at Embry-Riddle in September of 1967 and is in the final stages of receiving his Bachelor of Science Degree in Aircraft Engineering Maintenance Technology. He is a pilot and licensed by the Federal Aviation Agency (FAA) as a basic ground-school instructor. Mr. Brewer has been a member in good standing since 1968 in Alpha Eta Rho, an international aviation fraternity with two goals of promoting aviation in all of its branches. When asked why he offered to do this, Mr. Brewer replied, "It is an opportunity to introduce high school students to the many facets of avi-

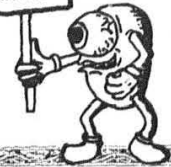

You, as a student, are probably wondering what this has to do with you. Why should you concern yourself with a faculty group? Well, this is THE group that administers your education. They are striving to upgrade your education and protect your rights! I know of no better way to explain their philosophy than to quote it:

"The men and women who make up the AAUP are not a professional caste who care only about their immediate personal interests. Their basic commitment is to the cause of higher education, and to the development and maintenance of standards of excellence. We do not regard professors as ends in themselves. They are maintained by society to teach students and to extend the frontier of knowledge. If students are to be taught effectively, and if knowledge is to be expanded, then all who are involved in the educational enterprise must be free from invidious controls. This is the central meaning of Association. Our colleges and universities are not instruments of propaganda; they are not the tools of those who for the moment hold in their hands the powers of the state. They are designed to permit the flowering of the human intellect. We know that if the life of the mind is to flourish, then it must be free."

Unless you are very dense, you should be able to see that the AAUP is not a watered down version of the "controlling" power on campus.

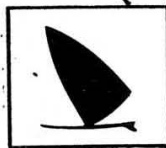

Resort work, hotel work, restaurant work, office work, sales work, factory work, construction work, farm work, forestry work, hospital work, campus counseling, governess and teaching work make up most of the paying job categories. Standard wages are paid and room and board are either provided free or at least arranged for the American student worker before he or she arrives on the job.

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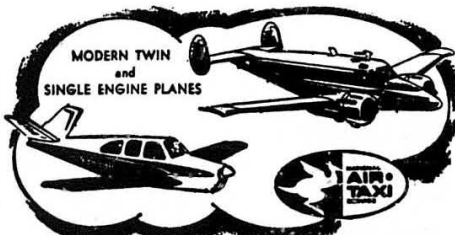

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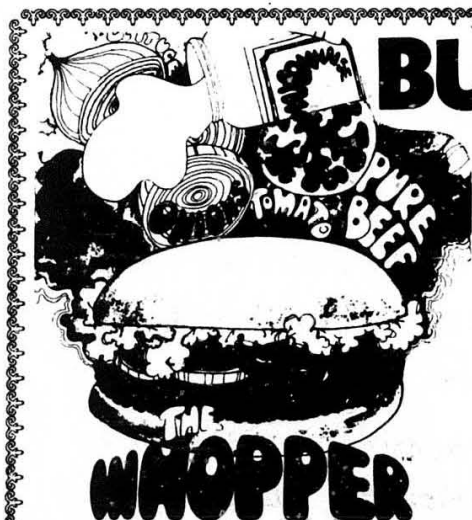


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## VETS ASSOC.

## SAFETY TIPS

### Alcohol and Judgement

Even though alcohol adversely affects the ability to perform, and slows down brain function, the worst thing it does is wreck a person's judgement. Dr. Tang of the Federal Aviation Agencies Civil Aeromedical Research Institute, offered an interesting observation on this, which he got from a study made in England on the relationship between alcohol and the ability of professional truck drivers to operate trucks between two posts spaced just inches further apart than truck width. But, they were not able to allow passage. When the posts were placed a couple of inches closer than the truck width they couldn't tell this, and would try to drive through anyway. The alcohol didn't affect their driving ability so much, but it wrecked their judgement. We feel this is largely the case in flying - especially in the cases where very experienced pilots crack up after they have been drinking.

## SPEEDWAY NEWS

motocross

Final preparations for the most exciting of the Daytona Motorcycle Classics events got under way recently with the construction of Daytona's first Moto-cross Course.

The unique, natural terrain layout is being designed by Gary "Iron Man" Bailey of Torrance, Calif., one of America's top moto-cross riders. Located in the infield portion of the 3.81 mile road course, the moto-cross layout will be 9/10ths of a mile in length with a total of five jumps, the highest being 12 feet.

With one long straight and a series of both sharp and gradual turns, the course is shaping into one of the most difficult and interesting in the state.

Bailey has been racing bikes since the age of 14 and has competed in all types of off-road competition. When he is not racing the 27-year old rider is either teaching moto-cross schools or helping to promote the sport.

The Daytona Moto-cross will be the final meet of the seven-race Florida Winter AMA Moto-Cross series and will be run in six, 20 minute motos or heat races, three in each class (250cc and open). Each heat counts equally toward the overall victory.

