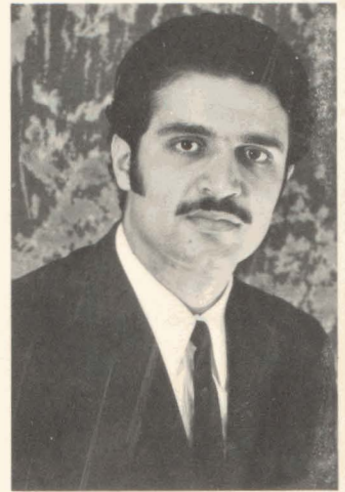
AERONAUTICAL ENGINEERING

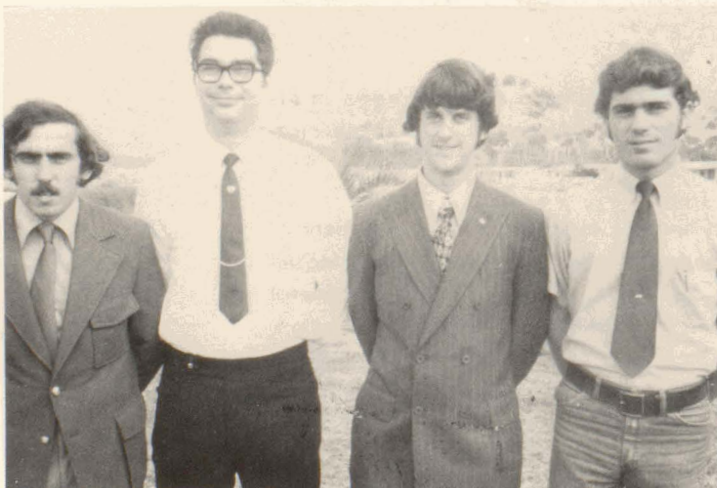
TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM OF ALPHA RHO OMEGA

UNDEFEATED SEASON FOR E.R.A.U. EAGLES

Congratulations to Embry-Riddle's Soccer Team, the Eagles who soared to victory this season by capturing the District 25 Soccer Championship!

District 25 encompasses all NAIA soccer teams in Florida and Georgia, most of whom have been in existence at least twice as long as the Embry-Riddle team. (NAIA stands for National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics.)

Soccer — with an international flavor — is the oldest intercollegiate sport at Embry-Riddle. The first game was played against Rollins College in September, 1965. E-RAU (then E-RAI) defeated that year's F.I.C. champion 5 to 3 and a new era was born in Florida soccer annals.

There are several good reasons behind this rapid success. One is the spirited coaching of Dean Herbert Mansfield, a retired Army Colonel who sets a vigorous pace and leads the way — on the playing field or off. Dean Mansfield lettered in soccer at nearby Stetson University and helped coach the Stetson team before coming to Embry-Riddle. He now takes particular satisfaction in leading the Eagles to victory over that team.

A list of players on the Eagles team reads like a "Who's Who" of the United Nations. And, the team members all get along famously, according to Coach Mansfield (also E-RAU's Vice-President, Student Affairs.) Eight per cent of the student body are from foreign countries, but FIFTY per cent of the Eagles players are foreign students.

Captain of the Eagles is Gary Haupt from Southold, New York, who holds down the Right Wing post. "He never quits," says Mansfield. "He's a real fighter."

Leading scorer on the squad is Zach Fagbemi from Nigeria. Zach notched 16 goals in 12 games this season, becoming the top scorer in the Nation.

A key factor in the Eagles' rapid rise in NAIA standings lies in the origin of the players. Many of them are from countries where soccer is the national pastime; where children grow up playing soccer on empty lots the way American youngsters cut their competitive teeth on sandlot baseball and football.

The eight foreign countries represented on E-RAU's soccer team are Lebanon, Iran, Nigeria, Tanzania, Thailand, Germany, Czechoslovakia, and Canada.

The collection of talent this year was such that only 3 of the returning 8 lettermen were able to make this year's team!

