**Tom DeLuca** - Famed hypnotist/comedian Tom DeLuca will take the audience on a bizarre travelogue which sets the tone for fun.

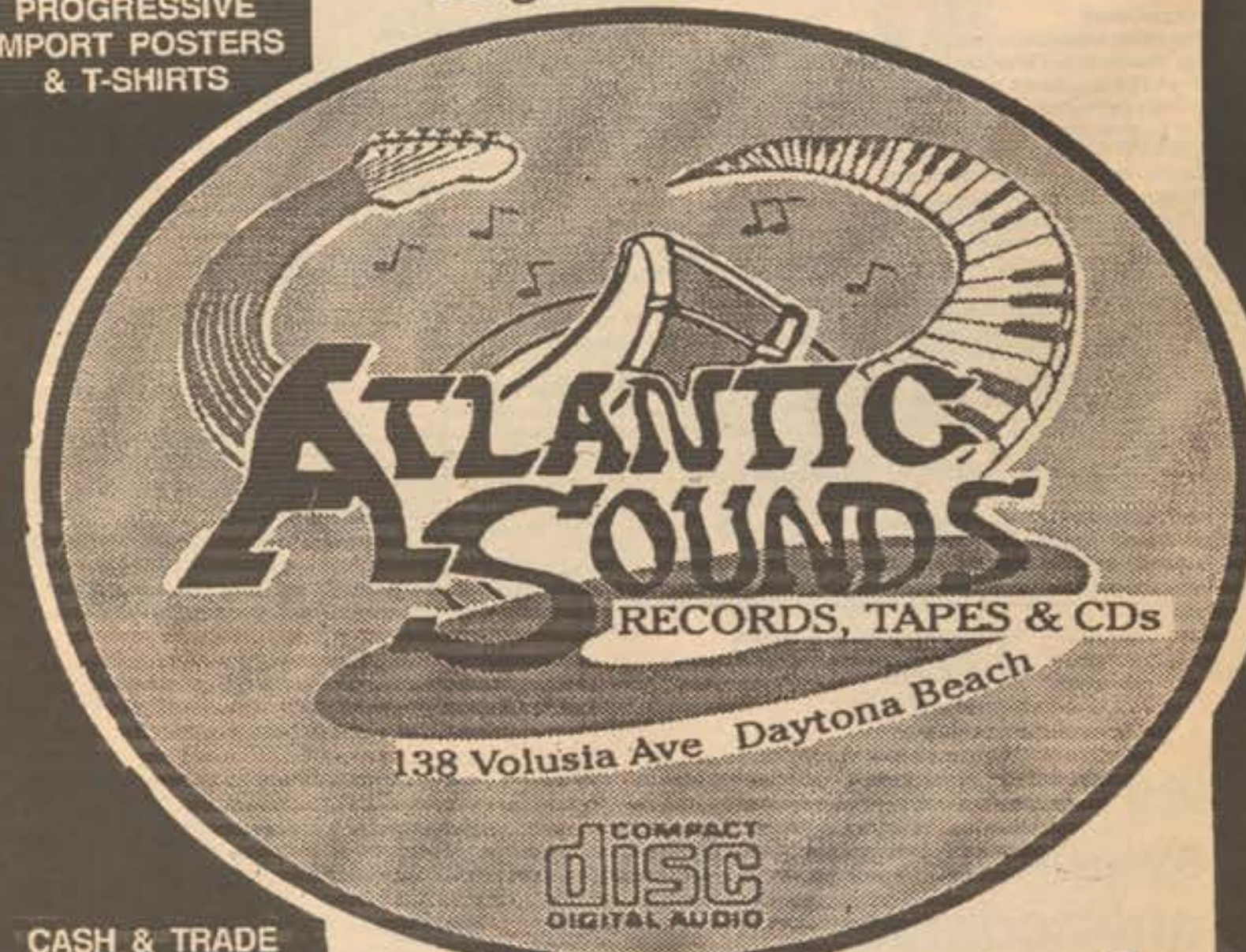

## Safety Department offers tips and services

### by the Safety Department

The Safety Department would like to welcome all new and returning students to the University. Our department is charged with providing for the security and safety of all University community members and visitors, as well as the protection of personal and University property. In addition, the Parking Services Division is responsible for maintaining a safe and efficient parking and traffic operation by assuring compliance with the Parking and Traffic Rules and Regulations.

Safety personnel are on duty 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Our main office is located in "M" Building, with office hours from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm, Monday through Friday. After hours or on weekends and holidays, we can be contacted at the switchboard in the John Paul Riddle Student Center. Our main office extension is 6480, or dial "0" to reach us at the switchboard. Both the Safety and Parking Services extensions may be dialed 24 hours a day, as switchboard personnel will answer the extensions after hours.

