A New President

The University says farewell to Dr. Sliwa

In the early 1990's the Board of Trustees were given an awesome responsibility, to choose a president that could successfully lead Embry-Riddle into the next century. They had proven in the past that President Hunt and President Tallman knew what kind of person was needed to keep Embry-Riddle at the top of its field; the question is could they do it again?

Years have passed since the Board of Trustees made their decision and their choice was definitely the right man at the right time. Dr. Steven Sliwa took office in 1991 and his tenure has been as he says, "one of passion and fulfillment."

He has put his experience as an executive in a software engineering company and his work with NASA's Langley Research center to good use. Dr. Sliwa's term as president has seen the opening of the Student Village, the opening of the Advanced Flight Simulation Center, the purchase of some 300 airplanes and the largest federal appropriation ever awarded to a university, among other achievements.

Dr. Sliwa's supporters have said he has done more in the seven years that he has been here than most people do in an entire lifetime. President Sliwa had made it clear that he would serve no more than 10 years and no less than 5, but his term has been far too short. His leadership has helped to further our commitment to the future of general aviation. In his annual report for 1997, President Sliwa said it best:

"Companies know that when they call on our faculty as researchers or take on our students as interns, they get the same approach to problem solving that keeps space shuttles on track and jumbo jets on time. We're educating the leaders of aviation and aerospace."

President Sliwa referred to his presidency as the best job in higher education, and this was evident through his passion and enthusiasm.

Building Bridges Through Education

Their palms clasped together, and with a gentle bow of the head the traditional greeting of 'Ayubowan' is given by the Sri Lankan Friendship Society as they hosted the first bi-annual Cultural Awareness Night. Sponsored by International Student Services, the event is designed to educate others about other nations straight from the mouths of those who live there.

The Sri Lankan Friendship Society offered friendship and a cup of home grown tea as they began the event with the traditional lighting of a multi-armed incense lamp. Lit by the society's president and then by members as well as visitors, the lighting of the lamp is the traditional ceremony of commencement.

The commencement was followed by an information session that highlighted the geography, history, and culture that make up the island nation. Influences from India, Buddhism, mountainous terrain and British colonialism have shaped much of what Sri Lanka is today. The information session also included a video on the traditional dances of Sri Lanka. These dances emphasized the differences and influences of Sri Lanka's subcultures upon each other.

Joseph Nazareth, a native of India, gave an outsider's view of what Sri Lankan attitudes and cultures are like. Describing Sri Lankans as a generally "friendly and humble people," Joseph found good friends among the society, eventually sharing an apartment with Sri Lankan friends. Sri Lankans consider him to be an honorary native among them.

The event was concluded by Niloshan Peiris who shared his experiences of adjusting to American society. American society was far different than the television show "Miami Vice" had depicted in his native home of Sri Lanka. Feeling very much alone and foreign in a new culture, Niloshan learned to adjust to his new surroundings. Nearing graduation, Niloshan will have successfully complete his degree in Aviation Technology.

Reunion of old and new

The highlight of Homecoming/ Alumni Weekend, was hosted Saturday by the Flight Line. Dozens of aircraft were on display and hundreds of spectators turned out to check out the aircraft.

The Fly-In was primarily a static display, as opposed to an air show in which aircraft perform. The main aircraft which performed at the Fly-In were a pair of U.S. Marine Corps' AV-8B Harriers, which put on a very impressive display. Alumni of Embry-Riddle flew most of the aircraft that were at the Fly-In.

A U.S. Air Force KC-135R Stratotanker was flown in by Jim Pompano, a 1992 graduate. The KC-135R is a military version of the four-engine Boeing 707. The aircraft in the airshow was built in 1962, but featured a fully upgraded glass cockpit and is based at McConnell Air Force Base in Wichita, Kansas. The navigator of the aircraft, Russell Schectman, is a 1985 graduate of Embry-Riddle.

CW2 Brian Farrell flew in his Apache helicopter. Farrell, of the Florida Army National Guard, is currently enrolled at the satellite campus in Jacksonville, studying Professional Aeronautics. He originally joined the guard to get a little extra school money, and wound up flying. "I showed the aptitude and enthusiasm, so they sent me to flight school," he said.

CW2 Bill Rawson, also with the guard, graduated in 1991 from the Extended Campus. Rawson proudly showed off the Apache's weaponry. In addition to its 30-millimeter cannon, the Apache can carry up to eight Hellfire missiles, each with a range of 8,000 meters. The Hellfire is designed primarily to pick off tanks and other armor. At \$60,000 apiece, the laser-guided missile is an effective tank-killer.

Parents were impressed by the Fly-In and the school. "The school seems wonderful," said Bonnie Herget, whose son Brad is majoring in Aeronautical Science. "I like the camaraderie," she said. "This Fly-In is incredible." Bonnie and her husband Tom were visiting from North Conway, New Hampshire.

This year's display was intended to replace the Daytona Skyfest, which was previously an annual event, and is now going to be a biannual event.

Industry Career Expo

Creating Opportunities Through Networking

The ERAU Industry/Career EXPO is truly becoming the aviation hiring event of the year. A record 118 companies exhibited at the EXPO November 4 and 5 in the fieldhouse. For the first time, companies had to wait for booth space to become available in order to participate. Bob Hodge, Recruiting Manager of Comptek Federal Systems called the EXPO "one of the best recruiting events we attend" and said that they "will continue to use ERAU as one of our primary resources for quality candidates."

Bruno Gavazzi, a senior in the Aerospace Engineering program, interviewed with Lockheed Martin, Cessna, two divisions of Pratt & Whitney, and Boeing in three days. One extended campus student traveled from England to attend the EXPO and walked away with four job offers. This year, 12 regional and corporate airlines were accepting pilot resumes compared to four last year.

Events sponsored by the Career Services Office included a Critical Issues Forum, a Welcome Reception, a presentation of Proper Protocol and a faculty and industry breakfast.

Senior ambassadors were assigned specific companies to work with offering general assistance that may have included providing information for the visit to campus, helping to set up and staff the company booth, attending meetings which provided protocol training and generally socializing with others in the industry.

The event produced a rare opportunity to network, learn about career fields, explore career options, apply for full-time and co-op positions and even to collect cool gifts from company representatives. Next year's event promises to be equally impressive. Many companies have already requested booth space.