"You wear them under the shoes so the leather won't rub your feet."

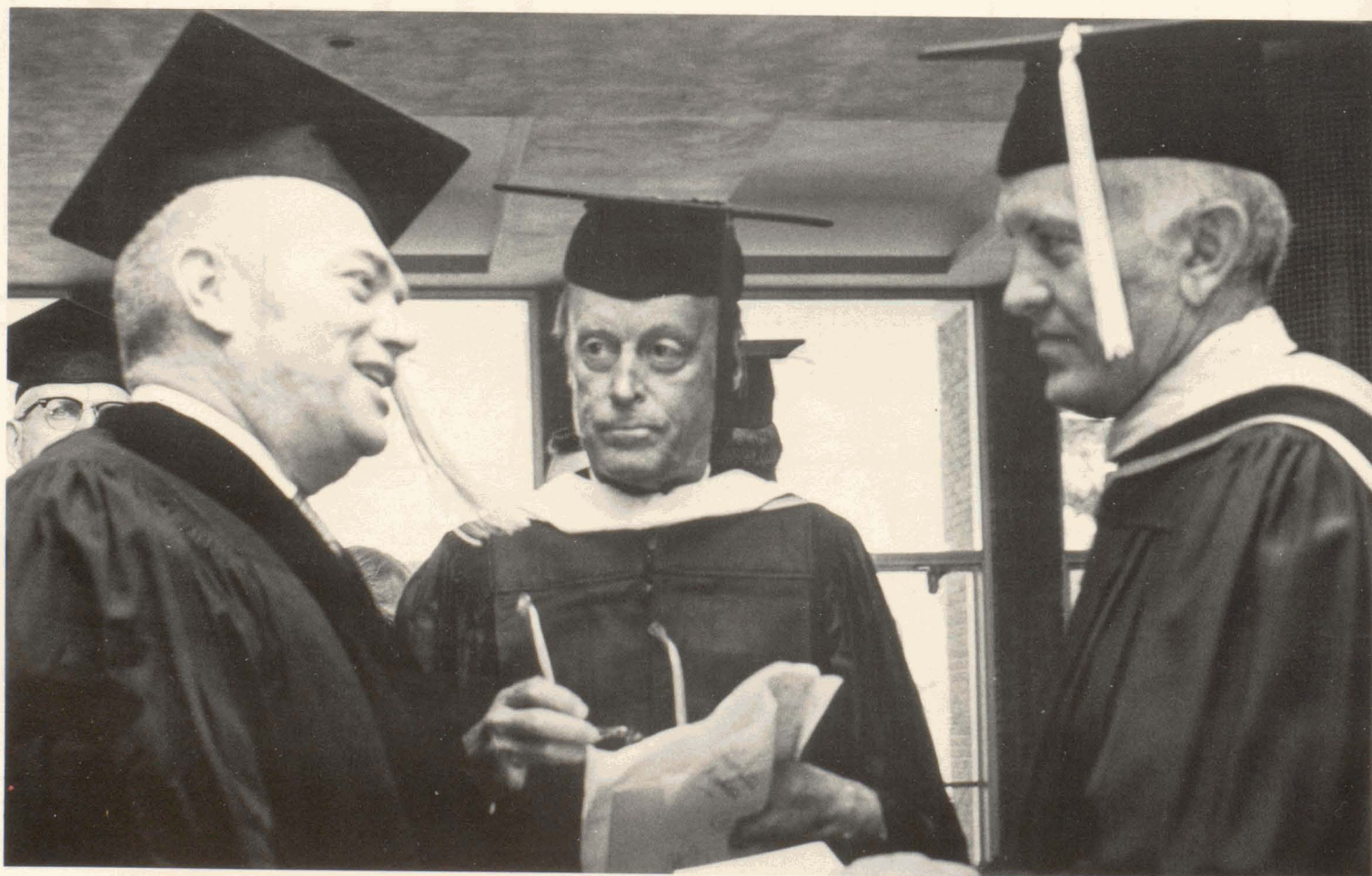