The parking Services Divisions a separate office lo-

cated within Student Center. This office is at the southeast corner of the building, facing Spruance Hall. Office are from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm, Monday through Friday. The Parking extension is 6482. All vehicles operated on campus must be registered with Parking Services. Once you register your vehicle, you will receive a copy of the current Rules and Regulations.

Below we have listed a number of workplace crime prevention tips and services available from the department. Please remember to report any incident or theft promptly, no matter how insignificant it may seem. If we don't know about it, we cannot address it.

### Workplace crime prevention tips:

Keep your purse, wallet, or other valuables with you -- or lock them in a drawer or closet.

Lock your office when you leave, even if you leave for just a minute.

Keep track of your keys. Don't lend them around. Park in a well-lighted and well-traveled area.

If you work late or at odd hours, walk with another employee, or contact the Safety Department for an escort.

If you notice any suspicious persons or vehicles, notify the Safety Department. Trust your instincts, and never hesitate to report anything that makes you feel uneasy.

If you become a victim, stay calm, try to compose an accurate description of the incident, and contact the Safety Department.

If you see any security problems or hazardous safety conditions (e.g., locks, doors, lighting, walkways, or grounds), contact the Safety Department immediately. Safety will respond, assess the condition, and initiate corrective action if necessary.

### Services offered by the Safety Dept.

**Escorts** - Escort services are available on campus for everyone, especially at night.

**Access** - Access to buildings and offices will be granted to authorized persons with I. D. cards if they forget their keys.

**Special Attention Checks** - If you need to leave your vehicle on campus overnight or for an extended period of time, contact the Safety Department and we will suggest the best place to leave it.

The University cannot assume liability for loss or damage, but we will keep an extra watch on your vehicle.

**"Operation ID"** - Engravers can be borrowed from the Safety Department for use in marking your personal items. Remember! Use your driver's license number. We will assist you with this if you need help.

**"Quick-Lert"** - A list of commonly used phone numbers for credit cards, local banks, law enforcement agencies, hospitals, and the driver's license and social security office is available upon request. In the event your wallet is lost or stolen, use this list to report the loss and obtain replacements.

**"Lease-A-Lock"** - A new program to the University that provides a means to obtain a quality, high security U-bar bicycle lock at a low cost.

The lock will be leased for an indefinite period of time (e.g., forever) for \$17.50.

**Speakers and Educational Programs** - The Safety Department will provide or arrange for speakers for presentations on specific safety or security topics. The Department is more than happy to come to your area.

**Crime Prevention Survey** - We will come to your area to provide a crime prevention survey and will make written recommendations.

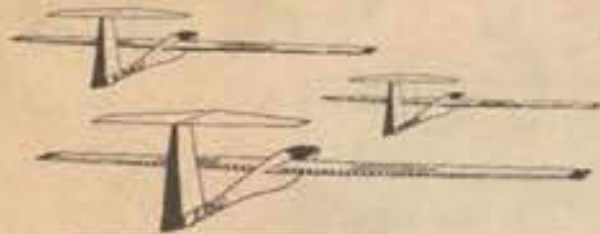

# Student Government invites participation

If you haven't read everything in your Orientation packet (and who has?), you probably don't know why you are paying an SGA fee. Well, I hope to be able to enlighten you a little.

The Student Government Association (SGA) consists of five divisions and the Student Finance Board. The divisions are the Student Representative Board, the Student Court, the Avion Newspaper, the Phoenix yearbook and the Entertainment Committee. Your SGA fee funds all of these divisions, either entirely or partly, and buys first-rate equipment for students to use at a very minimal fee or for free.

For instance, the SGA office, located on the first floor of the Student Center, has VCR's, typewriters, calculators and lockers for rent, and 5-cent photocopies. We also have a big-screen TV in the Landing Strip for your enjoyment. Rental price for a VCR is \$4.00 per night or \$10.00 per weekend with a \$10.00 deposit. Rental for a typewriter or calculator is \$1.00 per night with a \$10.00 deposit. Lockers rent for \$5.00 per month and may be rented by the month or by the semester.

All SGA equipment is first quality and is well maintained. SGA elections are held every Spring and terms of office run for one year. The SGA president sits on the Embry-Riddle Board of Trustees and attends Board meetings in Daytona and Prescott several times per year.

The SGA President presides over all divisions, and the Vice-President is Chairman of the Student Finance Board. The Secretary/Treasurer is a full-time employee of the SGA who is in charge of all accounts payable and receivable for all SGA divisions and oversees the smooth-running of the SGA office. She is also a Notary Public and students may use this service free of charge. You may also purchase a Herff-Jones class ring from her at any time or from the Herff-Jones representative who is on campus at least two days per month.