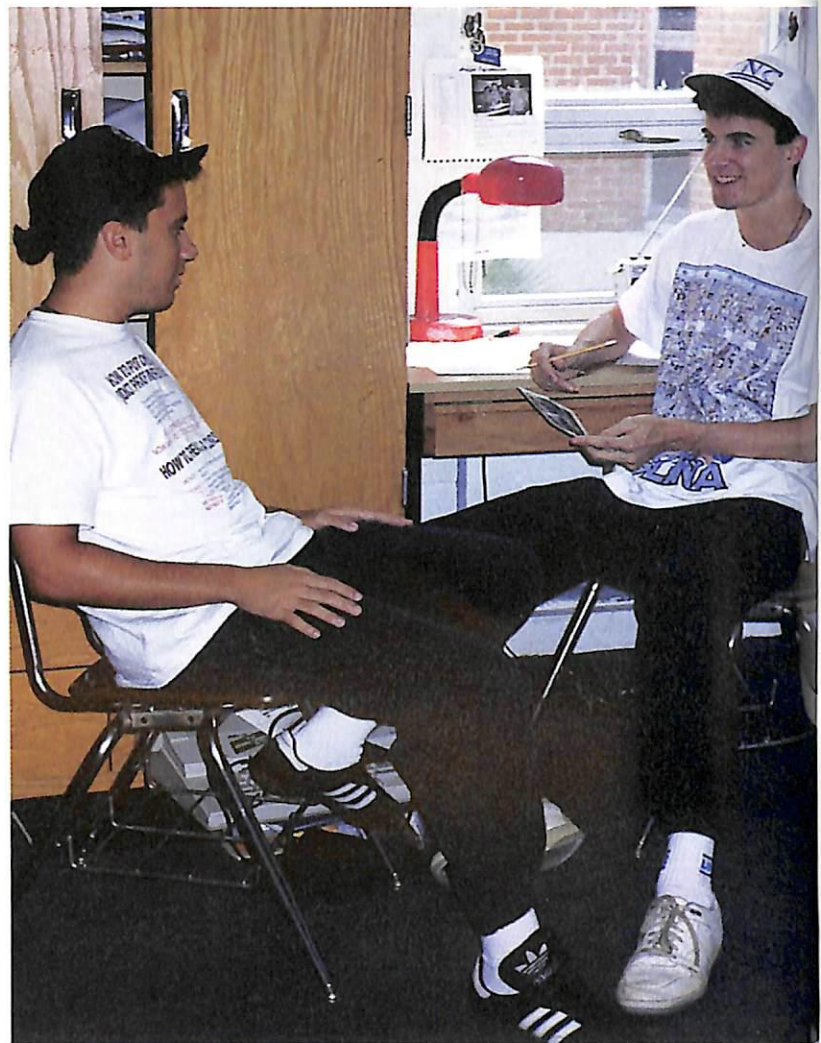

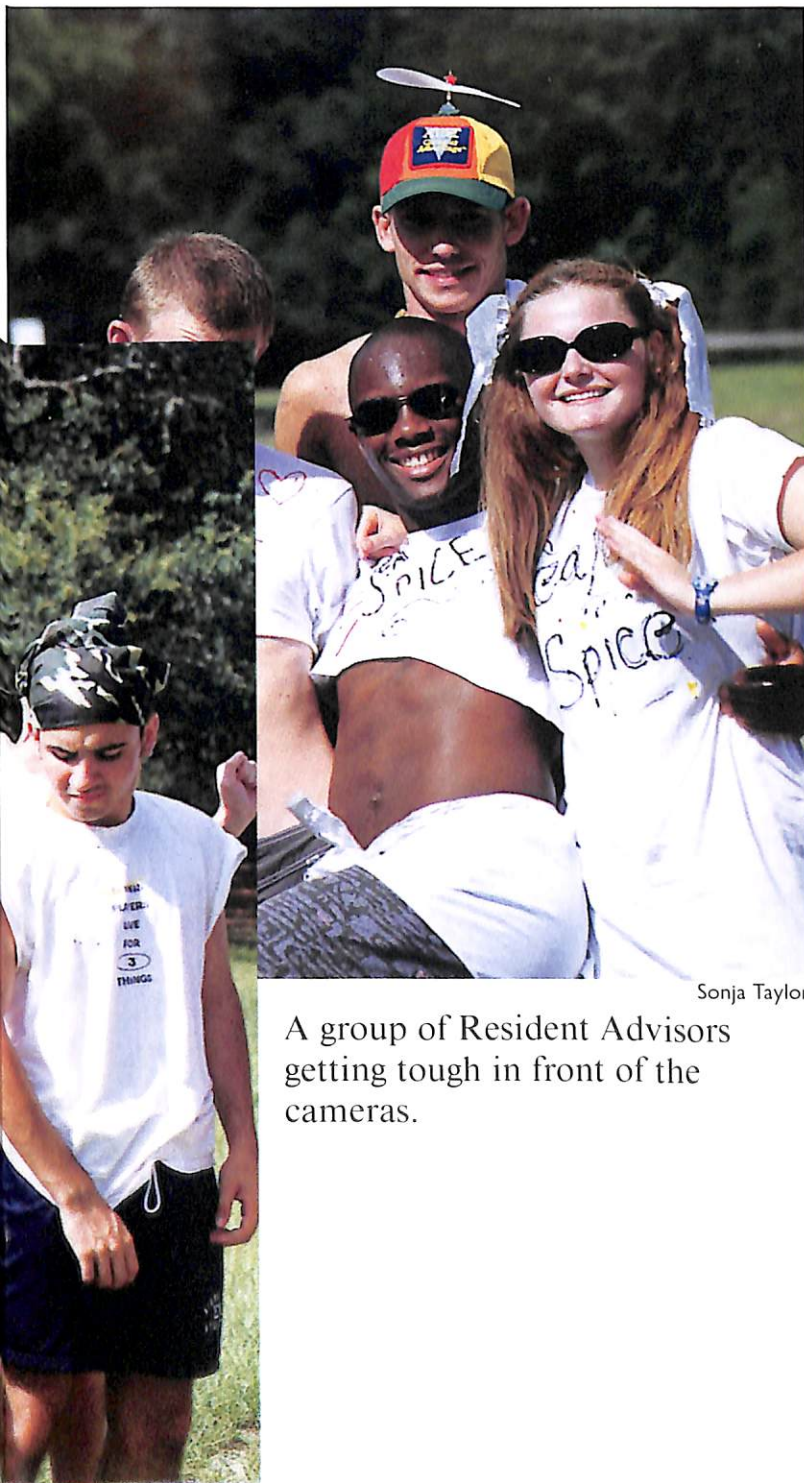
Residence life promotes a living and learning concept within the halls; that is, residents not only sleep in the halls, but they interact with other students, study, and are part of a residential community.