The starting flag for the first moto will fall at 10:00 a.m., Saturday, March 13. Over 100 riders are expected to enter the event, the first moto-cross in the 30-year history of the Daytona Motorcycle Classics.

Immediately following the Moto-Cross at 3:00 p.m. is the start of the 100-mile, 250cc road race over the twisting 3.81 mile road course. The entire "Bike Week" Program will then be climaxed Sunday, March 14, with the running of the Daytona 200 Road Race.

### super-hero Higgins

Barry Higgins of Schenectady, N.Y., considered by many as the greatest Moto-Cross rider in the nation, has inked his entry to compete in the first Daytona Moto-Cross

event Saturday, March 13 at Daytona International Speedway.

The lanky and often outspoken 24-year-old bachelor is currently tops in the 250cc class in the Florida AMA Moto-Cross series. The Daytona event will be the final installment of the seven-event series, getting started at 10:00 a.m.

Higgins, the son of a top-rated enduro rider, began his two-wheel career just three years ago and has been making a living riding Moto-Cross ever since. In 1969 he was the top american in the Inter-ama Moto-Cross series, which is run during the fall on a dozen courses across the nation.

Prognosticators have selected Higgins as America's best chance in gaining the World Moto-Cross championship, and honor that has been traditionally held by the more experienced European riders.

The Moto-Cross, run over a natural and usually rough terrain, is becoming America's fastest growing form of motorized sport. With as many as 50 riders on the course at once, riding through ditches and over jumps, the moto-cross could well develop into the most exciting event of the motorcycle classics program.

The 30th annual motorcycle classics gets underway with practice on Monday, March 8 and is climaxed with the running of the Daytona 200 for experts on Sunday, March 14.

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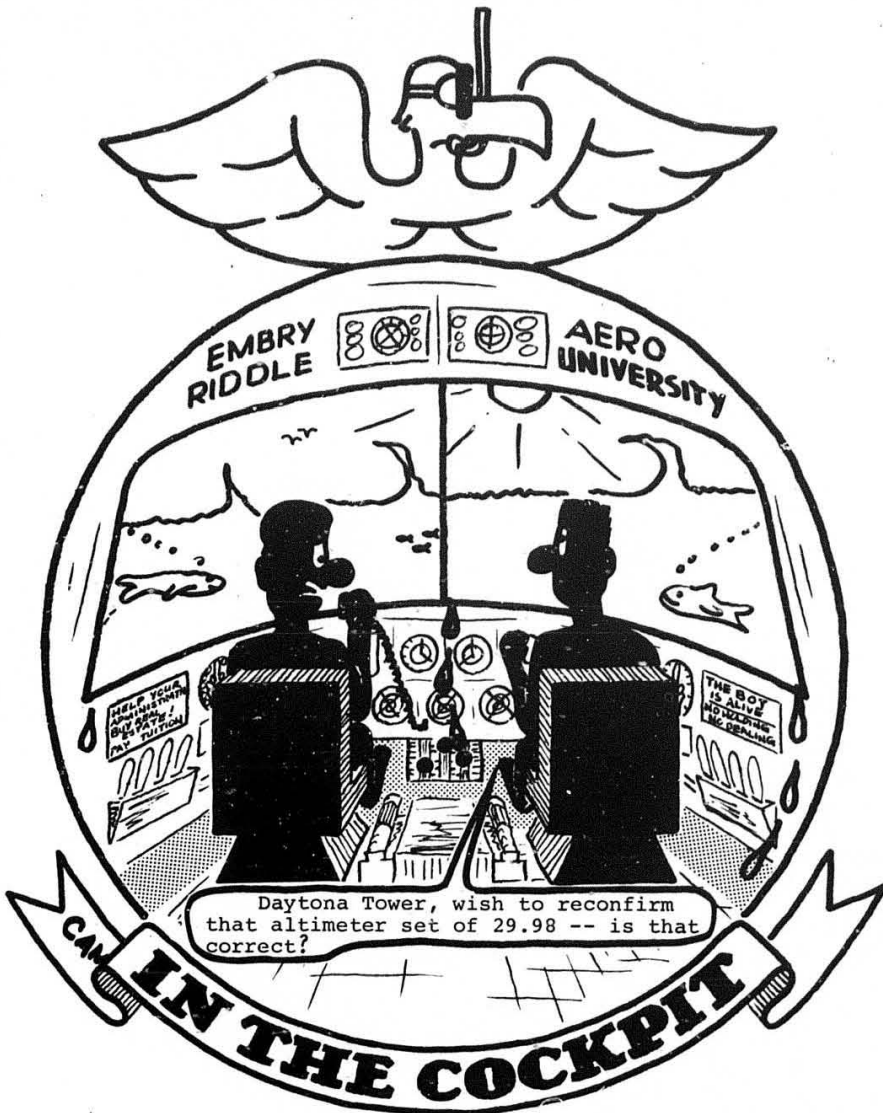
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