The Student Representative Board (SRB) is the decision-making body of the SGA and consists of 15 representatives;

thirteen individuals represent students in their degree programs, one represents all foreign students and one represents the dorm residents. The SRB sponsors many events throughout the year including free pool parties, Christmas parties for the elderly and Christmas gifts for underprivileged and abused children. The SGA also originated the idea of the Wright Flyer Monument and then sponsored it with a \$5,000 donation.

The Student Finance Board consists of six student members, one chairman and two associate members. The SFB is the financial decision-making body of the SGA. They must approve all divisions budgets, all money requested from fraternities, clubs and organizations and all requests from Restricted Funds. All chartered student organizations are eligible for up to \$500 per year for equipment, conference expenses and other expenses as outlined in the Student Organizations Guidelines.

The Student Court consists of seven Justices and one Chief Justice. The Court meets once a week to hear all student cases arising from traffic violations, disputes between two or more students, and cases referred by the Dean of Students Office. If you wish to protest a parking ticket or another dispute, just

make an appointment with the Safety Office in the Student Center.

The Avion Newspaper is an award-winning student-run newspaper whose purpose is to inform, entertain and provide a forum for opinions for members of the Daytona Beach campus. This 50% SGA-funded publication is produced weekly in the Fall and Spring and bimonthly in the Summer. In-house training is provided if you wish to participate. The Avion office is located on the second floor of the Student Center.

The Phoenix yearbook is student-run and strives to chronicle each year in pictures and stories, maintaining a history of student and university life at ERAU. This award-winning yearbook encompasses all university activities and can be purchased for only 25% of the printing costs. The SGA pays the remaining 75% for you. If you would like to be a member of the Phoenix Yearbook staff, please see the

Editor in the Avion/Phoenix office on the second floor of the Student Center.

The Entertainment Division receives the majority of your SGA fee in order to sponsor quality presentations of concerts, movies, comedians, musical groups and lecturers. Student volunteers act as stage crew, promoters, security, technicians and all other necessary personnel for the coordination of these events.

Probably the biggest event of the year is the Homecoming concert in the Fall. Each

year the SGA pays between \$35,000 and \$40,000 for this one event in order to get a big-name band and the concert is free to students, staff, faculty and alumni. If you would like to become a member of the Entertainment Committee, please call ext. 6047.

A very important and often used program sponsored by SGA is the "Call A Ride And Live" (CARAL) program. This program has been active in the Fall and Spring for the past six years and has been copied by many universities throughout the United

States.

CARAL is for students who have had too much to drink and feel they should not drive or students who do not wish to ride with someone else who has had too much to drink. All you have to do is call 226-6000 and leave your first name and location. Two student volunteers will pick you up and drive you safely home. Your identity is kept confidential. If you would like to volunteer for this program, please stop in the SGA office and sign up. Your help will be very much appreciated.

The latest SGA project that is currently in the works is an on-campus radio station. We are currently looking at a carrier-current station and hope to be broadcasting on a trial basis before too much

longer. If you would like more information regarding any of the SGA divisions or projects, please stop in and talk with us. You won't get the "Riddle Run-around" here. The SGA is OUR organization and YOUR voice to the University. We want to hear from you!

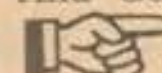

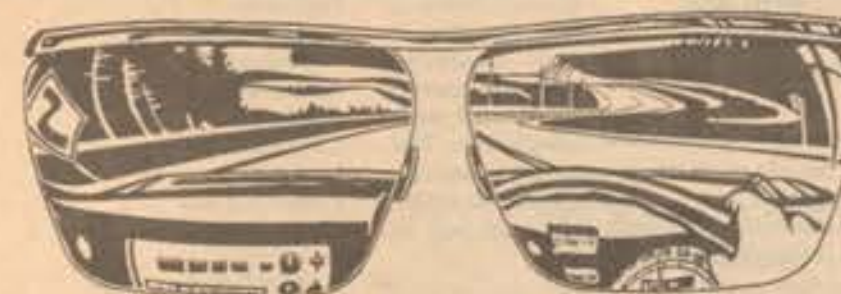

All recreation facilities (some requiring reservation), and intramural events, are open only to currently enrolled students, faculty, and staff at Embry-Riddle.

The Tine Davis Pool is a 25 yd. by 25 meter "L"-shaped facility, which has two 3-meter and two 1-meter diving boards, along with swimming competition availabilities. Students with Red Cross Advanced Lifesaving Certificates serve as lifeguards during peak in-season hours. Children under 14 years must be supervised by an adult. Guests other than immediate family, must be accompanied by a member of ERAU personnel.

The Racquetball Complex is adjacent to the Tine Davis Pool and the Student Center. It is necessary to contact Recreational Sports for reservations to play racquetball. This may be done no more than 24 hours in advance and is valid for ten minutes. If you

do not show up to play within this period of time, your reservation is forfeited and the court is open for anyone to play for that hour. You may call extension 6530 weekdays 8 am to 5 pm, or evenings and weekends at the pool (ext. 6532).