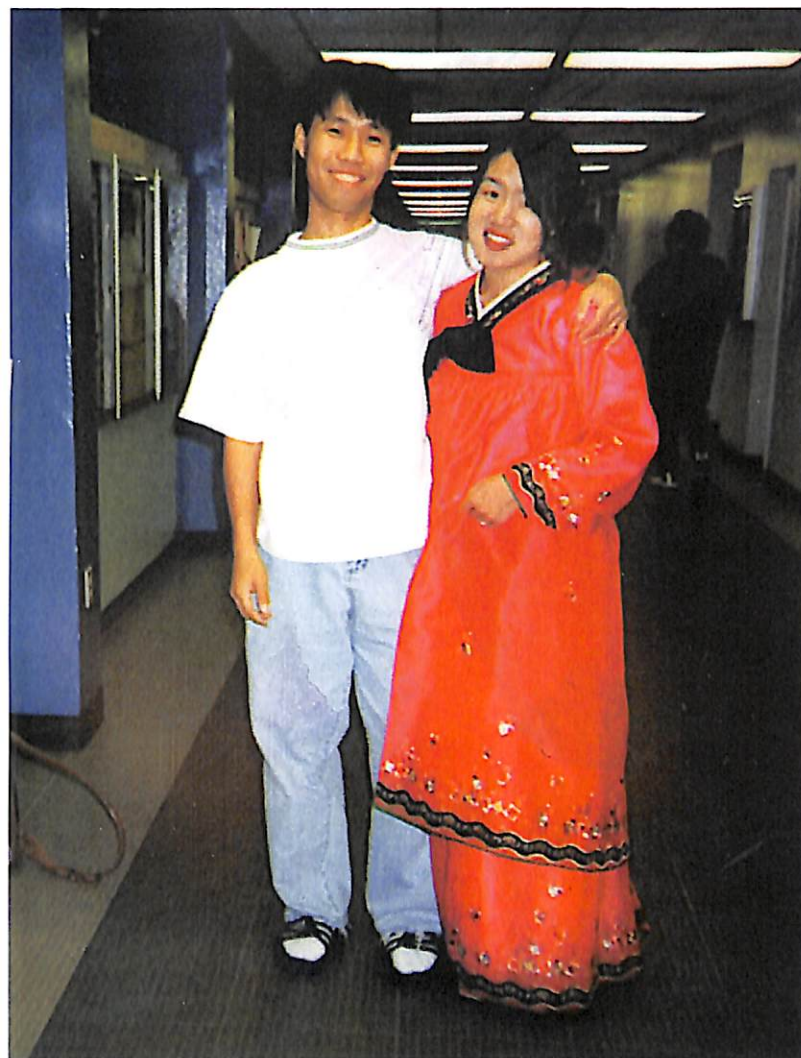

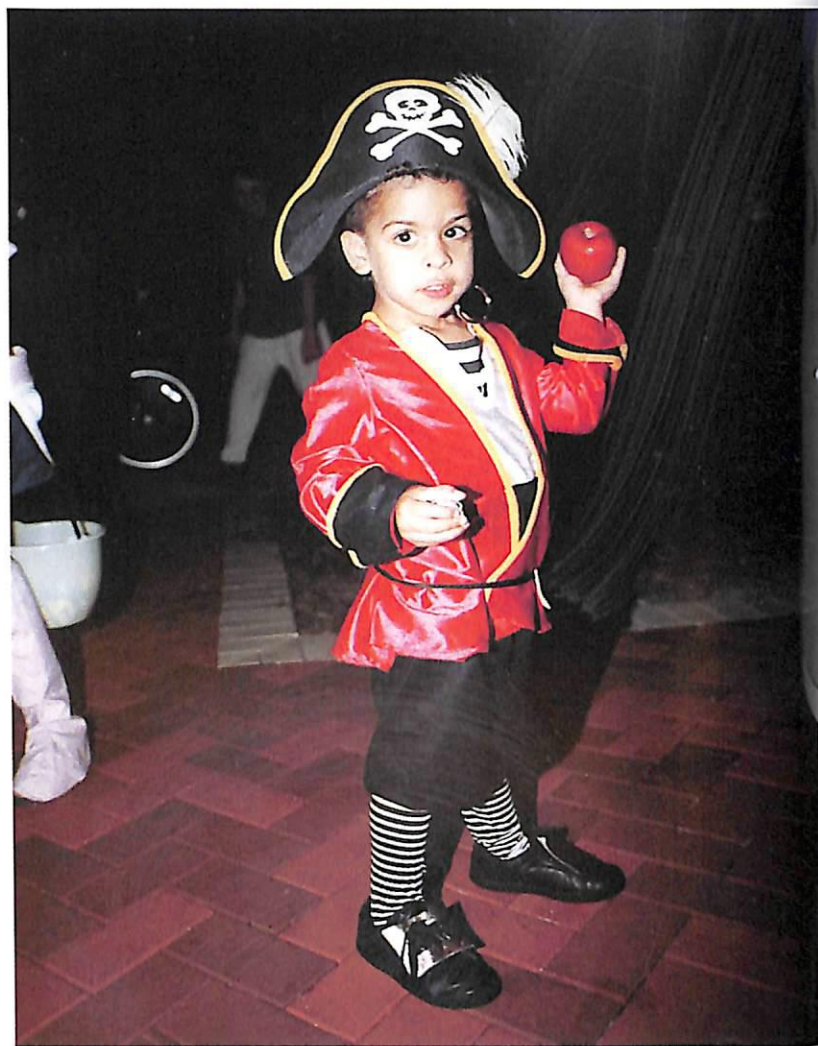

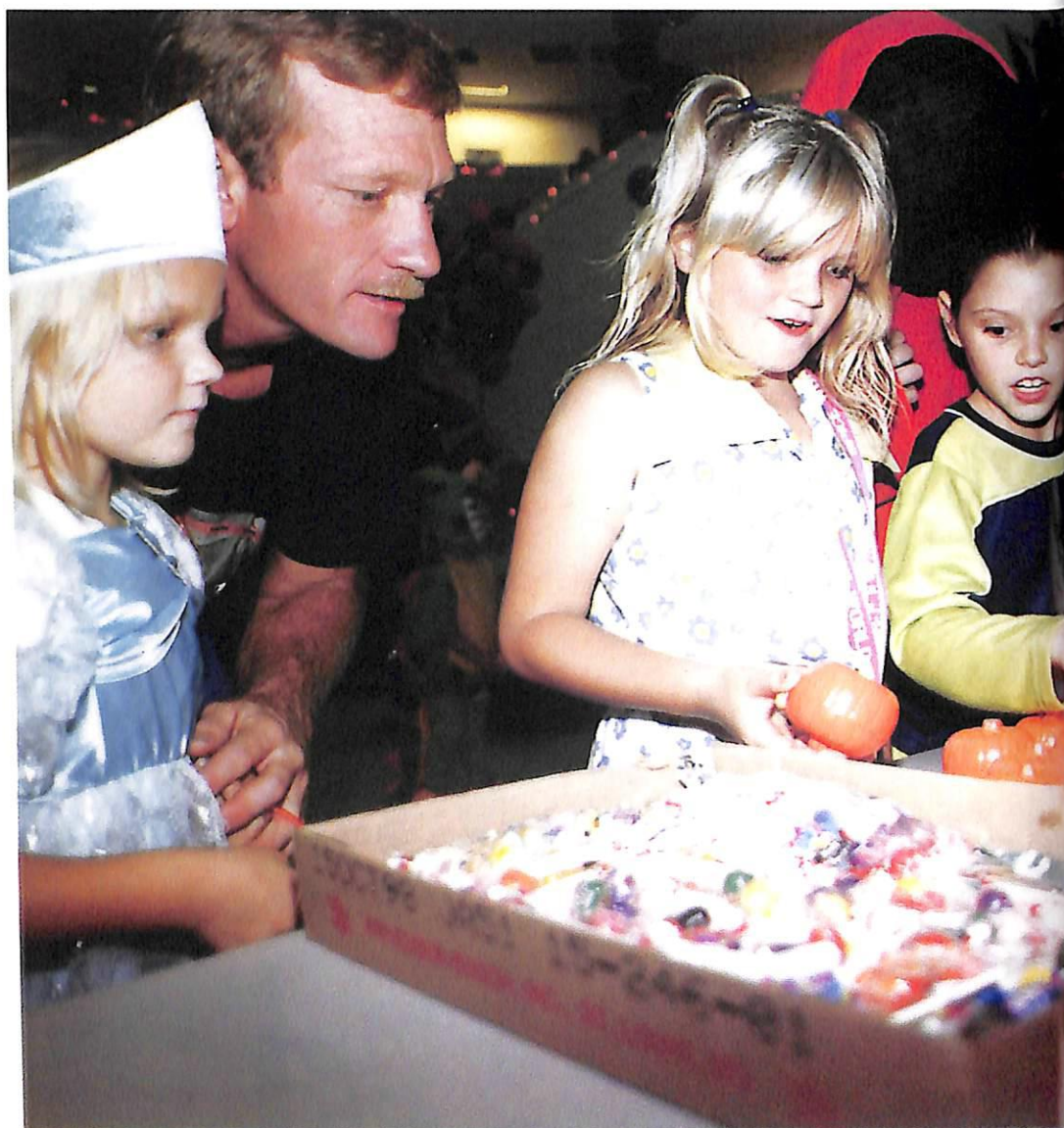

Blood Drive

Riddle students donate of themselves to save the lives of others

Several times throughout the year, students spent their time to give to others by donating blood. About 12.6 million units of Whole Blood are donated in the United States each year by approximately 8 million blood donors. These units are transfused to