VETERANS

Effective October 1, 1967, VA educational benefits will include payments for each additional dependent over two at the rate of \$10.00 per month. Veterans must submit copies of these dependents' birth certificates to the Veterans Administration as soon as possible.

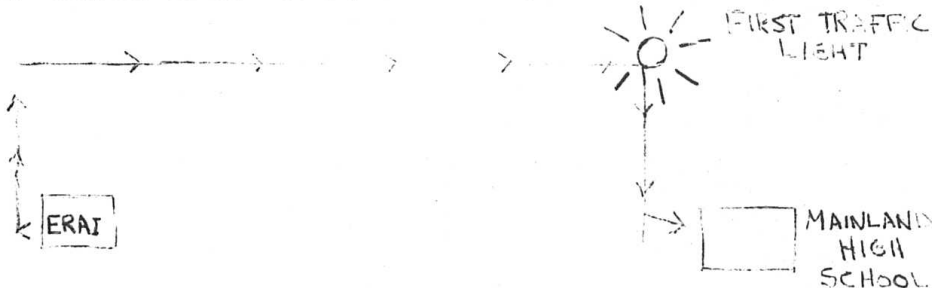
New staff members include Robert S. Cameron, Registrar and Director of Information Systems; Thomas M. Saunders, Jr., Placement and Testing Counselor.

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S.G.A. MINUTES 9/14/67

The meeting was called to order at 11:30 A.M. by the President. The minutes of the last meeting were not read because no copy was available. The Treasurer's report was given and the financial status will be published in the INFORMER.

OLD BUSINESS:

Chris Larsen asked Dean Mansfield if a light could be installed at the Old Hanger for night classes. He stated that when leaving class it is treacherous walking along the ditch which runs along the side of the hanger.

Don Kaltenbach reported on the progress of the up-coming election. All is in order and posters and names of candidates have been posted on all bulletin boards around the school.

Bill Crites asked that no one from the S.G.A. remove chairs from Room 106 because of the problems that came about last trimester.

Bill also reported on the parking problem at the New Hanger. This condition has been corrected and students will be permitted to park on the ramp as before.

Mr. Mansfield stated that the S.G.A. office will be moved and that we have a choice of two locations. Members chose the old F.A.A. building. Also the office, after it is moved, will be open the following hours: 9:00 A.M. to 12:00 Noon and 1:00-4:00 P.M.

Pete Howe of the yearbook staff asked if the money for the Dark-Room equipment will be appropriated from the S.G.A. The President stated that it will as soon as a statement is presented.