The Fitness Center, which is located in racquetball courts 5 & 6, contains 13 Nautilus machines, a variety of free weights, Universal equipment, three exercise bicycles, and a computerized rowing machine. The extension at this facility is 6534. Operating hours are posted at the start of each school term. This

# Freshman: survival depends upon initiative

Among the many concerns of a new college freshman are problems of finances, rooming, making new friends, learning the "ropes" of Embry-Riddle, studying and learning just how demanding various classes can be.

Here we will not take care of all these problems, but let's at least consider some aspects of many of them.

In making new friends, be friendly and open-minded, but also cautious. Some people you meet you may rather avoid, so don't make social commitments lightly. Similarly, don't be standoffish and afraid to get involved with campus life.

Most students are friendly and decent folk, just like you and your social skills will improve as you meet new social demands. You need a body of friends, and one safe place to make them is in a campus-approved club or organization -- like the staff of the student weekly newspaper.

Decide to have the gumption to get involved with a few of the extracurricular activities. Not so many that it hurts your classwork, but enough to extend your experiences. Remember, nearly all your classmates are as unfamiliar with their new surroundings as you are.

Don't feel intimidated. For significant problems -- that's anything that you feel is important -- don't hesitate to bring them up with the available counselors, even with some of your instructors.

One of the most important facets of col-

lege life is being involved with a few groups, socially and professionally. This is actually training for your future. Life never gets any easier, so begin or continue to socialize now. Polish up those social and even leadership skills. Test your mettle; see what you're made of. You know you are good enough -- maybe you are outstanding. Find out.

To succeed in your classes, remember that a handy rule of thumb is that you should study and review for two hours for every hour of class. Along with putting in

Not everything is equally important, and if your mind becomes cluttered with just a mass of facts, you are not really learning nor thinking.

Read your textbooks faithfully, and argue with your authors in the margins. This helps you to remember aspects of the lessons, even if you have to admit the text is sensible.

Underline sparingly, but do mark or highlight key words. If you underline too much, your reviewing will be unnecessarily difficult.

If you can recall important definitions and meanings of just key words, then you

know you understand the heart of the material. If not, you'll have to read it again anyway, so basically just underline key words along with occasional phrases and sentences. At an extreme, of course, if you underline every word, in effect you are marking nothing.

Periodically review material, every week or two. Review all the previous material, not just the previous week or two, and when the mid-term and final exams roll around you will be the master of all the material from the beginning. Most final exams cover the whole term's work.

Be one of the constructors of a successful classroom environment. Be attentive and ask questions.

Avoid, even scorn, the occasional student who may try to retard the class progress. You have to decide on which side of the learning curve you wish to live, and college classes depend upon a mass of eager students. Much of the quality of the classes depends upon the students.

Be sure to meet with many of your instructors during their office hours, if just to get acquainted and to emerge from just a mass of friendly faces. Also, make friends with a few of your instructors. They can be helpful for discussing problems, not just academic ones. And soon you will need some good references for job applications.

Part of an instructor's job is just to spend a little time jawing with a student about nothing in particular. Again, don't be shy. Most instructors are actually human beings.

Whatever problems that you might have, be assured that thousands have had the same ones. What's new? Don't feel you are so much an individual that only you have weighty difficulties. Your counselor and instructor probably had many of the same concerns.

Keep your head up; see what's going on around you; pick out a few good friends that have the same values you do; join a couple of campus groups; remember that your primary goal is to extend your education, and avail yourself freely of all the support -- formal and informal -- that you find. Above all, realize that you belong here and that you are as good as anyone else.

Your self-image may be the most crucial aspect of your personality. Always try to be worthy of yourself.

Don't get involved in activities you'd rather not -- avoid peer pressure that may lead you down the primrose path toward too much partying and procrastinating. Pick good and wise friends whose peer pressure will generally be constructive.

College life is trying, and it's a long four-year investment. But it's well worth the effort, and you can succeed very well if you care.

For the first time in your life, probably, everything you achieve will be through your own efforts.

## Coach has high hopes for upcoming season

### Eagles prepare for battle after last year's second place finish

Steve Ridder, 1990-91 NAIA District 25 Coach of the Year, is very optimistic about the upcoming season. The Eagles have the nucleus of their team returning from last year and four new signees will be a positive addition.

Two starters return from last year. Tom Valley, 1990-91 team most value player

averaged 11.3 points, 5.8 rebounds, 5.7 assists and 1.8 blocked shots; Jeff "Moose" Moore averaged 13.7 points, 6.7 rebounds and led the team in offensive rebounds.

Other top returners include Owen Busch who

was the team's sixth man and a possible starter for the upcoming season. Owen also was named to the 1990-91 All-Freshman Team. He averaged 13.6 points and shot 86 percent from the foul line.