about 4 million patients per year. The need for blood is great - on any given day approximately 32,000 units of Red Blood Cells are needed. Accident victims, people undergoing surgery, and patients receiving treatment for leukemia, cancer and other diseases, such as sickle cell disease and thalassemia, all utilize blood. More than 23 million units of blood components are transfused each year.

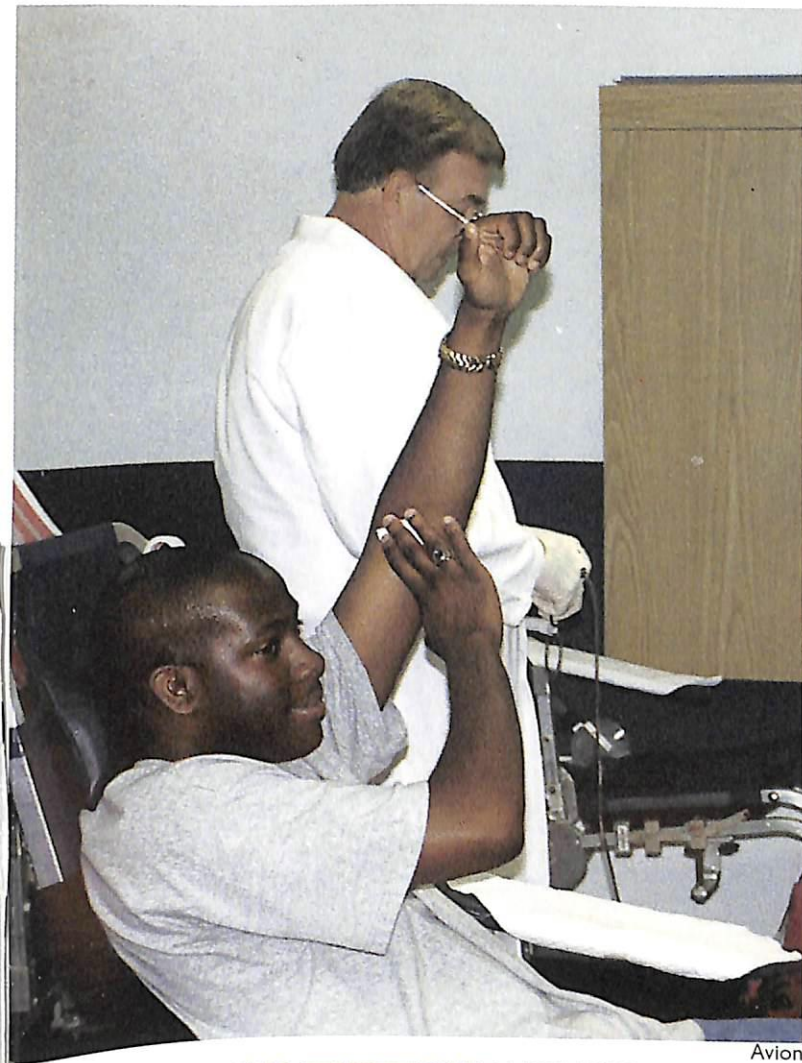

ized women on campus.

