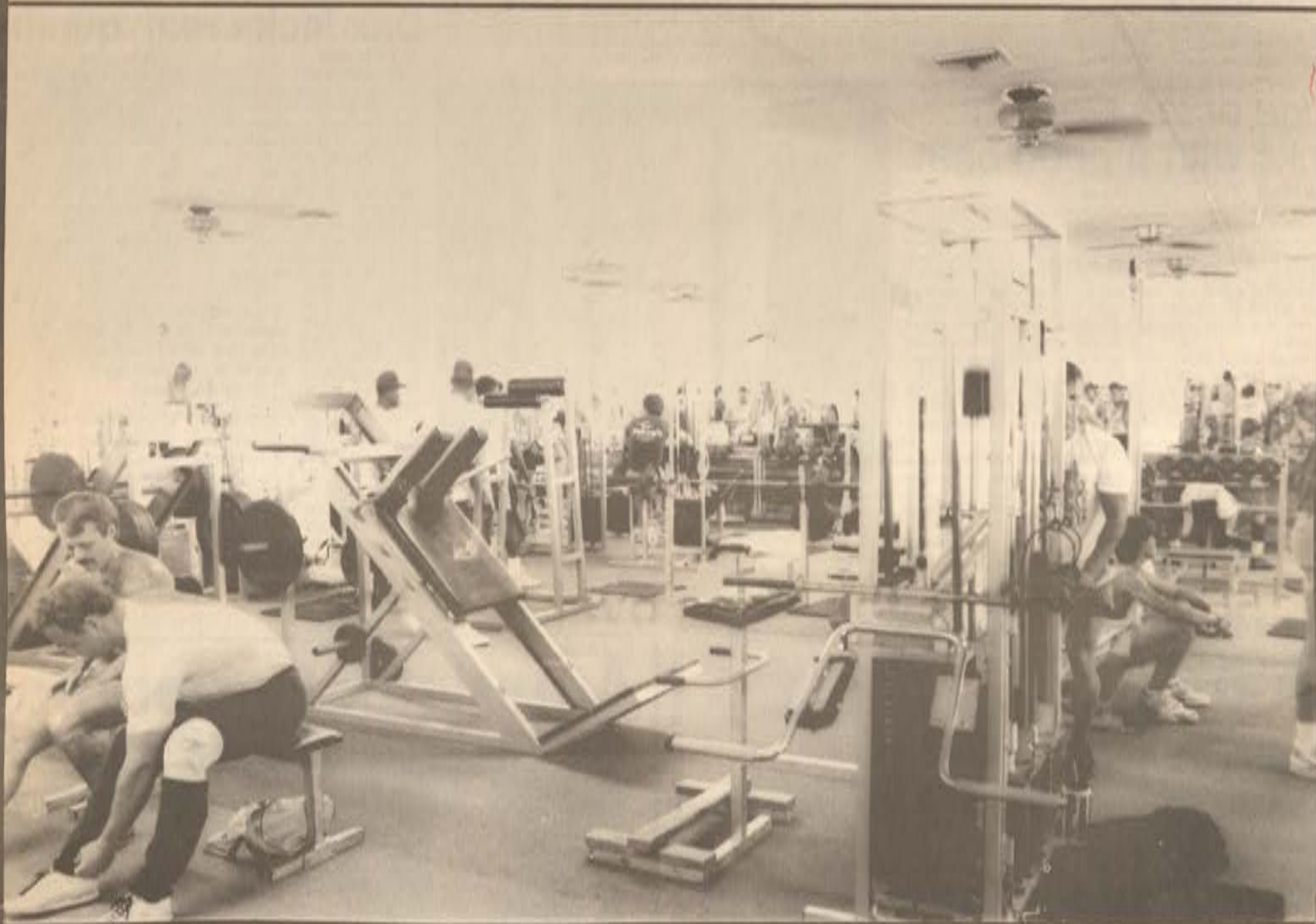
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