Carlos Rodriguez who played for the Eagles during the 1989-90 season returns for his senior year and looks to be favored for the starting point guard position. In the 1989-90 season, Rodriguez averaged 13 points and 5 assists.

Al Tyler also returns for the Eagles. Tyler is expected to give us additional experience at the point guard.

Guard Dave Jones and 6'8" Sean Hester also will provide valuable minutes.

Third year man Trent Kowalski provided quality minutes as a back-up big man last year and is expected to solidify that position.

Four signees for this year's team include

6'6" Kris Shanahan, a transfer from Brevard Community College; Andy McWilliams (a 6'5", 225 pound forward), a transfer from Palm Beach Community College; Freshman Rodney King coming to us from Palm Bay High School where he averaged

19 points and 6 rebounds; and Bobby Chisolm from Bishop Verot High School where he averaged 17.8 points and 8 rebounds.

This past season saw the ERAU Eagles with a 22-8 overall record, finishing second in the conference. The team earned a bid to the NAIA District 25 playoffs and ranked fourth in the nation for scoring.

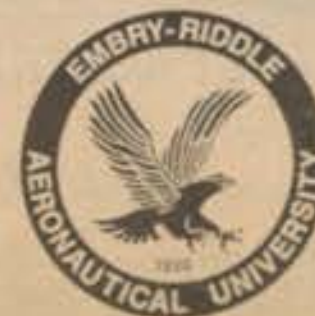

# Current summer movie hits reviewed

## Bingo

Stabby dog comedy featuring a mixed-breed pooch who is seen performing numerous feats common to humans: He can drive a truck, dial a phone, read a magazine and even give artificial respiration. He fails to generate adequate comic situations. Part of this cartoonish adventure finds Bingo in the company of a young boy (Robert J. Steinmiller Jr.) and in the clutches of a dognapper. The whole silly movie seems flea-bitten.

The picture looks expensive, but the routine, illogical script is mere bargain basement. Platoons of bad guys are shot, stabbed, electrocuted and thrown from high places. # Morrison's summarizes student meal services

Morrison's Custom Management is a nationally-known company operating in schools, businesses and hospitals in over 40 states. Considered "fast-growing" in the industry, Morrison's main goal is for complete customer satisfaction. Morrison's constantly implements programs which are customer-inspired.

With managers from California, Colorado, and Pennsylvania, Morrison's Management Team at Embury-Riddle combines a collective of experience.

Managers work from 60-90 hours each week with only one goal in mind - customer satisfaction. If it can't be achieved with that amount of work time there is no satisfaction at the Management level. "It's all we work for," says Bill Yeager, Production Manager, previously with Pizza Hut Inc. in Denver, Colorado. Morrison's Managers at ERAU encourage comments, feed back and any other form of communication from all who visit our food establishments.

## The Meal Plan

The meal plan was designed solely with the student in mind to be affordable, yet offer a wide variety of selection. Each meal card member may claim one trayload of food per meal period - which, when costed a la carte far exceeds the paltry cost per meal on the plan.

Individual trayloads can vary widely in size and worth depending on the appetite or selective prowess of the meal plan member. For example, one trayload of food, taken to its limit, would cost anywhere from \$5.00 to \$6.50 if purchased at a la carte prices.

The sole restrictions on the meal plan are that it must be used by the member only and only one meal may be consumed per meal period (i.e. breakfast, lunch, dinner). Mixed meals are not replaced but are factored into the cost of the meal plan.

Most of the items in the Food Court are available to meal plan members. However, a few items are geared more for Custom Card and Cash Customers.

To maintain a low meal plan cost some items are not available on the meal plan. For example, yogurt and bottled 16 oz. sodas aren't available to meal card users and cream cheese, specialty rolls and breads are side items offered for variety.

By the way, Morrison's Custom Management employees enjoy a free meal each workshift - however, they must comply to the trayload limit. For most employees, one full trayload is too much food.

The meal plan is valid from the first day of classes until classes end. It is not valid during finals week in order to keep the cost low. For example, if the meal plan spanned through orientation and/or finals week, many students would be paying for meals they would never receive. The Custom Card was designed to supplement the Meal Plan. It is valid anytime and anywhere. (Food Court, Landing Strip, Flight Deck, A.M.T., Pepsi Concessionaire).

## Custom Card

Although the Meal Plan is a better value if used correctly, the Custom Card is designed to offer greater flexibility at a discounted price. As much as a 10 percent discount can be received when making purchases with the Custom Card. If used in conjunction with the Meal Plan an optimum value can be attained. The Custom Card is valid in the Food Court, Snack Bar, Flight Deck, and at the A.M.T. Wagon. The Custom Card is also available for orientation week as well

as finals week and any other hours of operation. Custom Card balances carry over from Summer "A" to Summer "B", from Summer "B" to Fall, and from Fall to Spring. All balances expire on the last day of services Spring Semester.