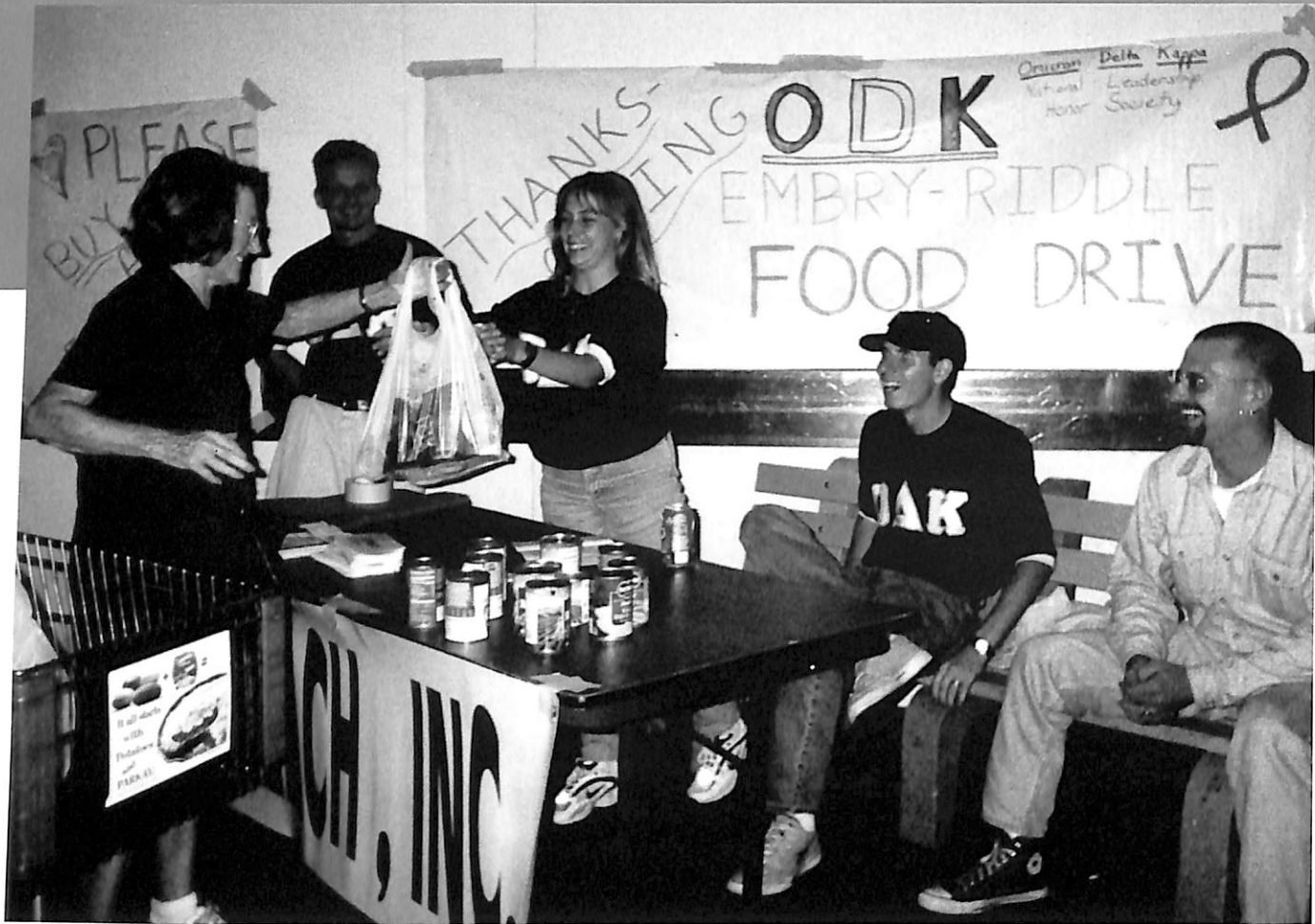
Our membership chair has been busy this year too. Between spring and fall, Alpha Xi Delta has initiated sixteen new members.