## Food Committee Meeting

Food Committee meetings have always been held and are strongly supported and encouraged by Morrison's as a strong communication link to concerned parties. Food Committee meetings are open to all Students and Faculty Members. Attendance is usually limited to a handful of people and gradually declines to none.

## Suggestion Box

A Comment Card can be picked up, filled in and deposited at the suggestion box mounted on the Communications Bulletin Board just outside the Morrison's office in the University Center.

Few cards are returned; however, those cards that are returned are reviewed by the Management Team.

## Variety

Pace-changers and Specials are conducted in the Food Court several times

each month. Many times, a customer may create his/her own item. Some of the recent special pace-changers have been: Steak Dinner Night, Potatoe-Fix-ins Bar, Ice Cream Sundae Special, Fajita Special, and Nacho Fixing Table.

## Promotions

Morrison's also participates in several of the Corporate Promotions. Some of the most recent have been: "Taste of Florida" Citrus Promotion, Strawberry Faire, Watermelon Festival and Treasure Hunt.

## Flight Deck

Many students aren't aware of the Flight Deck Food Area. Bistro style, students can eat an upgraded meal in the Flight Deck comparable to food served in local gourmet restaurants. A premium entree, a carved meat, fresh vegetables, starches, and especially salads, bread and desserts are available each day on the menu.

The Flight Deck is open weekdays from 11:30 a.m. until 1:30 p.m. during Fall and Spring semesters.

## Food Court

The variety in the Food Court is non-stop. Fresh pizza is served daily with own-proofed dough and meat and fresh vegetable toppings. The Deli offers a host of deli meat and several cheeses for sandwiches. A variety of breads, rolls, and vegetables are available for sandwich variety. Condiments are located at a station in the cafeteria.

The Main Event features three hot entrees for lunch and dinner. Additionally,

at the Main Event, hot starches and hot vegetables are available. Burgers, etc., offer a hot specialty sandwich daily as well as chicken, all-beef burgers, jumbo all-beef franks, fries, etc.

The International Bar features three to four fresh-made dishes of a variety of cuisines (Latin, Italian, Mexican, French, Polynesian).

All desserts are made fresh in Morrison's in-house bakery.

## Landing Strip Snack Bar

The Snack Bar is bustling with grab and go customers during Spring and Fall Semester. Hot food is prepared to order. A Baked Potato Bar is popular as well as the Sweet Shop, where freshly-baked hot

## Department of Housing provides a variety of living styles

Opportunities to grow at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University extend beyond the classroom. Living in the residence halls or apartment complex is a significant part of the total university experience and offers students the chance to grow as individuals and to develop many long lasting friendships.

At Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, residence life offers a comfortable transition to university life. ## The movies

Daytona Beach has several movie theaters. For first-run movies, behind the Volusia Mall, and the AMC 8 theaters, located near Phar-Mor. Both theaters offer a wide variety of movies, however student discount when identification is shown.

## Library facilities and materials continue to grow

Welcome to the Jack R. Hunt Memorial Library. Our primary mission is to provide materials, services and facilities to students, faculty and staff in support of the university's commitment to excellence in teaching, learning and research. As an academic support unit the library must maintain flexibility in adapting to the changing information needs of its clientele. The role of the library is to link the information needs of the university community with existing resources either locally or through sharing arrangements and technological resources.

We hope you find the following information about the library helpful as you pursue your studies at Embry-Riddle.

**Facilities:** In January 1989, phase II of the library was completed. The facility contains over 42,000 square feet in a three level design with seating for 800. Of this number, over 500 seats are individual study carrels.

In addition to the single-use spaces, the building contains 13 small group study rooms, two conversation/leisure reading

areas and multipurpose space that can be divided by means of folding walls into small rooms for meetings and group projects. Use of these rooms is by reservation through the library secretary at extension 6595.

**Hours:** The library is open seven days a week throughout the academic term on the following schedule:

Mon. - Thur. 7:15 am - 12 midnight  
Friday 7:15 am - 6:00 pm  
Saturday 9:00 am - 6:00 pm  
Sunday 1:00 pm - 12 midnight

Extended hours are scheduled during final exams. Between academic terms, the library is open 8:00 AM to 5:00 PM and closed on weekends.

**Collection:** The library has a comprehensive collection of books, periodicals, documents, newspapers, and media programs. The size of the collection is as follows:

44,301 books  
20,440 documents (paper)  
1,531 periodical/serials titles  
961 current subscriptions  
114,357 microfiche publications (4 x 6

microfiche cards) encompassing reference sources including the Aircraft Technical Publishers (ATP) Library; College Catalogs; Newbank; Selected Resources in Microfiche (SRIM) and documents

4,964 microfilm reels (35mm) covering back issues of periodicals  
2,750 media programs

Among the library's resources is an historical aviation collection which was donated by the Manufacturers' Aircraft Association (MAA) in 1976. This collection includes a continuous run of *Aviation Week and Space Technology* dating from 1916 to the present and a complete set of *Jane's All the World's Aircraft* dating from 1909 to the present.