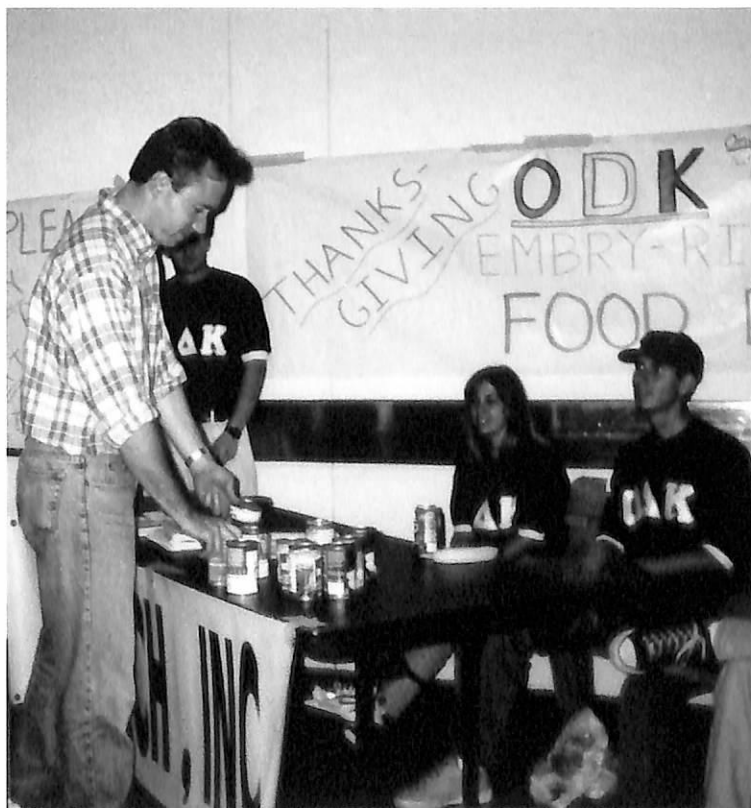

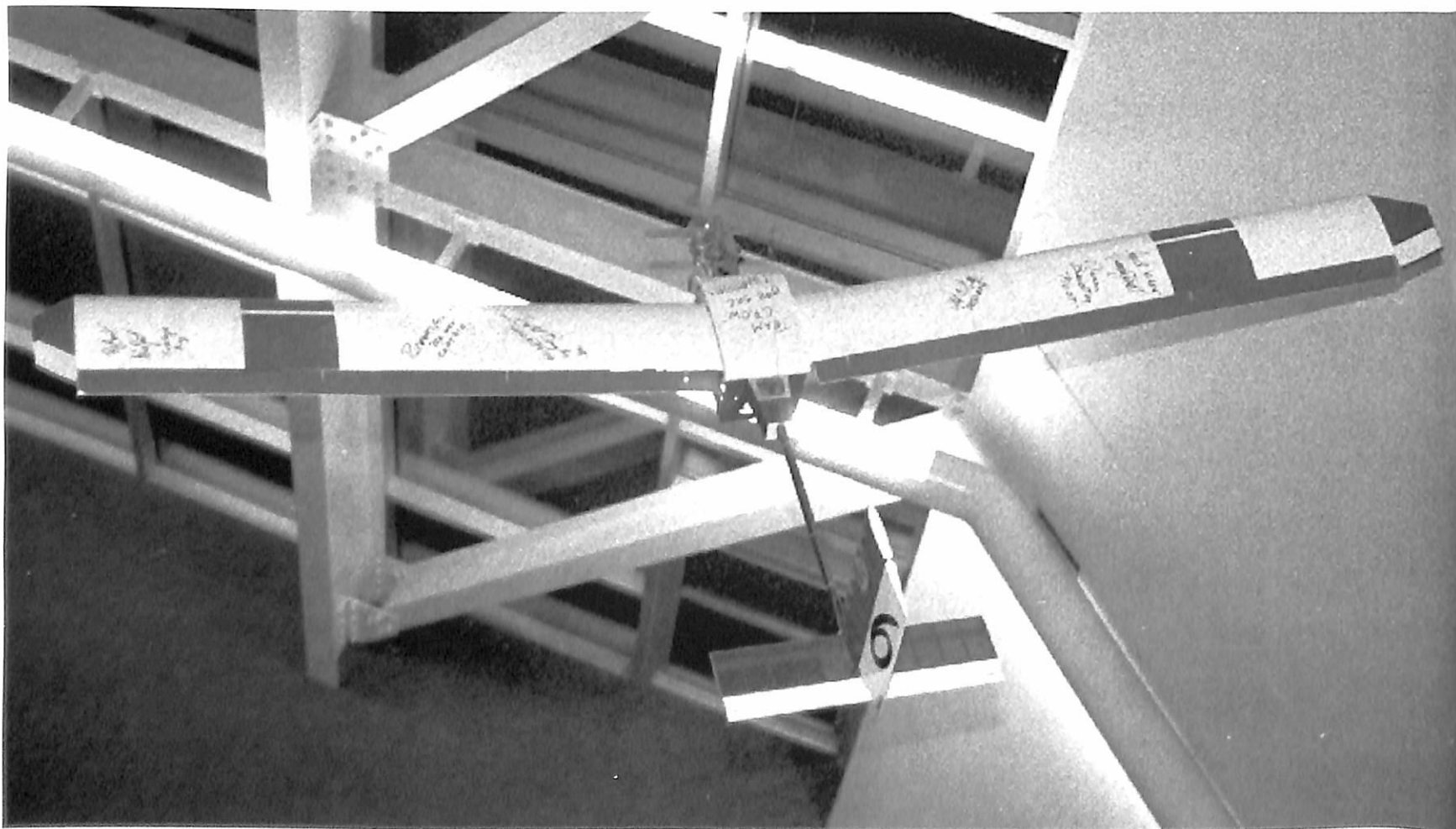

Sigma Alpha Epsilon

ΣΑΕ

Sigma Alpha Epsilon was founded March 9, 1856 at the University of Alabama at Tuscaloosa. Its eight founders included five seniors, Noble Leslie DeVotie, John Barratt Rudolph, Nathan Elams Cockrell, John Webb Kerr, and Wade Foster, and three juniors, Samuel Marion Dennis, Abner Edwin Patton and Thomas Chappell Cook. Their leader was DeVotie who had written the ritual, devised the grip, and chosen the name. Rudolph designed the badge.

Of all existing fraternities today, Sigma Alpha Epsilon is the only one founded in the ante-bellum South. Founded at a time of growing and intense sectional feeling, Sigma Alpha Epsilon, although it determined at the outset to extend to other colleges, confined its growth to the southern states.

Extension was vigorous, however, and by the end of 1857 the fraternity counted seven chapters. Its first national convention met in the summer of 1858 at

Murfreesboro, Tennessee, with four of its eight chapters in attendance. By the time of the outbreak of the Civil War in 1861, fifteen chapters had been established. The fraternity had fewer than four hundred members when the Civil War began. Of those, 369 went to war for the Confederacy and seven fought for the Union Forces.

Seventy members of the fraternity lost their lives in the war, including Noble Leslie DeVotie, who is officially recorded in the annals of the war as the first man on either side to give his life.

It has been often said that honesty is the best policy. For the true gentleman honesty is the only policy. Honesty in all circumstances and with all people, dealing justly and fairly with others, is rewarded with friendship and respect. For the True Gentleman is a man; a man of virtue in its fullest sense; a man with whom virtue is safe. May you always, and in all circumstances, be a person of virtue. May we all be men of virtue.