**Services:** Reference: The Reference desk is staffed 82 hours per week by librarians with master's degrees and specialized training in aviation research methodology. The librarians are there to assist you with your research needs.

**Circulation:** For all library checkouts (reserve as well as circulating materials) a valid ERAU ID is necessary. Loan periods are based on type of material and range from three days to two weeks.

All materials may be renewed up to three times. Overdues are charged at the rate of \$0.50 per day per item, and circulation privileges may be suspended for excessive overdues.

Reserve materials are required readings by individual faculty members for their classes. These are housed behind the main circulation desk and are for in-library use only.

**Interlibrary Loan:** ILL provides you access to information not owned by the library (books, periodicals, etc.) from other institutions through a computer link connecting over 6,000 libraries nationwide. Forms for using this service are available at the Reference desk; it usually takes two weeks to receive the materials.

The library also uses DIALOG, a service which provides access to 400+ databases listing documents, reports, conference

proceedings, journal articles, dissertations, etc.

**Media:** The Media Services area provides classroom support equipment and software. Additionally, there are facilities for in-library use of video tapes, slides, films and audio tapes. The department is open during regular library hours either with separate staff or via the staff at the circulation/reserve desk.

**Library Instruction:** The reference staff provides instruction in the use of the facility and its resources. This instruction is specifically designed to meet the needs of a particular course, and the lecture is tailored to the individual research paper/oral report requirements of the course.

Coordinated individually with each instructor, the lecture is delivered in the library's Bibliographic Instruction Room when it is most appropriate for the students.

**Computer Resources:** The Hunt Library received a grant from the Edyth Bush Charitable Foundation in 1985 to assist with automation of library services and functions. The on-line circulation and book acquisition modules were implemented in 1987.

The on-line catalog, which currently has 16 public access terminals and offers Boolean and keyword search capabilities, was made available to the public in May 89.

Other specialized services feature Newbank and Business Newbank on CD-ROM.

**Technical Services:** This area is responsible for the selection, ordering and processing of all library materials. Should you wish to make recommendations for purchase, forms are available at the reference desk.

The library is here for you. The entire staff is ready to help you in your aviation education pursuits. Please do not hesitate to ask for assistance, and be assured that we welcome your comments regarding service, additional needs, etc.

We are here to compete for your patronage, so what we can do with service and pricing is important to us in making you a friend for your years on campus.

When you get to the bookstore, you will see why used books are so popular. Texts are expensive, and the bookstore has little control over their cost. A used title, how-

ever, is sold at 75% of the new list price - so you save right away.

At the end of the term you can sell books back at the store, whether new or used, at up to 50% of the current price (50% if a certain title has been re-ordered for the

following term - otherwise we pay Wholesale Guide prices range from 0-35%).

This means, if you have to buy a book costing \$20 new, and we have it used, it will only cost you \$15.00. And if it is to be used for the next term, we will buy it back (as long as it is in reasonably good condition) for \$10.00.

So for the use of the book for that term, it would cost you just \$5.00, taking some of the sting out of the high costs of higher education.

When you shop for your books, the used copies will be mixed in with the new. If you

don't see any used, then they probably have been sold out. It pays to get to the store early for used books.

Remember, you are our best source of used books. The more used books you buy, the more money you save. The more used

## Valuable skills developed by working students

### by Student Employment

More traditional college students (full-time, aged 16-24) are working today than 15-20 years ago. They average about 20 hours a week in employment, in addition to their full-time schedule.

Why is it important for students to work? Beyond the obvious need for monetary resources, working while attending college can benefit students in many ways.

Student employees can gain valuable employment and credit references, establish a work record, and develop self-confidence, while acquiring time manage-

ment, financial planning, and communications skills.

Embry-Riddle employs over 700 students in almost every department. On-campus jobs range from grounds keeper to flight scheduler, lab assistant to lifeguard.

While some jobs may require special skills or certification, dependability and a professional attitude toward work are the most important skills needed for working on-campus.

Student Employment is available to all students regardless of financial need or citizenship. The hourly wage for student

employees is \$4.25 per hour. Students possessing an Airframe and Powerplant certification or a Bachelor's degree are paid \$4.75 per hour if the position requires this certification.

Students may work a maximum of 25 hours per week or 50 hours per pay period as student employees.

College Work Study students who qualify for CWS will be placed on the program by Student Employment. Eligibility is determined by the Financial Aid Office based on financial need.

The Student Employment Office is located in Spruance Hall, Room 112, and is open between 8 am and 5 pm, Monday through Friday.