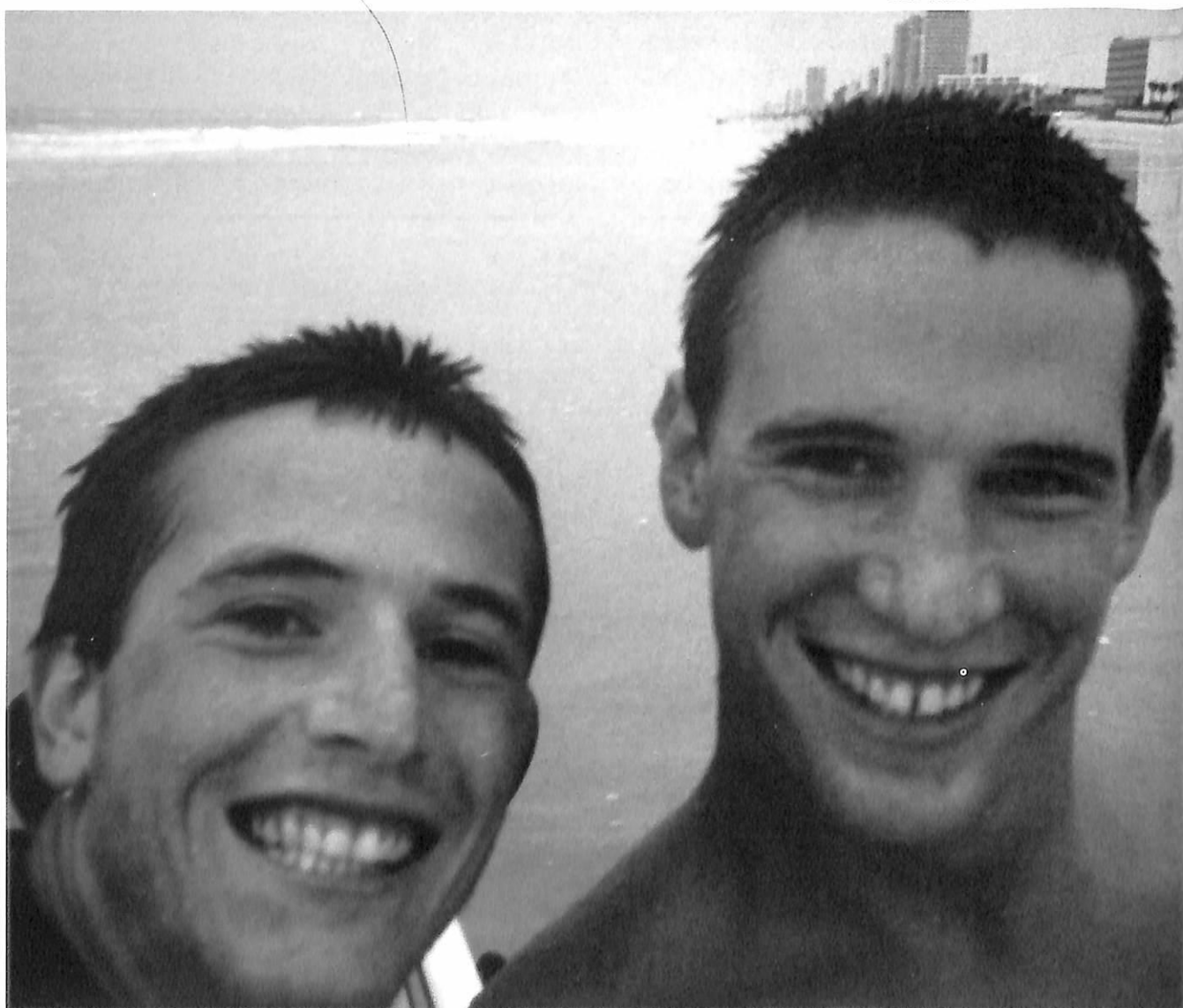

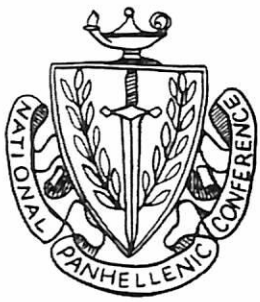

The club is headed by Professor H. Goninan, and five student officers. Throughout the academic semester, the club will participate in many activities. For instance, in the Spring of '98, Commander Steinmetz, a former A-6 Intruder Pilot who was featured on Wings Over the Gulf, visited the club along with Lt. 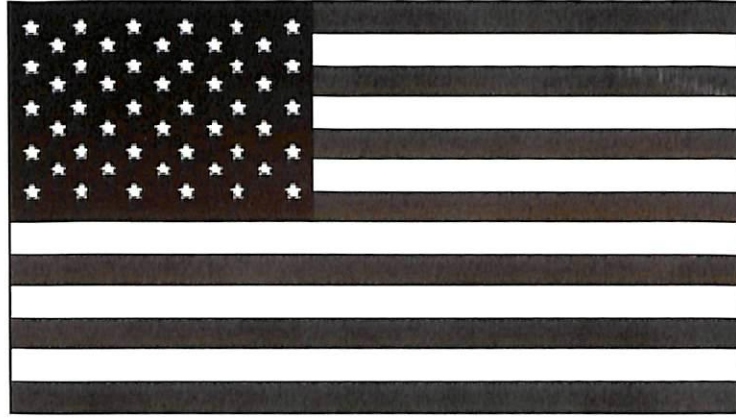