Current job listings for on-campus employment are posted and the office staff will be happy to assist you in your research. The on-campus job board is a listing of employment opportunities available only to eligible ERAU-enrolled students.

The ERAU Student Employment Program is designed to allow students a source of income to aid with the costs associated

with higher education.

On-campus jobs are typically on a no-experience necessary basis offering many students their first hands-on experience with employment. In these jobs, students acquire many skills and abilities essential in obtaining career employment.

Additionally, student assistants perform many duties vital to the operation of ERAU. Students may work a maximum of 3 jobs with a cumulative total of up to and not to exceed 25 hours per week of employment.

The office also maintains a listing of off-campus job openings from local employers. This is posted outside our office and is easily accessible.

Students should contact employers directly to schedule an interview. As a student assistant, it is easy to demonstrate your value as a worker.

Remember if you need to work during school, becoming a student assistant is a viable option and the advantages are incalculable to securing a good future.

Primarily a volunteer organization, the Avion is also a place for a few students to make a little money. Office secretaries, mail-out secretaries, and advertising salesmen are paid for their efforts. And at the end of each term, all editors get money for their effort known as "leadership assistance." Plus, the whole staff eats pizza or other foods each week after the paper is finished—for free!

And there are more fringe benefits to being on the staff. Reviewers are compensated if they must spend their own money to purchase the item being reviewed, including movie tickets. But one must be a bonafide, writing member of the staff to get the compensation.

Some staff come and go in the Avion, while others are always in the office, myself included. No matter which type, the staff enjoys the notoriety of being the information resource for students and even alumni (who are mailed copies of the paper). The Administration reads the Avion to see what's concerning students.

As far as resume credits go, the Avion has been a good item to include in one's activities or experience section. It is one of few student organizations on campus

that requires real world management, writing and the deadline-meeting skills.

The several sections in the Avion offer students a variety of choices in what they can write about.

Taking care of home ground first, the Campus section is where stories on the campus' controversies, events, and people are placed. It is the most important section in the paper, being the only place many students and others can get information on the campus. The front page always has a campus story or two, as well.

Campus is perhaps the hardest section of the paper to fill because writers must find their sources, whereas other sections usually have sources sending them information. But the Campus section is the most satisfying to work for, since writers may interview outstanding and important people within Embry-Riddle, from their hard-working roommate to the president of the University. They also interview the major players in campus-wide concerns, talk with the people who must solve the campus' problems, and reflect student opinion on campus life. It is the section where students report what the University is doing for and against students' concerns, too.

Other sections include Diversions, our entertainment review section; Space Technology and Aeronautics, which offer information on the major industries that ERAU graduates will enter—the aviation and aerospace industries; National and Aviation Business, which attempt to offer news at a national level and from within the Aviation industry, respectively; and other sections, which are self-explanatory, like Clubs, Sports, Opinions, and still others.

Even though the Avion comes from a

school with only one journalism course per year, it has been a major competitor in college newspaper conventions for a long time. Just last Spring, while I was Campus News Editor, the Avion won second place for "Front Page Design."

In May of 1970, the campus newspaper, formerly called *The Informer* (from 1968), was officially named the Avion. Back in those days, it was a mimeographed newspaper. Yech!

All the changes in production equipment are not worth mentioning, though they have at times been extreme. The big improvements of the past led gradually to what will be put into full action this Fall.

The new Macintosh system in the office is totally networked and very easy to produce a newspaper on. Our advertising department has much improved resources for art and effects in advertisements. Our editors' lives should be easier in the future; now, no disks are

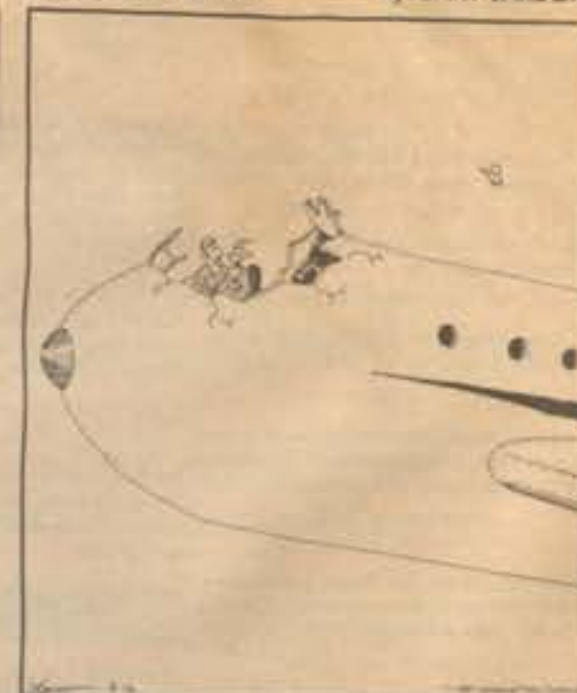