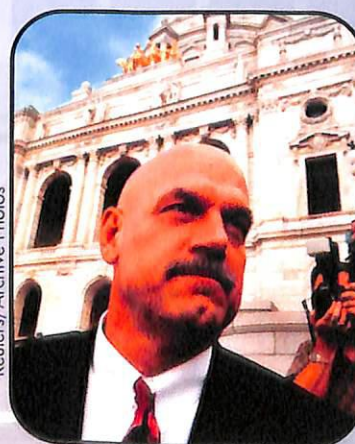

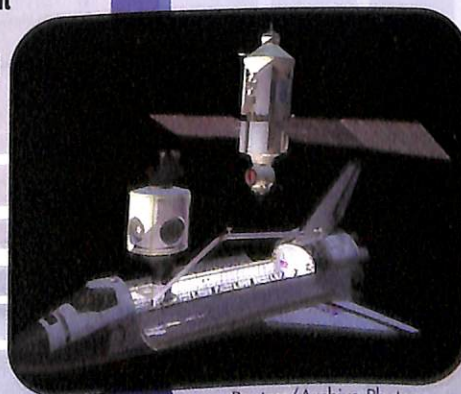

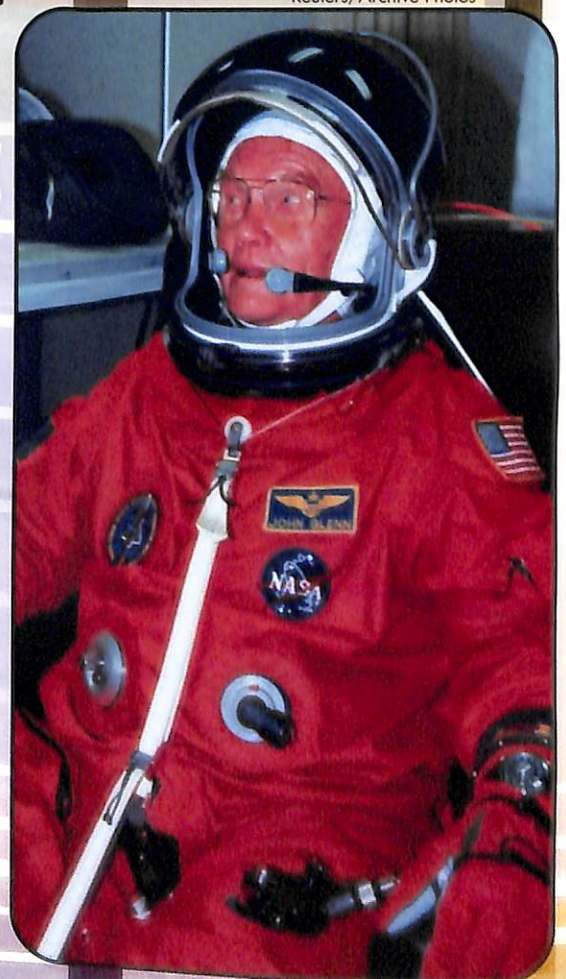

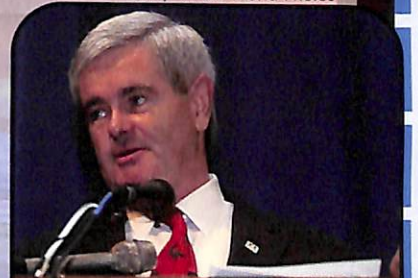

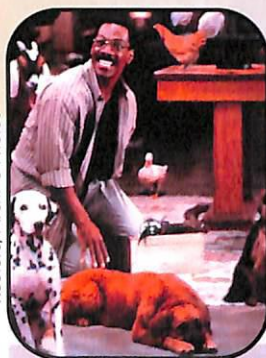

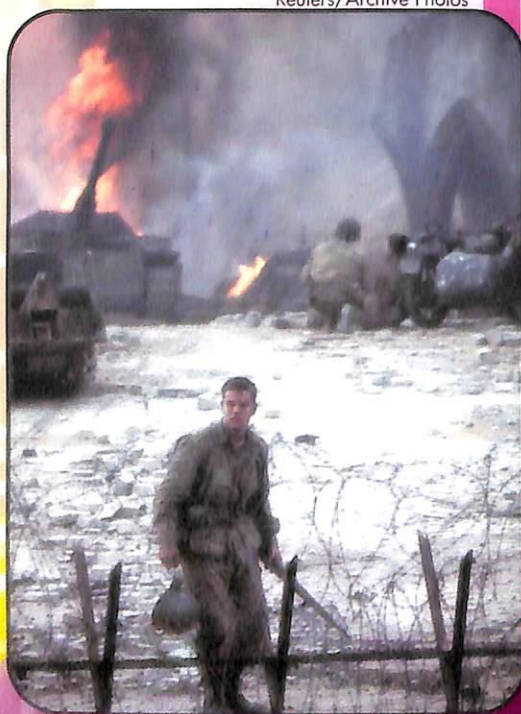

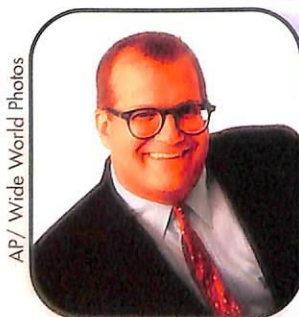

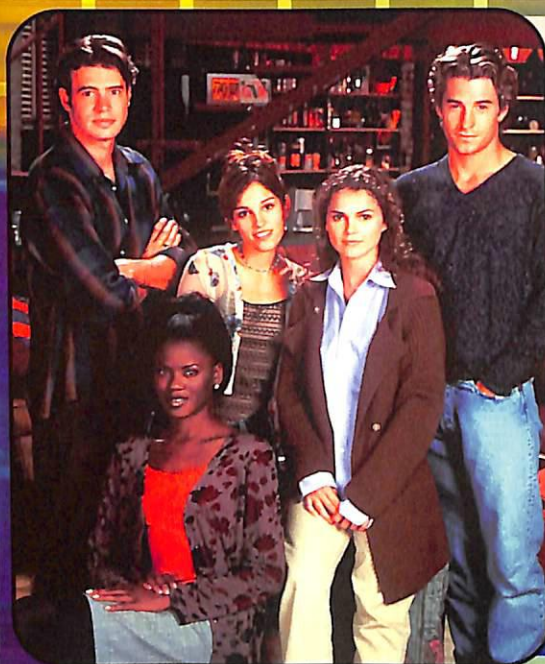

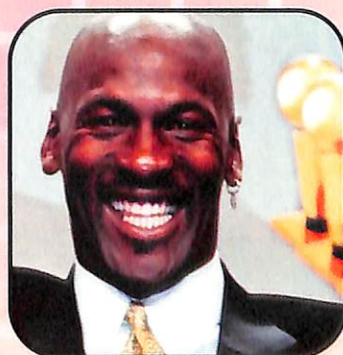

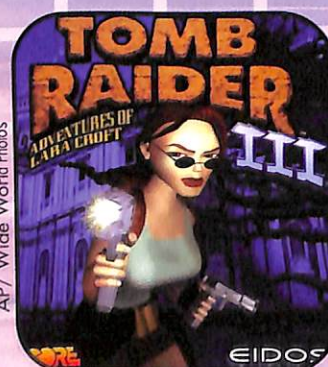
